We gather in the name of the triune (three-in-one) God with a greeting, saying hello to God and one another.

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

COLLECT OF THE DAY

Celebrant: God is with you. People: God is also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

O God, you declare your almighty power chiefly in showing mercy and pity: Grant us the fullness of your grace, that we, running to obtain your promises, may become partakers of your heavenly treasure. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

In this prayer called the "collect," the priest "collects" or "gathers" the themes of the lesson, the season, and the congregation.

THE READINGS (seated)

The First Lesson: Jeremiah 32:1-3a, 6-15

The Lord spoke to me in the tenth year that Zedekiah was king of Judah, which was the eighteenth year that Nebuchadnezzar was king of Babylonia. At that time, the Babylonian army had surrounded Jerusalem, and I was in the prison at the courtyard of the palace guards. Zedekiah had ordered me to be held there because I told everyone that the Lord had said: I am the Lord, and I am about to let the king of Babylonia conquer Jerusalem.

Later, when I was in prison, the Lord said:

Jeremiah, your cousin Hanamel, the son of your uncle Shallum, will visit you. He must sell his field near the town of Anathoth, and because you are his nearest relative, you have the right and the responsibility to buy it and keep it in the family.

Hanamel came, just as the Lord had promised. And he said, "Please buy my field near Anathoth in the territory of the Benjamin tribe. You have the right to buy it, and if you do, it will stay in our family."

The Lord had told me to buy it from Hanamel, and so I did. The price was 17 pieces of silver, and I weighed out the full amount on a scale. I had two copies of the bill of sale written out: an official copy containing the details of our agreement and another copy, without the details. Some witnesses and I signed the official copy, which was folded and tied, before being sealed shut with hot wax. Then I gave Hanamel the silver. And while he, the witnesses, and all the other Jews sitting in the courtyard were still watching, I gave both copies to Baruch son of Neriah.

I told Baruch that the Lord had said:

Take both copies of this bill of sale, one sealed shut and the other open, and put them in a clay jar so they will last a long time. I am the Lord All-Powerful, the God of Israel, and I promise you that people will once again buy and sell houses, farms, and vineyards in this country.

Lector The Word of the Lord. People: **Thanks be to God.**

The Second Lesson: 1 Timothy 6:6-19

And religion does make your life rich, by making you content with what you have. We didn't bring anything into this world, and we won't take anything with us when we leave. So we should be satisfied just to have food and clothes. People who want to be rich fall into all sorts of temptations and traps. They are caught by foolish and harmful desires that drag them down and destroy them. The love of money causes all kinds of trouble. Some people want money so much they have given up their faith and caused themselves a lot of pain.

Timothy, you belong to God, so keep away from all these evil things. Try your best to please God and to be like him. Be faithful, loving, dependable, and gentle. Fight a good fight for the faith and claim eternal life. God offered it to you when you clearly told about your faith, while so many people listened. Now I ask you to make a promise. Make it in the presence of God, who gives life to all, and in the presence of Christ Jesus, who openly told Pontius Pilate about his faith. Promise to obey completely and fully all that you have been told until our Lord Jesus Christ returns.

The glorious God is the only Ruler, the King of kings and Lord of lords. At the time that God has already decided, he will send Jesus Christ back again. Only God lives forever! And he lives in light that no one can come near. No human has ever seen God 0r ever can see him. God will be honored, and his power will last forever. Amen.

Warn the rich people of this world not to be proud or to trust in wealth that is easily lost. Tell them to have faith in God, who is rich and blesses us with everything we need to enjoy life. Instruct them to do as many good deeds as they can and to help everyone. Remind the rich to be generous and share what they have. This will lay a solid foundation for the future, so they will know what true life is like.

Lector The Word of the Lord. People **Thanks be to God.**

The Gospel: Luke 16:19-31

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

There was once a rich man who wore expensive clothes and every day ate the best food. But a poor beggar named Lazarus was brought to the gate of the rich man's house. He was happy just to eat the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. His body was covered with sores, and dogs kept coming up to lick them. The poor man died, and angels took him to the place of honor next to Abraham.

The rich man also died and was buried. He went to Hades and was suffering terribly. When he looked up and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side, he said to Abraham, "Have pity on me! Send Lazarus to dip his finger in water and touch my tongue. I'm suffering terribly in this fire."

Abraham answered, "My friend, remember that while you lived, you had everything good, and Lazarus had everything bad. Now he is happy, and you are in pain. And besides, there is a deep ditch between us, and no one from either side can cross over."

