We Explore God's Word

Hymn: Praise My Soul, the King of Heaven (H1982 #410)

Praise, my soul, the King of heaven; to his feet thy tribute bring; ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, evermore his praises sing: Alleluia, alleluia! Praise the everlasting King.

Celebrant Welcome in the name of God who is Thoughtful Creator, Good Shepherd, and Guiding Breath.

People Glory to God for ever and ever. Amen.

We gather in the name of the triune (three-in-one) God with a greeting, saying hello to God and one another.

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

COLLECT OF THE DAY

Celebrant: God is with you.

People: God is also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

O God, you are the protector of all who trust in you. Have mercy upon us, that we may pass through things that are temporary, and not lose those things which are eternal. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

In this prayer called the "collect," the priest "collects" or "gathers" the themes of the lesson, the season, and the congregation.

THE READINGS (seated)

The First Lesson: Colossians 2:6-15

You have accepted Christ Jesus as your Lord. Now keep on following him. Plant your roots in Christ and let him be the foundation for your life. Be strong in your faith, just as you were taught. And be grateful.

Don't let anyone fool you by using senseless arguments. These arguments may sound wise, but they are only human teachings. They come from the powers of this world and not from Christ.

God lives fully in Christ. And you are fully grown because you belong to Christ, who is over every power and authority. Christ has also taken away your selfish desires, just as circumcision removes flesh from the body. And when you were baptized, it was the same as being buried with Christ. Then you were raised to life because you had faith in the power of God, who raised Christ from death. You were dead, because you were sinful and were not God's people. But God let Christ make you alive, when he forgave all our sins.

God wiped out the charges that were against us for disobeying the Law of Moses. He took them away and nailed them to the cross. There Christ defeated all powers and forces. He let the whole world see them being led away as prisoners when he celebrated his victory.

Lector The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

The Gospel: Luke 11:1-13

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When Jesus had finished praying, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his followers to pray."

So Jesus told them, "Pray in this way:

'Father, help us to honor your name.

Come and set up your kingdom.

Give us each day the food we need.

Forgive our sins, as we forgive everyone

who has done wrong to us.

And keep us from being tempted.'"

Then Jesus went on to say:

Suppose one of you goes to a friend in the middle of the night and says, "Let me borrow three loaves of bread. A friend of mine has dropped in, and I don't have a thing for him to eat." And suppose your friend answers, "Don't bother me! The door is bolted, and my children and I are in bed. I cannot get up to give you something."

He may not get up and give you the bread, just because you are his friend. But he will get up and give you as much as you need, simply because you are not ashamed to keep on asking.

So I tell you to ask and you will receive, search and you will find, knock and the door will be opened for you. Everyone who asks will receive, everyone who searches will find, and the door will be opened for everyone who knocks. Which one of you fathers would give your hungry child a snake if the child asked for a fish? Which one of you would give your child a scorpion if the child asked for an egg? As bad as you are, you still know how to give good gifts to your children. But your heavenly Father is even more ready to give the Holy Spirit to anyone who asks.

[Pause – say out loud or think quietly of things for

which you want to say "thank you" to God]

Leader We say, "Thank you so much, God."

People Thank you so much, God.

Leader Now we pray for those we know who are sick or

hurt, or who have died, especially Robert Manee. [Pause – say out loud or think quietly of the names of

people—or animals—who are sick or hurt or who have died.]

Leader We say, "God is with them."

People God is with them.

Leader We pray for people or situations that make us

feel worried, afraid, mad, or sad.

[Pause – say out loud or think quietly of things that make you worried, afraid, mad, or sad. Hold them up to God.]

We pray for the special needs and concerns of this

congregation.

Leader We say, "Help us God, we trust in you."

People Help us God, we trust in you.

"Intercessory" Prayer asking God to help the people we care about—is an important and ancient part of worship. We thank God for the wonderful people and things in our lives and ask God to help us when the people we love or sick or have died, or when we are worried or sad. We say the Prayers of the People together, so feel free to be bold and speak up at any point during our prayer time.

THE PEACE

Celebrant The peace of the Lord is always with you.

People And also with you.

