

Surrey County Hockey Association First Aid Policy, Procedures & Guidelines

These guidelines apply to all Surrey County Hockey Association (SCHA) players, staff, and any patrons, guests, or visitors using SCHA-sublet facilities.

Roles & Responsibilities

- 1. There is no resident first-aid personnel at any SCHA facility.
- 2. Each Head Coach is responsible for maintaining a first-aid kit at all training sessions and matches.
- 3. Each squad should have at least one qualified first aider present at every game or training session.
- 4. All players participate at their own risk. Coaches should remind players to wear recommended safety equipment (gumshields, shin pads, face masks where appropriate).

Health Declarations & Medical Information

- 1. At the start of each season, parents/guardians of all squad members must provide up-to-date medical and emergency contact information via the SCHA website.
- 2. This information must be accessible to Head and Assistant Coaches and stored securely offline (e.g., a paper copy held by the Head Coach) in case online access fails
- 3. All personal data must be handled in compliance with data protection laws.

First Aid Kits & Provision

- 1. Each squad must have a first-aid kit on hand for all training sessions and matches home and away.
- 2. First aid kits should be regularly checked and restocked. The Head Coach is responsible either for restocking (and reclaiming expenses) or notifying admin of needed items.
- 3. At least one person present at each session or match should hold a valid first-aid qualification, with certification kept current.

Guidelines for Dealing with an Incident / Accident

- 1. Stay calm and act swiftly. Assess the situation for danger or further injuries.
- 2. If necessary, evacuate the pitch calmly and ensure the rest of the group is adequately supervised.
- 3. Listen to the injured person and provide first aid as appropriate.
- 4. For serious injuries requiring specialist treatment, call emergency services immediately. Do not move someone with major injuries unless they are in danger of further harm.



- 5. Contact the injured person's parent, guardian, or next of kin.
- 6. Complete an incident/accident report form (Appendix 1) and leave it in the designated envelope in the clubhouse.
- 7. As a member club of England Hockey, serious injuries should also be reported through EH's online Injury Monitoring system.

Risk Assessment & Emergency Preparedness

- 1. Coaches or organisers must conduct a brief risk assessment of the venue before every session (pitch condition, access to phones, emergency services, etc.).
- 2. Ensure reliable communication is available to contact emergency services.
- 3. Where feasible, maintain access to a defibrillator or AED in line with EH guidance.

- 1. From the main gates, proceed to the mini roundabout and turn right. Follow the road past the pitches and The Close boarding house.
- 2. Contact School Duty Cover if calling an ambulance (via the Cricket Centre or Surrey Administrator).
