### Notes from Pastor Carl:

Believe it or not, I used to be the sort of fellow who felt that if you have a schedule you must stick to it; if you plan to be somewhere at a specific time, you do



whatever it takes to be on time. Why did I act that way? I don't know—maybe it's a control issue. My obsession about being on time annoyed Terry, but she and others helped me get over it.

Several years ago I accompanied a mission group from the First Presbyterian Church in Harrison, Arkansas, on a trip to the Navajo reservation in Chinle, Arizona. Our host was the

Trinity Presbyterian Church of Chinle. Our young people led Vacation Bible School all week, while the adults did repairs and renovations to the church property. We slept on the floor in their fellowship hall and cooked our meals in their kitchen. At the end of our workweek on Sunday morning we were to gather for worship with the local congregation in their beautiful sanctuary and I was to preach that morning. It is hard enough to preach a sermon to people you don't really know, but it was even more difficult dealing with language and cultural barriers. The service was supposed to begin at ten o'clock in the morning, and according to the order of worship that I had written, the music was to begin at 10:00 straight up. It did not. I was already nervous, but when nothing happened at 10:00 my nervousness increased. When the clock rolled on to 10:30 I was really getting anxious. No one was in the sanctuary. There were some people there, but they were milling around in front of the church, in the parking lot, and in the narthex. By 11:00 I was a basket case, I didn't know what to do, how to invite people to come in and take a seat so we could begin worship—I was totally out of my element—I was totally out of control.

At ten past eleven something remarkable happened—it was as if someone had given a secret signal because suddenly everyone began to move into the sanctuary, to take their seats, and a woman went up and sat at the piano and began to play. The worship service was beginning and I wasn't sure how or why, but with sweat running down my brow and my stomach in knots, I stood to lead God's people in worship. After the service (including my mediocre sermon) I stood at the door of the church and shook the hands of the faithful Navajo Presbyterians. Then one of the elders came up to me and said he had noticed that I looked anxious. I told him I wasn't sure if the worship service was ever going to get started.

Then he told me something very important, "Here, in this church, worship will not begin until the Chief arrives." They were all waiting patiently for the arrival of their chief. A valuable lesson learned—worship will begin when it is time to begin.

This lesson has had a powerful influence on me far beyond the Navajo cultural context, it is a maxim I have come to appreciate and apply to much of life, especially my spiritual life. Things do not always happen when I think they should. Things happen—will happen—when God judges it to be the right time, or as Scripture often puts it, "In the fullness of time." The bottom line is this: I am not in control—God is.

Since that Sunday morning years ago, the lesson has helped get me though some potentially difficult times. It is such a blessing to know that I am not expected to be in control, that I can rest in the assurance of God's providence and God's timing.

The season of Advent, is a season of waiting, and it has begun. And together we will move slowly toward the celebration of our Savior's birth in a stable, in a small town just a few miles south of Jerusalem. The nation of Israel had been waiting for centuries for God's anointed messiah to arrive. And the arrival of our Redeemer, Jesus Christ, happened just at the right moment; in the fullness of time. It came about when God was ready.

The total of the PC(USA) Peace and Global Witness offering was \$656. Twenty-five percent of that offering was donated to Lake Hamilton School District's The New Horizon A. L. E.



On October 31, the volunteer team of Mary Lynn Cole, Steven Smith, Karen Wacaster, and Tommy Waddell prepared and distributed 150 lunches for the Jackson House lunch program.

Due to the government shutdown and holiday season being near, we acknowledge that more people will need food assistance. Therefore, our committee decided to donate \$2000 to Jackson House from our *Missions Funded from Bequests* to support their food supplies to help those in need.

The committee decided the recipients of the 4th Quarter Mission General fund are:

- \$250 to Ouachita River Correctional Unit Chaplain Fund for Christmas
- \$250 to University of Ozarks for student enrichment
- \$250 to Potter's Clay
- \$250 to Tuggle Clinic for homeless care

Our annual Mitten tree will be up in the narthex during the Advent Season. Please help decorate the tree with new mittens, gloves, hats, mufflers, scarves for children and adults. The donated items will be delivered to Jackson House for them to include as a part of their Christmas gifts.

On December 21 and subsequent weeks, PC(USA) Joy Offering will be received. This offering will be used for providing comfort to church leaders, building up the future of the church, and supporting leadership development.

December and January Dollar giving is designated to purchase small space heaters for donating to Jackson House.
