

1. Go to HoustonVotersGuide.org.
2. Click on Sample Ballot.
3. Enter your name, your address or your Voter Registration Certificate Number.
4. Make sure your personal information is correct, then click on "Sample Ballot" to view your ballot just as it will look when you go to vote.
5. You may print your sample ballot, take notes, and bring it with you when you go to vote.



THINGS VOTERS SHOULD KNOW

PHOTO ID IS REQUIRED TO VOTE IN PERSON IN ALL TEXAS ELECTIONS

Those voting in person either early or on Election Day will be required to present photo identification or an acceptable alternative identification allowed by law. Go to [page 6](#) for details.

ANY HARRIS COUNTY POLLING LOCATION CAN BE YOUR POLLING PLACE

All Harris County polling places are now Voting Centers! Choose the location that is most convenient to you – you no longer have to return to your home precinct to vote. Go to www.harrisvotes.com/waittimes or call **713-755-6965** to find the location nearest to you. Bonus! By using the link, you will also be able to see which locations have the shortest wait times.

BALLOT BY MAIL

Voters may cast mail ballots if they are at least 65 years old, if they will be out of Harris County during the Early Voting period and on Election Day, if they are sick or disabled, if they are expecting to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day, or if they are incarcerated but eligible to vote. You can now track the progress of your ballot by going to www.harrisvotes.com. Click on Vote by Mail then on Mail Ballot Tracking.

VOTING IS YOUR RIGHT

Should you encounter any problems at the poll, you may always ask to cast a Provisional Ballot and have the opportunity to correct any problem; see [page 6](#) for details about "curing" a Provisional Ballot. You may also contact the Harris County Clerk's Office of the Elections Administrator at 713-755-6965, the Texas Secretary of State Elections Division at 1-800-252-8683, the United States Department of Justice at 1-800-253-3931, or Election Protection at 1-866-OUR VOTE (687-8683), if you believe that your right to vote is being unlawfully denied or impeded.

Your VOTE is Your VOICE

Voting is important because you are important! Register to vote so you have the opportunity to cast a ballot. When you vote, you help elect officials who set policy that will impact nearly every part of our lives, from education to taxes to medical care to law enforcement. When you vote YOU help to decide who represents us and how we will be governed.

» UNDERSTANDING PRIMARY ELECTIONS: WHY THEY MATTER AND HOW THEY SHAPE MIDTERMS

Primary elections play a critical role in our democratic process. They determine which candidates will appear on the ballot in the general election and give voters a direct voice in shaping who represents them at every level of government.

Understanding how primary elections work helps voters make informed choices, participate with confidence, and engage more fully in elections, from local offices to national races.

What Is a Primary Election?

A primary election is an election held by political parties to select their candidates for the general election. Rather than choosing between parties, voters in a primary choose which candidate will represent a party in the next stage of the election.

In Texas, primary elections are held in even-numbered years, including midterm election years.

Depending on the state and election, primary systems may include:

- **Open primaries:** Voters choose which party's primary to vote in, regardless of party affiliation
- **Closed primaries:** Voters must be registered with a political party to participate
- **Multi-Party primaries:** All candidates, regardless of party, are listed on a single ballot and the top candidates advance to the general election.

Runoff elections are held if no candidate receives the required number of votes to win outright. Tuesday, May 26, 2026, is date of the Primary Runoff Election.

Texas uses open primaries, meaning voters may choose one party's primary to vote in, but may only vote in one primary per election.

Why Primary Elections Matter

Primary elections often see lower voter turnout than general elections, but their impact is just as significant, and in many cases, even more decisive.

Primary elections:

- Decide which candidates advance to the general election
- Shape the policy direction and priorities of political parties
- Influence which names appear on the November ballot
- Give voters a voice earlier in the election process

In many races, particularly local offices or districts dominated by one party, the winner of the primary often goes on to win the general election. That makes participation in primaries especially important.

How Primaries Connect to Midterm Elections

Midterm elections take place halfway through a president's four-year term and include races for:

- U.S. Congress
- State and legislative offices
- Judicial, county, and local positions

Primary elections are the first step in all of these races.

The candidates chosen in the primaries:

- Become the official nominees in the midterm election
- Set the tone, priorities, and issues debated in the general election
- Determine the choices voters see on their final ballot

Without participating in primaries, voters miss a key opportunity to shape the field of candidates before the general election even begins.

Why Your Participation Matters

Even when outcomes may feel predictable, primaries allow voters to compare candidates' experience, leadership, and priorities, and to help decide who advances to the next stage.

