

PROLEGOMENA:

Foundations and Preliminary Considerations in Theology from a Catholic Perspective

Prolegomena refers to the introductory study and preliminary considerations necessary for engaging in theological inquiry.

It lays the groundwork for understanding the broader theological framework and addresses fundamental questions about the nature, sources, and methods of theology.

In Catholicism, prolegomena helps define the scope of theological study, establishes the criteria for interpreting divine revelation, and clarifies the relationship between faith and reason.

THE CATHOLIC UNDERSTANDING OF PROLEGOMENA

In Catholic theology, prolegomena involves addressing key issues that set the stage for systematic theology.

It includes examining the nature of theology itself, the sources of theological knowledge, and the relationship between divine revelation and human understanding.

Prolegomena provides the essential framework within which specific theological doctrines can be studied and understood.

1. THE NATURE OF THEOLOGY

Explanation: Theology, from a Catholic perspective, is the study of God and His revelation to humanity.

It involves both faith and reason and seeks to understand and explain the truths of divine revelation as handed down through Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition.

Theology is a rational discipline that uses human reasoning to comprehend and articulate the mysteries of faith.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) 36 states, "Theology is the study of God and of all that relates to God."

Example: The exploration of the nature of God as a Trinitarian being (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) is a central task of theology.

Understanding how God is revealed in Scripture and Tradition requires careful theological reflection and interpretation.

2. THE SOURCES OF THEOLOGICAL KNOWLEDGE

Explanation: In Catholicism, the primary sources of theological knowledge are Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition.

These sources are complemented by the teachings of the Magisterium (the Church's teaching authority).

Sacred Scripture provides the written record of divine revelation, while Sacred Tradition encompasses the oral teachings and practices passed down through the generations.

The Magisterium interprets these sources authoritatively to safeguard and explain the faith.

The CCC 80 highlights this: "The task of giving an authentic interpretation of the Word of God, whether in its written form or in the form of Tradition, has been entrusted exclusively to the Magisterium of the Church.'

Example: The doctrine of the Immaculate Conception, which teaches that Mary was conceived without original sin, is derived from Sacred Tradition and has been authoritatively defined by the Magisterium.

This doctrine illustrates how theological knowledge is drawn from multiple sources and clarified through Church teaching.

3. THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN FAITH AND REASON

Explanation: Catholic theology maintains that faith and reason are complementary rather than contradictory.

Faith involves belief in divine revelation and acceptance of theological truths, while reason involves the use of logical analysis and philosophical principles to understand and articulate these truths.

The Church teaches that faith is illuminated by reason, and reason is enriched by faith.

The CCC 159 asserts, "Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth."

Example: The natural law, which is understood through reason, complements the moral teachings revealed in Scripture and Tradition.

For instance, the moral understanding of human dignity can be approached both through philosophical reasoning and through theological reflection on divine revelation.



4. METHODOLOGICAL CONSIDERATIONS IN THEOLOGY

Explanation: The methodology of theology involves various approaches to studying and interpreting divine revelation.

This includes historical, exegetical, systematic, and pastoral methods.

Historical theology examines the development of doctrines over time, while exegetical theology focuses on interpreting Scripture.

Systematic theology organizes and synthesizes theological concepts, and pastoral theology applies these concepts to the life of the Church and the faithful.

The CCC 94 emphasizes, "The Church, in her teaching, is committed to preserving and teaching the whole deposit of faith."

Example: The development of the doctrine of the Trinity involved historical and exegetical methods to understand early Church writings and creeds, which were then systematized into a coherent theological framework.

This process highlights how different methodological approaches contribute to a deeper understanding of doctrinal truths.

5. THE ROLE OF REVELATION IN THEOLOGY

Explanation: Divine revelation is central to Catholic theology. It is through revelation that God discloses Himself and His will to humanity.

Theology is fundamentally concerned with interpreting and understanding this revelation, which is recorded in Sacred Scripture and expressed through Sacred Tradition.

The study of theology seeks to explore the implications of revelation for faith and practice.

The CCC 50 states, "God has revealed Himself to man by gradually communicating His own mystery in deeds and in words.'

Example: The revelation of God's covenant with Abraham (Genesis 12:1-3) and its fulfillment in Jesus Christ is a foundational aspect of Catholic theology.

Understanding this revelation involves interpreting the historical and spiritual significance of these events and their impact on salvation history.

