Humble, Patient, Faith

How often have we found ourselves echoing the apostles' plea in this Sunday's Gospel? "Lord, increase our faith!" We face personal struggles, witness violence in the news,

or feel overwhelmed by the challenges in our families, work, and communities. In these moments, it's natural to feel our faith is small and weak, and to ask God to give us more.

The readings this weekend directly address this universal prayer, but they redefine what powerful faith truly looks like.

In our First Reading, the prophet Habakkuk is crying out to God, much like we do. "How long, O LORD? I cry for help but you do not listen!" He sees only violence and injustice, and God seems silent. God's answer isn't a detailed explanation for all the suffering, but a call to patient trust: "See, the rash have no integrity; but the just one who is righteous because of faith shall live." This is the foundation of our journey: faith is trusting God's ultimate goodness and timing, even when we cannot see the path ahead clearly. It's a stubborn, hope-filled confidence that He is in control. When the apostles ask Jesus to increase their faith, He responds with two powerful images. First, the mustard seed. He isn't chiding them for having little faith; He is revealing the incredible power packed into even the smallest amount of genuine trust. Your faith doesn't need to be gigantic to be effective.

But the second image, the parable of the unworthy servant, challenges us. The servant does his duty plowing the fields, tending the sheep, preparing the master's meal—and doesn't expect special thanks. He simply does what is required. Jesus teaches us that faith is not a tool for performing spectacular deeds to earn praise. Rather, true faith is expressed through humble, consistent, and dutiful service. We are called to do the work God has given us—loving our neighbor, caring for our families, fulfilling our vocations not for a reward, but simply because we are His beloved children. Our service is the natural fruit of our relationship with Him. We can say, "We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do," not out of low self-esteem, but out of a deep gratitude for the privilege of serving the Lord at all. Finally, St. Paul reminds Timothy (and us) that faith is not a passive possession but a living gift. He urges him to "stir into flame the gift of God you have." Faith is a fire that must be tended, fed by prayer and the Sacraments, and fanned into flame by acts of charity and courage. (Continued in next column)

(continued) It is a "rich deposit" that we must guard with the help of the Holy Spirit.

This Sunday, as we pray, "Lord, increase our faith," let's understand what we are asking for. We are not asking for the power to move mountains for our own glory. We are asking for the grace to trust God in the darkness, to serve Him humbly in our daily duties, and to boldly stir into flame the gift of faith we have been given. For in doing so, we will truly live.