Voting in a primary election helps ensure:

- Stronger representation in your community
- A more informed and engaged electorate
- Greater accountability from candidates
- A healthier, more responsive democracy


» REDISTRICTING: TEXAS CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT MAP UPDATES

Updated congressional district maps were proposed and approved by the Texas Legislature in August 2025 as part of a mid-decade redistricting process. Following legal review and court proceedings, the maps were allowed to move forward in December 2025, solidifying their use for upcoming elections. The revised boundaries affect several U.S. House districts and apply to the 2026 primary and general elections, unless future court decisions require changes.

After the maps were adopted, multiple legal challenges were filed raising questions about compliance with federal voting and civil rights laws. In November 2025, a federal three-judge panel temporarily blocked the maps and directed the state to continue using the prior district lines. The Texas Attorney General appealed the ruling to the U.S. Supreme Court which issued a stay, allowing the updated maps to be used while litigation continues.

As of now, the revised congressional districts maps are in effect for the 2026 election cycle, though court proceedings remain ongoing and could result in future changes. Voters are encouraged to check who their representatives are, since changes to district boundaries may affect which candidates appear on their ballot.

» STATE CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT 18: WHY THERE ARE TWO ELECTIONS FOR TX-18

Voters in Texas Congressional District 18 (TX-18) may notice that election timelines for this seat overlap, which can be confusing. This situation is the result of a vacancy occurring outside the regular election cycle and the required steps to fill that vacancy.

The January 2026 runoff election follows a special election held in November 2025, which was called after the passing of Sylvester Turner left the seat vacant. Because no candidate in the November special election received more than 50% of the vote, a runoff was required under Texas election law. Special elections to fill vacancies are scheduled at the discretion of the governor and occur outside the regular primary and general election calendar.

Separately, the March 3, 2026 primary election is part of the regular election cycle for the next full congressional term, with the general election taking place in November 2026. Because the TX-18 seat is scheduled to be on the ballot for the fall election, the primary proceeds as planned, regardless of the outcome of the special election runoff.

As a result, the same candidates appearing in the January runoff may also appear on the March primary ballot, even if they do not win the runoff. Winning the runoff determines who fills the seat for the

remainder of the current term (January 2026 through January 3, 2027), while the primary and general elections determine who will serve the next full term (January 3, 2027 through January 3, 2029).

Under different circumstances, the vacancy election may have occurred earlier, potentially allowing the winner to serve longer before the next regular election. However, when vacancies occur between election cycles, election timelines can overlap.

While the schedule may feel unusual, each election serves a distinct purpose:

- November 2025 special election & January 2026 runoff: fill the vacant seat for the remainder of the term
- March 2026 primary & November 2026 general election: select the representative for the next full term



Voters are encouraged to review their ballots carefully and participate in each election for which they are eligible.


VOTING IN PERSON? YOU MUST BRING ONE OF THESE PHOTO IDs

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or, for voters aged 18-69, have expired no more than 4 years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place.



DO NOT POSSESS AND CANNOT REASONABLY OBTAIN ONE OF THESE IDS?

Bring one of the following supporting documents to the polling place. The election official will help you complete a form and you'll be able to vote.

- Valid Voter Registration Certificate
- Certified Birth Certificate (must be an original)
- Copy of or original Bank Statement
- Copy of or original Government check or paycheck
- Copy of or original current Utility Bill
- Copy of or original government document with your name and an address (original required if it contains a photograph)

“CURING” A PROVISIONAL BALLOT

Voters who are unable to provide an acceptable form of photo ID or an acceptable supporting document may vote provisionally. Voters will need to sign a provisional affidavit and will have until **Monday, March 9, 2026** to cure their ballot by bringing an acceptable form of identification to the Harris County Clerk's Office.

HEALTHCARE: What role should the federal government play in promoting a healthy American population, and what steps would you take to ensure that healthcare is affordable and accessible for all Americans?



James Talarico

QUALIFICATIONS: I'm a former middle school teacher, and I've served in the Texas House for eight years. As a Democrat in the Republican-controlled House, I've proven that I can fight back and win for working people.





QUALIFICATIONS: I served as Justice on the 1st Court of Appeals. Prior to that, I served in senior positions for DuPont, Conoco, and Occidental. In the community, I served on many school and professional boards.

ETHICS: I have published many articles on ethics for the ABA, the UC Business Law Journal, the Heidelberg Journal of International Law, and the Harvard Public Health Review. My articles emphasize that individuals must not only comply with the law in all matters, but also that they must do the right thing even when the law is silent or ambiguous, and even when doing the right thing is unpopular.

EQUITY: The Texas Supreme Court should be accessible to all citizens. There is an important role to be played by individuals and groups whose interests may be impacted by future rulings, and the court should be receptive and attentive to amicus curiae briefs (i.e., briefs filed by friends of the court).

