

Monica's Prayers

We often talk about the power of prayer. Our style of praying might be very formal at times and at other times be very casual – perhaps too casual we sometimes fear. Through the spirituals of black slaves, we learn of its power to change things. They often spoke of God "making a way" when there seemed to be no way forward. With many stories like this one, the Church finds reason to seek change through prayer.

We pray for change at times when we do not seem to have the power to make things happen. We seek God's help.

St. Augustine's mother, Monica, provides a story for the power of prayer. Born on a Sunday, November 13, 354, Augustine grew up in Thagaste, North Africa. His father, Patricius, was a stern man. Pagan in religion Patricius was a typical Roman citizen living in the provinces. Patricius married Monica. Monica was a devout Christian.

Monica wanted her son to know Jesus, but only God can change someone's heart.

She began praying about this. From Augustine's youth he wanted to be more like his father. This included being a pagan. As he grew older, his father's influence and the influence of the society of Thagaste played major roles in the path Augustine chose. Instead of marrying, he took a woman to be his mistress. Roman law forbid people of unequal social status to marry. The woman became his mistress instead. Monica prayed.

Showing great intellect and work ethic, the young Augustine decided to move to Rome. He left his mistress in North Africa. In Rome he attended a university studying rhetoric. Soon after enrolling, Agustine found another mistress. His mother continued to pray.

Although Augustine was brilliant, he looked like many other men of his day in his attitudes and behavior. He did possess a keen intellect, and he noticed the injustices of lots of their practices. For these reasons he found the Apostle Paul interesting, what could this Jewish man from the backwaters of the Roman Empire offer to educated people in Rome? Yet despite his reservations, Paul's words moved him in heart and mind. Augustine was so moved by them he once prayed, "Lord, change me, but not yet." God was working in Augustine. Monica continued to pray.

We know these details of Augustine's life, because he shares them in his famous work known as "Confessions." He wrote about the prayers of his mother and how those prayers were eventually answered. He goes into tremendous detail about his spiritual journey. Beginning with the time before he knew Christ and continuing into the time he becomes famous as a Christian bishop. In his own words he looks to his mother's prayers as instrumental in helping him find his way.

First Sunday of Advent, November 30, 2025 Scripture Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul. —Hebrews 6:19

There's an old story of a woman who, nearing the end of her life, asked to be buried with a fork in her hand. When asked why, she said: "At church dinners, after the meal was cleared, someone would always lean over and say, 'Keep your fork.' It meant something better was coming — dessert! I want people to see the fork and remember that the best is yet to come."

This is what hope looks like. Even after a long life full of both blessings and trials, the Christian can still say with confidence: "The best is yet to come."

Advent is the season when hope lights the first candle, pushing back the long shadows of the year. But what is hope?

Hope isn't wishful thinking. It's not crossing our fingers and hoping for the best. Real hope is anchored in the faithfulness of God.

Many of us know from experience that life is filled with seasons — seasons of illness, lone-liness, loss or waiting — when hope feels hard to hold onto. Seniors especially have known the long wait for answered prayers, for healing or for reconciliation. Yet it is precisely in these seasons that Advent speaks the loudest.

Theologian Karl Barth once said: "What other time or season can or will the church ever have but that of Advent?" In other words, all of life, in a sense, is lived in Advent — in the waiting, in the longing, in the trusting that God is still at work even when we can't yet see all God has promised.

Today, we wait — not for a Savior to be born, but for a Savior to return. And while we wait, we live in hope — a hope that has roots deeper than circumstances.

The apostle Paul prays for believers to be so full of God's hope that it overflows: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (Romans 15:13).

As we light the first candle of Advent, remember: Your hope is not behind you. It's still ahead. God's promises have no expiration date. —Timothy Merrill

Prayer: God of Hope, kindle in our hearts a flame that never dies. Fill us with joy and peace in believing. Let our hope overflow, because the best truly is yet to come. In Jesus' name, Amen.





Celebrate the season of gratitude by creating a colorful Thankful decoration.

What you need:

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- Pencil, marker, or crayons
- Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- Spray bottle filled with water
- Real leaves (Optional)
- Wooden or plastic beads, ocereal with holes (Cheerios, Froot Loops, etc.), or any dried pasta with a hole (Optional)

What you do:

- Draw or trace leaf shapes onto construction paper.
- Lay the paper flat and spray with water until the paper is completely wet.
- 3. Crumple the wet paper into balls.
- 4. Open the paper and let the sheets dry flat.
- 5. When dry, cut out each leaf.
- On each leaf, write the name of one person or thing you're thankful for.
- 7. Punch a hole in each leaf.
- 8. Lace the leaves, beads, cereal, and pasta onto the yarn, ribbon, or raffia.
- 9. Tie the ends and hang your garland.