WELCOME & ANNOUNCEMENTS

Prayer for birthdays, anniversaries, and milestones: Watch over your children, O Lord, as their days increase; bless and guide them wherever they may be. Strengthen them when they stand; comfort them when discouraged or sorrowful; raise them up if they fall; and in their hearts may your peace which passes understanding abide all the days of their lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

We greet one another in the love of Christ, saying "Peace" or "The Peace of the Lord." You can use a handshake, hug, or kiss with your family; try a wave, a peace sign, a bow—or something more creative—with those around you and around the church.

THE OFFERTORY



The congregation is invited to offer gifts to God through the mission of St. Peter's. Our ushers will pass an offering basin for your gifts, or you may give online using the QR code to your left or on our website. Thank you for your ministry of giving.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

Celebrant The Lord is with you.

People The Lord is also with you.

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Celebrant It is always right to give you thanks, God our Creator, loving and faithful, holy and strong. For by water and the Holy Spirit you have made us a new people in Jesus Christ our Lord, to show forth your glory in all the world. We thank you and praise you and join the choir of angels as we sing these words:

All singing together (H1982 S-124)

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Celebrant On the night before he died, Jesus shared a meal with

his friends. He took bread and thanked you. He broke

it, and shared it with his friends, saying:

All This is my body, given for you. Whenever you eat it, do this to remember me.

Celebrant After the meal, Jesus took a cup filled with wine. He

thanked you, and shared it with his friends, saying:

All This is my blood, shed for you. Whenever you drink it, do this to remember me.

Celebrant Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

When we move to the Table, we've entered the second part of the service. Here we tell the story of Jesus' meal with his friends.

The prayer we are using has you, the congregation, join with the priest in blessing this meal. If you want to, you can also join in the motions the priest is making with his hands. What do you think these motions mean?

This part is called the "Epiclesis," which means the summoning or calling of the Holy Spirit. This is included in every Eucharistic Prayer. Celebrant Holy God, visit us now by the power of your Spirit

in this bread and this wine, making them the Body and Blood of Christ, the feast of heaven here on

earth.

All Make us holy as well, bringing us close to you in love and peace as long as we live on earth.

Celebrant All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ; by

him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty

God, now and for ever.

All AMEN.

Celebrant And now, in the words that Jesus taught

us, we are bold to say,

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name,

thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

Celebrant We break this bread to share in the Body of Christ.

People We who are many are one body, for we

all share in the one bread.

Celebrant This is God's table. Jesus is the host. We

are the guests. Share in God's holy gifts

for God's holy people.

Many people make the sign of the cross on themselves before receiving the bread or wine, and many respond "Amen" after

This is known as

the "Great Amen."

Amen here means

"yes" or "so be it!" It is when we all

join our voices together to affirm

(say yes to) the

that have come

before

prayers and words

receiving—what you do is up to you.

You are invited to receive communion this morning, an ancient practice intended for all baptized Christians, no matter your tradition. You may receive just the bread (which is full participation in the sacrament), or both the bread and the wine by sipping directly from the chalice. You may also receive by intinction, in which case the minister will dip the bread in the chalice for you. You may receive the bread in your hand or on your tongue.

Gluten-free wafers are available; please make your need known to the minister.

If you would prefer not to receive communion, you may also come forward and cross your arms over your chest for a blessing.

Communion Hymn: For the Bread Which You Have Broken (H1982 #341)

For the bread which you have broken, for the wine which you have poured, for the words which you have spoken, now we give you thanks, O Lord.

By this pledge, Lord, that you love us, by your gift of peace restored, by your call to heaven above us, hallow all our lives, O Lord.

As our blessed ones adore you, seated at our Father's board, may the Church still waiting for you keep love's tie unbroken, Lord.

In your service, Lord, defend us; in our hearts keep watch and ward, in the world to which you send us let your kingdom come, O Lord.

A FINAL PRAYER AND A BLESSING

All Holy God, we thank you for being present here in the Communion we shared, and for this taste of your feast. We pray that you will be in our minds and hearts as we leave this place, showing us the best way to go and giving us the strength and courage to follow it. Amen.
