Lenten Guidelines

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts until Holy Thursday.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstinence. All other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence only.

As outlined on the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' website on Lenten fasting and abstinence, "fasting is obligatory for all who have completed their 18th year and have not yet reached their 60th year.

Fasting allows a person to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may be taken, not to equal one full meal. Fridays in Lent are obligatory days of complete abstinence (from meat) for all who have completed their 14th year.

Through our works of prayer, fasting, and abstinence, let us heed the prophet Joel's exhortation to return to God with our whole heart (2:12)."

Increased Opportunities for Reconciliation

Beginning this Saturday, St. Bridget's will offer Saturday Reconciliation from 2:30-3:30 PM — starting a half hour earlier and lasting a bit longer than before. We also offer Reconciliation every Friday during the 3:00-4:00 PM Holy Hour. Throughout Lent, Reconciliation will additionally be available during the Friday evening Stations of the Cross, which begin at 7:00 PM. We invite all parishioners to take advantage of these expanded opportunities for prayer, reflection, and the healing grace of the sacrament.

"If You Choose, You Can Keep the Commandments"



The Mass readings for the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time invite us to go deeper—beyond surface-level religion and into the heart of what it truly means to live as God's people.

Together, they challenge us to examine not only our actions, but our desires, intentions, and the choices we make each day.

In the first reading from the Book of Sirach, we hear a powerful affirmation of human freedom and responsibility: "If you choose, you can keep the commandments." God honors our free will; he does not force obedience upon us. Instead, He places before us life and death, good and evil, and respects our freedom to choose. This reading reminds us that holiness is not accidental. Faithfulness is shaped by daily decisions—often small, hidden ones—that gradually form the direction of our lives.

Psalm 119 echoes this theme with a prayer of longing: "Blessed are they who follow the law of the Lord." The psalmist does not speak of God's law as a burden, but as a blessing, a path to joy and freedom. When God's word is written on our hearts, obedience becomes an expression of love rather than fear.

In the second reading, St. Paul speaks of a deeper wisdom, a wisdom not of this world but of God. This wisdom is revealed through the Spirit and is accessible to those who are open to God's transforming grace. Paul reminds us that Christian living is not about mere rule-keeping; it is about allowing God to shape our minds and hearts so that we see and act as Christ does.

This message reaches its fullest expression in the Gospel from Matthew. Jesus does not abolish the law; He fulfills it. In the Sermon on the Mount, He takes familiar commandments—against killing, adultery, false oaths—and brings them inward. Anger, lust, dishonesty, and grudges are revealed as matters of the heart, not just behavior. Jesus calls His disciples to a righteousness that exceeds external compliance, a righteousness rooted in love, mercy, and integrity.

These readings gently but firmly challenge us to ask: Where is my heart? Do I follow God's commandments out of habit, obligation, or fear—or out of love and trust? The Christian life is not about appearing righteous, but about becoming righteous by allowing God to transform us from within.

As we prepare to enter into the season of Lent, it is a good time to ask God for the grace to choose wisely, to desire what is true and good, and to live the law of love not only with our actions, but with our whole hearts.

the Homeless, Hungry
and People in Need

St. Bridget Ministry for the Homeless, Hungry and People in Need will be collecting canned goods and other selected food items to fill the pantry at New Covenant Center from Saturday, February 14th

through Sunday, February 22nd. In addition to serving over 300 hot healthy meals a day, to those who come to the soup kitchen, over 1,600 individuals receive 3 meals a day for 10 days from the food pantry. A flyer listing the foods requested are available in both vestibules of the church.

Through the same period, the Ministry will be collecting warm, gently used coats for distribution to: Pacific House Men's Shelter, Inspirica Women's Shelter, and One Warm Coat: local agencies providing coats to those in need. Coats must be clean, with no holes or stains, and no broken zippers or missing buttons. Please leave coats in the Parish Hall on the designated tables.
