From the Rector

I have never been a morning person. No matter how many times I've tried to get up full of joy and energy, I tend to wake up groggy, slow, and with a general feeling of "don't talk to me just yet...". A shower helps. Coffee is a nice addition. But what really changes my overall feeling of the day is walking into our quiet church for Morning Prayer. This morning I could still smell the faintness of incense in the air. The wood floors and walls somehow still carry an echo of Sunday's joy. The quiet presence of God fills the place. And as my Spirit awakens to the presence of God, my body and mind awaken to the day before me as well.

I announced a few weeks ago at the start of our stewardship campaign that St. Peter's is leaning into its Episcopal tradition and reclaiming it's Anglican heritage by expanding our offerings of Morning and Evening Prayer, a significant section of the prayer book largely forgotten. In 2026, every weekday will begin with Morning Prayer at 8:00am and end with Evening Prayer at 5:15pm, and we are inviting everyone in the congregation to make a commitment to support these prayers with your presence and participation in some way, whether that means attending once over the course of the year, once a month, once a week, or signing up to serve on the rotation of officiants.

If you haven't experienced Morning or Evening Prayer before, I wanted to share a little about what it is like. I've written a lot in other places about where it comes from and why we do them, but perhaps you want to know more about what to expect when you come.

First we enter the church to find it quiet. It is a different experience than on Sundays when we enter to find lots of people coming in and saying hello to one another, when we see acolytes getting ready and children settling into St. Nick's Chapel, when Helen offers us an organ prelude and we look through the service program at announcements. Instead, on the weekdays we encounter a still and calming--yet powerful--presence of quiet.

We then find a seat up near the altar in the Corpus Christi chapel below the stained glass triptych of Jesus on the cross. Normally 2-5 people are in attendance. Candles are lit, the church bells sing, and we quietly prepare ourselves for prayer. Rather than using a service program we use The Book of Common Prayer itself, guided to each page number by the officiant. We start with a confession and absolution and some opening Psalms. Then we hear two passages of Scripture, one from the Old Testament and one from the New Testament. We continue with the Apostle's Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and other beautifully crafted prayers from the prayer book. Then we add our own prayers either silently or aloud, naming before God everyone on our parish prayer list and the events of the day on our calendar. We close with a prayer of thanksgiving and then greet one another and sometimes spend a little time in conversation. The whole thing last about 25-30 minutes.

This pattern of prayer is one that has been used for almost 2,000 years of Christianity. It is very simple, but profoundly transformative. In sharing in these prayers we are shaped by Scripture, and our ability to remember the presence of God throughout our day is sharpened. We read aloud all 150 Psalms every seven weeks and hear all of Scripture every two years. The purpose of Morning and Evening prayer is less about the individual and more about the Church praying for the needs of the community, however the individual's personal faith life deeply benefits from our shared prayer as well.

For most of us when we leave the Church on Sunday we go to lunch and spend the afternoon in leisure with family or working on home projects. For weekday Morning and Evening Prayer, many of us leave and go straight to work or we come straight from work where we hold a long list of tasks and appointments and often stress. For many of us, we don't go to Church on weekdays because of those obligations. There is too much to do! But isn't that exactly why it would be so beneficial for us to participate in the prayers of the Church on weekdays? Isn't that when we most need the prayers? What would it look like to begin or end our day of obligations and responsibilities in the quiet stillness of God's presence at St. Peter's?

I'm not a morning person. I wake up with my groggy brain overwhelmed with the coming day's tasks and a desire to snooze the alarm and roll over. Morning Prayer at St. Peter's is the place where I lay down all of that at the altar of God and pick up the peace I need to go about my day.

I pray you'll consider supporting our parish commitment to Morning and Evening Prayer in the coming year as we lift up the world's concerns to God which so desperately need our prayer. I hope you'll also consider coming for your own needs, that you might find yourself refreshed and strengthened for the work of each day.

Let me tell you about my surgery. OH, NO!!! Not that! Let's start over. Dear members and friends of Saint Peter's. Thank you so very much for your notes, cards, prayers, and visits during my recent recovery. Because of your love and support I never felt that I was alone or separated from you. You raised me up when I need it most, and now I look forward to seeing you in the near future.

During my recovery there were several days I cannot recall at all, but there were also some times that I will always remember with thanksgiving. There was my new friend I knew only as Mi Amigo. All he needed to brighten your smile along with his for the day was a friendly "Que tal" (how are you). There was the young lady with whom I had the opportunity to discuss our mutual admiration for the Gospel music of CeCe Winans. If you have never heard CeCe, listen to her music sometime on the web. She has a talent that rivals that of the late, great Mahalia Jackson. And, yes, I actually got to sing an Elvis Presley song on one occasion. I chose "I Can't Help Falling in Love with You."

But as memorable as those occasions were, they were not what left the greatest impression on me. Not for one second do I believe that God was responsible for my accident. However, maybe God was thinking, well as long as he has to recover anyway, he might as well learn something. That is when the miracle happened. You see I entered the hospital and rehab with a broken hip. I left with a renewed understanding that despite all the tragedy in this world, it is filled with countless people full of compassion and unconditional love. Many people ministered to me in many ways. Ironically it is often those with the worst jobs and the most work who are first by your side. They are not without their own challenges, but they have a deep rooted faith that is much like a palm tree. When the storms come they bend, but they do not break. I learned to say thank you more times than I can remember.

There were other gifts given to me. When facing the potholes and storms of life, if you can meet them with faith that is a wonderful thing. However, if you are unable to muster even the slightest amount of faith please do not despair. God will still be there. God rejoices in our faith, but God will meet us where we are, full of faith or with none at all. You see grace is truly amazing. From our first breath to our last God is walking beside us whether we are aware of it or not. 

DID YOU KNOW ST. PETER'S HAS A HEARING LOOP?

Did you know that our church building has a hearing loop? What, you may ask, is a hearing loop?

"An induction loop, or hearing loop, is a wire that "loops" around a room or space and connects to a sound system. The wire produces a signal in a magnetic field that is "picked up" by the Telecoil in the user's hearing aids."


This wire sends out a signal directly to your hearing aids - if your aids include a telecoil (the receiver for the hearing loop). If you have a hearing aid, you know that your hearing is not completely restored and that it is frequently difficult to understand words even when you can hear them. With the hearing loop, voices are crystal clear. If you don't know if your hearing aid has a telecoil, ask your audiologist. If you are in the market for a new hearing aid, consider asking about including one.

Anyone using a microphone in the church is connected to this loop making the readings, the sermon, and the announcements easy to understand.

My husband and I always connect to the loop when we enter the nave. We connect to the loop through an app on our phones. From there, we can increase or decrease the volume as well as balance the sounds coming from the loop with the sounds that are not transmitted by the loop.


As an aside, many movie theaters and other public spaces are also "looped". Look for this sign indicating a hearing loop is available.


