

Born July 24, 1979, in South Memphis, Tennessee, Dr. JB Blocker IV is the son of the late JB Blocker III and Shirley Louis Blocker. A lifelong Memphian, he continues to reside in the city's outskirts with his wife, Ashley Evette Blocker, and their children, Rodney Lacey Jr. and Zharia Elyse.

A proud graduate of Westwood High School, Dr. Blocker earned his bachelor's degree from LeMoyne-Owen College, supported by AmeriCorps scholarships for his community outreach in South Memphis. His early career included work with emotionally disturbed youth at Youth Villages Dogwood and roles in Memphis City Schools, culminating in a part-time Art teaching position at E.E. Jeter Elementary. In 2004, he became Shelby County Schools' first Fine Arts Instructional Facilitator, where he led curriculum design, professional development, and district-wide initiatives for art educators.

Dr. Blocker's academic achievements span over a decade, during which he earned a Master of Arts in Education, an Education Specialist degree in Administration, and a Doctorate in Curriculum & Instruction from Union University. He also completed principalship training through the University of Memphis Leadership Fellows program and holds multiple professional education licenses.

His administrative career has included appointments as Assistant Principal of Southwind High School, Student Services Supervisor, and Senior Manager of Attendance, Equity, & Discipline at Memphis Shelby County Schools (MSCS). Currently, Dr. Blocker leads as Executive Director of School Operations for Haywood County Schools, overseeing departments such as Health, Nutrition, Safety & Security, and Transportation. He directs seven department heads and a team of over 120 staff members.

A champion for equity and excellence, Dr. Blocker believes educational leaders must illuminate the full potential of students and educators, especially in underserved communities. His published research on Positive Behavior Intervention strategies underscores his commitment to actionable, data-informed educational reform.

Session Title: Life on the Street: From the School House to the Jail House

In 1991, I was charged with the following crime: possession with the intent to deliver 650 grams of cocaine. At the time of my conviction, there was a mandatory minimum for this crime. I had no other criminal history or any misdemeanors. After serving 18 years in state prison Jennifer Granholm, who was the Governor of Michigan at that time, chose to give me a commutation of sentence. I was placed on 5 years parole. I chose to do my parole out of state (in Northern Mississippi) in order to change my environment. The Parole Agents of Mississippi were impressed on how I came out of prison and found employment with a temporary agency and completed my parole without any problems. To be more specific, I became a Regional Manager that managed well over 2,100 Walmart Studios. I transitioned from that position and became a Vice President of a Cellular Tower Company (Signal Source). In that role, I worked with many top competitors in the Cell Tower Business: AT&T, C-Spire, T-Mobile, etc. The management experience led me to start my own company in which I serve as the CEO/President. My company is Sources Of Intervention Produce Seeds Of Prevention, a 501(c)(3), fully insured, non-profit committed to train and educate low-income students and adults and provide them with the tools they need to break the cycle of poverty and crime and rise above the social and economic circumstances and the behavior patterns that used to hold them captive.

I am currently Juvenile Court & School Coordinator with Memphis Allies, Previously I was a Drug and Gang Prevention and Interventionist Consultant for Shelby County School System, Auxiliary Probation Officer (APO) for the Shelby County Juvenile Court System, as well as a consultant for the Memphis Police Department, Shelby County Sheriff Department, & Multi-Agency Gang Unit (MGU). Not to mention, I have served as the keynote speaker at many engagements hosted by the U.S. District Attorney focusing on inmates reintegrating back into the community; and I continue to work with the U.S. District Attorney's office on many facets associated with their federal reentry program.

Specifically, the Juvenile Court system also utilizes me frequently to tell my story to the youth to steer them clear of getting involved in gangs and drug selling. I go in and out of the Correctional Facilities (for the Tennessee Department of Corrections) to discuss topics associated with recidivism. I share with the incarcerated men on how possible it is for them to return to society and never returning to prison. My life serves as a tangible example.

Alicia Barnes, DO, MPH, is an Associate Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry in the Department of Psychiatry and Department of Preventive Medicine at The University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center in Memphis. She is also the inaugural Urban Child Institute Endowed Chair of Excellence and Division Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. She previously served as Associate Director of the Center for Youth Advocacy and Well-Being. Her research interests include evaluating programs for mental health and well-being in underserved communities and designing curricula for medical students and residents working with community leaders, members, and clinics.

