




**WHITE WATER
SHAKER VILLAGE**

WWSV began when three Butler County families gathered together as Shakers in 1823. By 1825, an established Shaker village in Lebanon, Ohio helped this newly formed group buy land in Hamilton County. The Meeting House was erected in 1827 with the Dwelling following in 1832. Since Shakers practiced celibacy, growth occurred by conversion of adults and raising orphans. Successful farmers and crafters, Shakers were also known for their seed and broom industries. After the Civil War, the White Water Shaker population began to decline, and by 1916 the last White Water Shakers left for Shaker villages in New York and Massachusetts.

(parking is available behind the firehouse)


Originally situated on the corner of Passmore and Willey Roads in the town of New Haven, friends and members of the Crosby Township Historical Society completed reassembly of the cabin at its current location in 2002.

Named the Passmore Cabin in honor of the first known owners of the cabin, it is believed to have been in existence prior to 1818.


FERNALD FEED MATERIALS PRODUCTION CENTER (FERNALD PRESERVE)

THE HARRISON VILLAGE HISTORICAL SOCIETY MUSEUM

The Harrison Village Historical Society Museum opened in 2013. It was a dream come true for generations of members whose goal was to collect and preserve material of historic significance from and for the City of Harrison and its surrounding communities. Displays include an historic timeline of the area, a special tribute in memory of Jennings Bryan Yeager and all who answered the call during WWI, Harrison High School sports through the years, a collection of the Harrison Vista Yearbooks, and the Simonson Station Streetcar display. Historical pictures, items and information are gladly accepted and added to the collection. The Museum is open on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month from 1 to 3 p.m. Special visits can be arranged.



OTHNIEL LOOKER HOME

Othniel Looker, Ohio's 5th Governor in 1814, served in the Continental Army of the American Revolution from 1777 to 1782. He was involved in defending Elizabethtown Point, NJ, was engaged in the battles of Long Island and White Plains, NY, and was with General Geo. Washington at Trenton, NJ. Looker married Pamela Clark in 1779. He was elected to the New York Senate in 1801. In 1804-05, Looker built his family home in Harrison, OH. He was a member of the Ohio Legislature in 1807, Ohio Governor in 1814, and an Ohio Senator in 1816. He founded Masonic Lodge 44 in Harrison in 1817 and became a Common Pleas Judge in Cincinnati in 1824. Upon his death in 1845, Othniel was buried in Palestine, IL.