But the rich man said, "Abraham, then please send Lazarus to my father's home. Let him warn my five brothers, so they won't come to this horrible place."

Abraham answered, "Your brothers can read what Moses and the prophets wrote. They should pay attention to that."

Then the rich man said, "No, that's not enough! If only someone from the dead would go to them, they would listen and turn to God."

So Abraham said, "If they won't pay attention to Moses and the prophets, they won't listen even to someone who comes back from the dead."

[Pause – say out loud or think quietly of things for

which you want to say "thank you" to God|

Leader We say, "Thank you so much, God."

People Thank you so much, God.

Leader Now we pray for those we know who are sick or

hurt, or who have died, especially Arthur Tidwell,

and Carole and Mac McBee.

|Pause - say out loud or think quietly of the names of

people—or animals—who are sick or hurt or who have died.]

Leader We say, "God is with them."

People God is with them.

"Intercessory" Prayer asking God to help the people we care about—is an important and ancient part of worship. We thank God for the wonderful people and things in our lives and ask God to help us when the people we love or sick or have died, or when we are worried or sad. We say the Prayers of the People together, so feel free to be bold and speak up at any point during our prayer time.

Leader We pray for people or situations that make us

feel worried, afraid, mad, or sad.

[Pause – say out loud or think quietly of things that make you worried, afraid, mad, or sad. Hold them up to God.]

We pray for the special needs and concerns of this

congregation.

Leader We say, "Help us God, we trust in you."

People Help us God, we trust in you.

THE PEACE

Celebrant The peace of the Lord is always with you.

People And also with you.

Prayer for birthdays, anniversaries, and milestones: Watch over your children, O Lord, as their days increase; bless and guide them wherever they may be.

Strengthen them when they stand; comfort them when discouraged or sorrowful; raise them up if they fall; and in their hearts may your peace which passes understanding abide all the days of their lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

We greet one another in the love of Christ, saying "Peace" or "The Peace of the Lord." You can use a handshake, hug, or kiss with your family; try a wave, a peace sign, a bow—or something more creative—with those around you and around the church.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

Celebrant The Lord is with you.

People The Lord is also with you.

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.People It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Celebrant It is always right to give you thanks, God our Creator, loving and faithful, holy and strong. For you are the source of light and life, you made us in your image, and called us to new life in Jesus Christ our Lord. We thank you and praise you and join the choir of angels as we sing these words:

All singing together (H1982 S-124)

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Celebrant On the night before he died, Jesus shared a meal with his friends. He took bread and thanked you. He broke

it, and shared it with his friends, saying:

All This is my body, given for you. Whenever you eat it, do this to remember me.

Celebrant After the meal, Jesus took a cup filled with wine. He

thanked you, and shared it with his friends, saying:

All This is my blood, shed for you. Whenever you drink it, do this to remember me.

Celebrant Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

When we move to the Table, we've entered the second part of the service. Here we tell the story of Jesus' meal with his friends.

The prayer we are using has you, the congregation, join with the priest in blessing this meal. If you want to, you can also join in the motions the priest is making with his hands. What do you think these motions mean?

This part is called the "Epiclesis," which means the summoning or calling of the Holy Spirit. This is included in every Eucharistic Prayer. Celebrant Holy God, visit us now by the power of your Spirit

in this bread and this wine, making them the Body and Blood of Christ, the feast of heaven here on

earth.

All Make us holy as well, bringing us close to you in love and peace as long as we live on earth.

Celebrant All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ; by

him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty

God, now and for ever.

All AMEN.

This is known as the "Great Amen." Amen here means "yes" or "so be it!" It is when we all join our voices together to affirm (say yes to) the prayers and words that have come before

Celebrant And now, in the words that Jesus taught us, we are bold to say,

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

Celebrant We break this bread to share in the Body of Christ.

People We who are many are one body, for we

all share in the one bread.

Celebrant This is God's table. Jesus is the host. We

are the guests. Share in God's holy gifts

for God's holy people.

Many people make the sign of the cross on themselves before receiving the bread or wine, and many respond "Amen" after receiving—what you do is up to you.

You are invited to receive communion this morning, an ancient practice intended for all baptized Christians, no matter your tradition. You may receive just the bread (which is full participation in the sacrament), or both the bread and the wine by sipping directly from the chalice. You may also receive by intinction, in which case the minister will dip the bread in the chalice for you. You may receive the bread in your hand or on your tongue.

Gluten-free wafers are available; please make your need known to the minister.

If you would prefer not to receive communion, you may also come forward and cross your arms over your chest for a blessing.