She received a dual degree, including a Doctorate in Osteopathic Medicine from Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine and a Master's in Public Health from Temple University. She completed her psychiatry residency at Cooper University Hospital in Camden, NJ, and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship at Northwell Hofstra Zucker Hillside Hospital in Queens, NY. Currently, she serves as a Councilor at Large to the Executive Council for the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.

Keynote Speaker Steven J. Mulroy



Shelby County District Attorney Memphis, TN

Steven J. Mulroy is the District Attorney for Shelby County, Tennessee. He was elected DA in August 2022. DA Mulroy oversees a total staff of 238, including more than 110 prosecutors.

He attended Cornell University, graduated with Distinction in All Subjects, then attended William & Mary Law School, where he graduated from Order of the Coif.

In the 1990s he served in the U.S. Justice Department in Washington, D.C., first as a civil rights litigator and later as a federal prosecutor. In 2000, he became a law professor at the University of Memphis, where for 22 years he taught and published in the areas of Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, Constitutional Law, and Civil Rights. During that time, he also engaged in pro bono criminal and civil rights litigation in numerous cases at the trial and appellate level in state and federal court. At the time of his election as DA, he was the Bredesen Professor of Law. Shortly after being sworn in as DA, he became an Emeritus Professor.

Mulroy was elected in 2006 to the Shelby County Commission, where he served for 8 years. While on the County Commission, Mulroy drafted Shelby County's first ethics, living wage, animal welfare, and "cash for tires" ordinances, as well as the first-ever legislation at any level in Tennessee barring LGBT discrimination. He successfully pushed for substantial increases in county funding for homelessness and pre-K education, and an end to the illegal practice of "48-hour holds" of suspects without probable cause. During the body's 2011 redistricting, he led the successful effort to switch from large 3-Commissioner multimember districts to neighborhood-based single-member districts, arguing, among other things, that the latter led to more competitive elections.

Mulroy is the author of *Rethinking US election law: Unskewing the System*, as well as dozens of scholarly articles on criminal law and civil rights. He's published articles in such national publications as SLATE, NEWSWEEK, THE NEW REPUBLIC, SALON, THE HILL, and the HUFFINGTON POST. He's been a legal commentator for MSNBC, Fox News, and CNN, and has testified before Congress and the U.S. Civil Rights Commission. Both his blood type and his chirpy personal motto is B positive.

As the founder of **Deed Literary Works**, Deidra serves as a literary creator, developer, and editor—successfully publishing three authors and helping others bring their stories to life.

Dr. Angela Hargrave is a veteran educator and equity advocate with over 32 years of experience in urban and suburban school districts. She currently serves as the Senior Director of Student Services for the University Schools Innovative School District at the University of Memphis, where she earned her Doctor of Education in Leadership and Policy Studies.

Throughout her career, Dr. Hargrave has held roles as a Special Education teacher, Coordinator, Assistant Principal, and Federal Rights Coordinator. At Shelby County Schools, she founded the Department of Student Equity, Enrollment and Discipline (SEED) and led efforts to ensure all students had equitable access to education and support services. Her work has focused on trauma-informed practices, ACEs awareness, and social-emotional learning, earning her the Friend to Children Award from the Tennessee Association of School Social Workers.

Dr. Hargrave serves on several advisory boards, including the U.S. Department of Education's Regional Advisory Committee, the Tennessee Commission on Children and Youth, and the Shelby County Citizen's Review Panel. She is also a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

A native of Natchez, Mississippi, Dr. Hargrave holds degrees from Grambling State University, the University of Mississippi, Union University, and the University of Memphis. She is married to Jim Hargrave, Jr., and together they are the proud parents and grandparents of four children and two grandsons.



Dr. Russell Dyer returned to Collierville in March 2024 after eight years as Director of Cleveland City Schools. Previously, he served in leadership roles at Collierville and Shelby County Schools, including Chief of Staff (2014–2016).

In Cleveland, he launched an aviation partnership with Tango Flight, enabling students to build an FAA-certified airplane—one of only two such programs in Tennessee. His accolades include the 2023 Community First in Education Award, 2019 Southeast Tennessee Superintendent of the Year, and recognition from the National School Public Relations Association in 2020.