- 4. METHODOLOGICAL CONSIDERATIONS IN THEOLOGY: Acts 17:11 - "Now the Berean Jews were of more noble character than those in Thessalonica, for they received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true."
- 5. THE ROLE OF REVELATION IN THEOLOGY: Hebrews 1:1-2 - "In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe."

CONTEMPORARY RELEVANCE OF PROLEGOMENA Prolegomena remains crucial in contemporary Catholic thought as it provides the foundational framework for engaging with theology in an increasingly complex world.

Understanding the nature of theology, the sources of theological knowledge, and the relationship between faith and reason helps Catholics navigate contemporary issues and challenges within a coherent theological context.

In a cultural climate where diverse perspectives often challenge traditional beliefs, prolegomena offers essential tools for grounding theological reflection and ensuring that the study of faith remains anchored in the Church's teachings and practices.

It encourages a rigorous, reflective approach to theology that respects both the integrity of divine revelation and the demands of reasoned inquiry.

Ultimately, prolegomena guides Catholics in their theological exploration, fostering a deeper understanding of God's revelation and its implications for faith and practice.

It ensures that theological inquiry is rooted in a sound methodological approach and remains faithful to the rich tradition of the Church.

Bishop Hicks' Column December 2025 Finding Hope Behind Bars: Becoming Disciples Who Make Disciples in unexpected Places

We celebrate Advent and Christmas as seasons of light and joy, yet sometimes the brightest hope appears in the places we least expect. Over the years, I have found that ministering to those in prison is one of the most unexpected ways to live out the call of my pastoral letter MAKE to be disciples who make disciples.

My first encounter with prison ministry goes back to my volunteer year in Mexico in 1989. A fémale catechist invited me to join her in visiting a large prison. I remember the surprise of walking in with barely any formal checks and feeling a bit baffled and nervous about how I would get out. Yet what stayed with me most was her simple reminder: "They all have names. They are often forgotten, but if you become a priest, remember they exist. See the face of Christ in them!"

Years later, as a seminarian accompanying Cardinal Bernardin to the Cook County Jail for Christmas Mass, I saw that same spirit of discipleship. He had no family in Chicago, yet he found joy in bringing the Eucharist to those often forgotten. He showed me that prison ministry is not simply a duty but a moment of grace. It is a chance to be a disciple who brings Christ's hope to others.

Someone once told me that one of the humbling aspects of ministering in prisons is that the people you serve can never repay you. You do it simply because Christ calls us to recognize His presence in them. In that pure act of service, we quietly plant seeds of faith in hearts that society often overlooks.

Two weeks ago, I had the privilege of celebrating the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and First Holy Communion for four inmates at the Joliet Detention Center. Their deep desire and reverence reminded me again of that woman's wisdom from years ago. They have names, they exist, and they are just as worthy of God's grace. After the Mass, each newly minted Catholic offered a testimonial, thanking those

who brought Christ to them and sharing how lost they felt before being introduced to God and the Church. Their desire to cling to hope and live out their newfound faith inspired me deeply as we gathered in that makeshift prison chapel. Let me highlight the ministry of the growing number of laypeople, deacons, and priests in our Diocese who are living out this call and bringing Christ's love to the incarcerated. And they do it with no fanfare. Truly, no one is writing them thank you notes or sending them gifts for their ministry. We as a Church and as a Diocese should be proud that so many are putting their faith into action through this

In Catholic social teaching, we uphold the dignity of every human being, even those who have sinned or been cast aside by society. As Jesus says in Matthew's Gospel: "Whatever you did for one of the least of these, you did for me. "This is the heart of our mission. To see Christ in the prisoner, the hungry, the thirsty, the unborn, the immigrant, the person with disabilities, the stranger, and all in need. It is a true Christian hope. It is the conviction that Christ is with us always and that every person is worth seeing, knowing, and loving in His name.

In a few weeks, I will celebrate Christmas Mass at the DuPage County Correctional Facility. As I prepare for that Mass, please know that I will carry your intentions with me in prayer. Also, join me in prayer as together we carry that hope not only into the prisons but into every place where

Christ's light is most needed. Our homes, our parishes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, and all the hidden corners of our lives and our world.

May we never overlook the unexpected places where God's grace, hope, and light are waiting to break through and transform us all. For when we see the face of Christ in every person we meet, we fulfill the mission of being disciples who MAKE disciples.