ISSUES: The justices of every court in Texas swear an oath to uphold and defend the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and the United States. The judicial department of Texas is the third arm of the government, and under the Texas constitution, the separation of powers is explicitly stated. The justices of the Texas Supreme Court must base their decisions on the law and not popular opinions.

PHILOSOPHY: Like Justices Holmes and Brandeis, I believe a "common law" approach is the most vital. This was the prevailing judicial philosophy for most of the 20th century and is a form of pragmatism. A more popular judicial philosophy today is "originalism" which proposes to interpret the law as it was understood when first enacted. The "common law" approach acknowledges that the world changes over time.

RELIGION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS: Public schools must remain religiously neutral, as required by the U.S. Constitution. While students should learn about religion in an objective, academic manner such as its historical and cultural influence, public school should not promote or endorse Christianity. Maintaining this separation protects religious freedom for students and families and ensure respect of Texas' diverse population.

OTHER ISSUES: Key issues facing the SBOE include high-quality, accurate instructional materials; addressing learning gaps and student achievement; supporting teacher recruitment and retention; and maintaining transparency and public trust in the curriculum adoption process. The Board must also navigate the responsible use of artificial intelligence, and the need for strong civic education.

The current distance requirements are too low, and the penalties and fines are often considered the cost of doing business. I would increase penalties and fines, and increase the required distance from residential neighborhoods.

ISSUES: The current attacks on voter rights and redistricting have hurt people across the state of Texas and have made the system even more restrictive and confusing for Texas residents. I plan to work with other Democrats to fight further restrictions and make voting more accessible for Texas Residents. Secondly, the Democratic Party has been systematically weakened in the state and I intend to bring a new kind of leadership that will actively address our parties shortcomings and try to mend relationships with other legislators to put our party and state back on the right track.



We have recently upped the number to 15 in order to have more cases ready each setting. 2) Hearing availability. I am one of the few civil courts in Harris County that has multiple trial settings a week. I have an oral hearing docket Tuesday through Friday. This allows parties more flexibility to get a hearing before me as well as allows me to try cases five days a week. We have recently increased the number of cases heard each day to get more cases in.

ISSUES: Civil courts face challenges related to efficiency, delays, and inconsistent case management. » VOTING FOR JUDGES IN TEXAS

Although in some states judges are appointed, most judges in Texas are elected. Voting decisions in judicial races are among the most important that a Texas voter makes.

WHY ARE JUDICIAL ELECTIONS IMPORTANT?

Judges make decisions about fundamental issues that affect all of us — family life, education, healthcare, housing, employment, finances, discrimination, civil rights, public safety, and government actions. Those decisions can have long-lasting impact on individuals, groups, and the public as a whole. It is critical that our judges make fair decisions based upon open-minded and unbiased consideration of the facts and the law in each case. Judges must know the law and not be influenced by any external political and economic factors.

WHAT SHOULD VOTERS LOOK FOR WHEN ELECTING JUDGES?

According to the American Bar Association, principles to consider in selection of judges include:

- Judges should uphold the rule of law.
- Judges should be independent and impartial.
- Judges should possess the appropriate temperament and character.
- Judges should possess the appropriate capabilities and credentials.
- Judges and the judiciary should have the confidence of the public.
- The judicial system should be diverse and reflective of the society it serves.
- Judges should be constrained to perform their duties in a manner that justifies public faith and confidence in the court.

Unlike candidates for most political offices, judicial candidates cannot make promises about decisions they would make when certain issues or types of cases come up in their court. Questions posed to judges, therefore, focus on improvements they would make to their court, the need for impartiality and how they would increase access to justice.

HOW IS THE TEXAS COURT SYSTEM ORGANIZED?

The Texas court system is made up of a statewide network of trial courts and appellate courts. In trial courts, judges and/or juries evaluate the facts and the law and make a decision in a civil or criminal legal dispute. When decisions in most trial courts are appealed, they are sent to an appellate court where judges consider what happened at the trial court, evaluate legal arguments, and then decide if a mistake was made.

The state's two highest courts, the Texas Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals, have both administrative and appellate responsibilities. The Supreme Court is the final court of appeals within Texas for both civil and juvenile cases. The Court of Criminal Appeals hears criminal cases that are appealed from one of the 14 Courts of Appeals and death penalty cases that by law go straight to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Members of the Texas Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals are elected for six-year terms, with three elected every two years. Vacancies on either of these two courts are filled by gubernatorial appointment until the next general election.







ISSUES: Eviction & Housing Stability: Evictions dominate the JP docket and destabilize families and neighborhoods. I will prioritize mediation as the first step in landlord-tenant disputes, expand diversion options, and ensure tenants are connected to rental assistance, legal aid, and housing resources. I will establish a Court Resource Hub and hire a Community Liaison to coordinate on site referrals so cases are resolved fairly, before displacement occurs.