Dr. Dyer has held leadership roles in several professional organizations and served on multiple nonprofit boards. He holds degrees from Lambuth University, Freed-Hardeman University, and Trevecca Nazarene University. An avid outdoorsman, he enjoys hiking, water sports, and mentoring youth through his church.



Dr. Lakira Boyd Elliott is a lifelong Memphian and proud product of Memphis City Schools, currently serving as a transformative leader within Memphis Shelby County Schools (MSCS). Since joining MSCS in 2015, Dr. Elliott has spearheaded numerous student safety and wellbeing initiatives, including Project Prevent, Youth Court, Trust Pays, G.R.A.S.S.Y., Safe Corridor, and other grant-funded programs aimed at reducing youth violence and promoting positive behavior. With a strategic, data-driven approach, Dr. Elliott has successfully implemented programs that have significantly decreased suspensions, expulsions, chronic absenteeism, and truancy.

Dr. Elliott began her career in 2009 with Metro Nashville Public Schools, where she served as a teacher, coordinator, and leadership fellow, leading behavior intervention and prevention efforts. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education from Middle Tennessee State University (Cum Laude), a Master of Education in Instruction, Curriculum, and Assessment, and a Doctor of Education in K-12 Education Leadership (Magna Cum Laude). She also maintains K-6 teaching licensure, K-12 administrative certification, and ESL credentials.

A certified trainer in Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE's), Dr. Elliott also holds certifications in Life Skills, Youth Mental Health First Aid, and Conflict Resolution. She is an active member of the Tennessee Gang Investigators Association and currently serves on both the Memphis and Shelby County Juvenile Justice Board (JJB) and the Juvenile Detention Alternative Institute (JDAI).



Gabriela Toro is the principal of Newcomer International Center in Memphis, TN. Born in Venezuela, at the age of 11 she moved to the United States. Not knowing English when she first moved to Memphis, she persevered and graduated from Ridgeway High school.

She earned her Bachelor's degree from the University of Memphis in Foreign Language and her Master's degree in Secondary Education from Grand Canyon University.

In her last 22 years of work for Memphis Shelby County Schools, she has been a Spanish teacher, Foreign Language Specialist, Assistant Principal and most recently Principal. She is a wife and a mother to her 10-year-old daughter.

Susan is co-founder of Developmental Resources and YouthLight, Inc.

Susan consults and publishes books on how to work with troubled children and adolescents. In 2005, the GED Testing Service awarded Susan with the Cornelius P. Turner Award, presented annually to a GED graduate who has made outstanding contributions to society in education or public, or social service. She has been interviewed by the Arizona Tribune and the Wall Street Journal and numerous radio stations across the country. She has authored and co-authored more than twenty books/programs. Her book on self-injury was recognized in USA Today.

Her latest book, Confronting the Dropout Crisis encourages educators and other professionals to discover and explore the sometimes-unnoticed reasons that youth drop out of school. She dropped out of 8th grade and ran away from home at the age of fourteen. She endured homelessness and survived living in the Maine wilderness. By age nineteen, after having her third child, she finally broke free of the toxic relationship with her daughter's father and had to depend on welfare as her only means of financial support. She struggled as a teen mom but with the help of a mentor, she received her GED. She raised her children alone for ten years while living in poverty. Susan eventually earned several college degrees.



However, a college football injury derailed his dreams, leaving him with no guidance or support. Struggling to provide for his daughter, Melvin turned to selling drugs and was ultimately incarcerated after being injured during a drug deal.

While serving over two years in Ohio State Prison, Melvin vowed to turn his life around and help others avoid the same fate. He developed a plan to support struggling young men, giving them the tools and hope to succeed. After earning a bachelor's degree in Sports Management, Melvin founded PURE Youth Athletic Alliance in 2012, a private non-profit school dedicated to transforming the lives of young men in the city of Memphis.

Under his leadership, PURE Academy has become a beacon of hope, sending countless young men to college, many as first-generation college students, who might never have had the opportunity. Melvin's mission is to instill hope and demonstrate that a better future is always possible, using his own life as proof that transformation is attainable.


