### THE VALUES OF SAINT AUGUSTINE:

If St. Augustine were to offer his own thoughts on what an Augustinian community should be like, he might suggest these

themes and values:

### INVITATION TO THE INTERIOR LIFE

"Do not go outside yourself, but enter into yourself, for truth dwells in the interior self."

Both Augustine's personal life and his spiritual teaching are dominated by a continual call to interiority.

He contends that it is "inside one's self" where truth is found, and that only in reflection and silence is understanding achieved.

According to Augustine, the visual and the audible of the external world only serve as reminders to the individual, and that learning takes place in the interior world.

The interior activity of contemplation and a search for the Ultimate truth leads us to transcend ourselves to an eventual encounter with God.

### CULTIVATION OF HUMILITY

"Unless humility precedes, accompanies, and follows whatever we do, we will find that we have done little good to rejoice in. Pride will bereft us of everything."

Humility is the root of true charity. It calls us to accept the sacred in ourselves and others. It allows us to recognize that we are human, to accept our place in reality neither making oneself more nor less than what one actually is, and to love all things, but in an appropriate way.

Humility teaches us to see others as equals. "Humility induces us to presume on our own strength and to trust in God."

Humility allows us to listen to others and to see the truth in them.

According to Augustine, the only way to reach an "abiding, active knowledge of the truth is through humility."

### FORMATION OF COMMUNITY

"An Augustinian community is a place where the search for truth takes place in a climate of love and friendship, where one can experience that the 'truth is neither yours nor mine, so that it can belong to the both of us."

In an Augustinian community, the purpose of life is to search for God, the Ultimate truth, not alone, but among friends, who are committed to the same journey.

In such a community "love is at the center and the heart" of every act and interaction, and respect for each person, as children of God, is primary.

Members strive to live in harmony - in a quest for union of mind and heart, to mutual concern for and assistance to each other in every way possible, including fraternal correction, in a spirit of love and understanding.

Members look upon their work as an expression of one's human nature, not as a burden, but in cooperation with the Creator in shaping the world and serving humankind.

Always conscious of the virtues of honesty, integrity, and compassion as fundamental to the Christian way of life, members seek in every effort to work for unity, making justice and peace, the fruits of love, a reality in the Church and in the world.

### CALL TO SACRAMENTAL LIFE

"Every good thing is sealed to us in the celebration of the sacraments."

If "a Catholic community that reflects Augustinian traditions, it nurtures the development of religious faith and practice, develops moral and ethical perspectives and values of its members."

All in this community are invited into the sacramental life that is active participation in an outward expression of one's faith.

Exploration of religion and faith, participation in prayer, liturgy and other forms of communal worship are both respected and encouraged.





Those who have a desire to live an Augustinian life seek to make "unity and peace a reality in the Church and in human society."

It requires a particular expression of faith, of Gospel values - putting aside narrowness and selfishness and becoming "attuned to a broader social love, joining ourselves to others in such ways that we may have only 'one mind, the mind of Christ.'"

### OBLIGATION TO STEWARDSHIP

"The degree to which you are concerned for the common good rather than for your own, is the criterion by which you can judge how much progress you have made."

Stewardship of the common good requires that we willingly accept accountability for others through service to them, without control of them.

In the Catholic tradition, "the Beatitudes teach us the final end to which God calls us, and confront us with decisive choices concerning earthly goods. They teach us [how] to love..."

"Love, when it is true, is always directed away from oneself. It is transcendent. The two-fold commandment of love, therefore, translates into working for the common good, [and] working for the common good is service."

Service in an Augustinian context is done in the spirit of gratefulness and in recognition that the service owed to God must be rendered to humankind.

Service is love in its dynamic dimension.

Service gives expression to Jesus' command, "Love one another as I have loved you."



### The Lifesaving Power of Donating Blood We are in a National Blood Shortage

Donating blood is quiet heroism — a small sacrifice with extraordinary impact.

**The next Holy Ghost Blood Drive is Sunday, Feb.15 after Sunday masses. Join us and just roll up a sleeve! Scan the code to schedule. See you there.**

Every two seconds, someone in the world needs blood. Whether due to surgery, trauma, cancer treatments, or chronic illnesses, there is a constant need. This is why donating blood is one of the most impactful and selfless acts a person can do.

And one donation can help 3 lives!

Donation restrictions have loosened in recent years. If, in the past you were told you cannot donate, it's likely you can now! For example, blood donation is not restricted by ethnicity. Historically if you were born in some European countries, you could not donate blood because some genetic diseases occur more often in some European ethnic groups. Certain blood types and genetic markers common in people of European heritage may better match to local patients with similar heritage.

Also you can donate if you have high blood pressure or diabetes, as long as your blood pressure and blood sugar are well-controlled.

Beyond helping others, donating blood has health benefits for you, the donor, too. It can provide a free mini health check (automatic cholesterol for free) and foster a sense of community. It's a simple process that only takes about 40 minutes, including the pre-check and rest/snack period after.

#### Who can donate:

Considerations: Age, Weight, Health status, and Lifestyle.

Minimum age: 17 years or 16 with parental consent

Minimum weight: 110 pounds.

You must have a good breakfast, be feeling well, not taking antibiotics, have no fever and a blood pressure under good control. You will be asked several confidential health and lifestyle questions, which protect you as a donor and the recipient of your blood. You will be asked about recent travel, certain medications and vaccinations.




### Call for Nominations for Woman of the Year

## Bishop Hicks' Column January 2026

### One Last Column, Ever Grateful

For more than five years, I have been blessed to share my thoughts with you in this monthly column. When I first began writing, it took me a very long time to craft each reflection. I often wondered if anyone was reading them or if they would make any difference at all.

But at parish visits and events, many of you told me that you read these reflections and that they helped you understand my mind and my heart. Some of you offered positive comments and others offered constructive suggestions. All of that feedback helped me grow in gratitude. I stopped seeing these columns as a task and started seeing them as a privilege. They became one of the ways we shared our faith journey together.

Now I write my final column. It is a bittersweet moment. I am excited for my next steps to New York. At the same time, I am going to miss this ongoing exchange with you.

As we come to the conclusion of this written dialogue, I would like to reflect with you on a few thoughts I shared at my farewell Mass on January 11, 2026.

In my homily, I expressed my sincere gratitude for the faith and love you have shown me throughout my years as your bishop. Together we have shared significant moments. We have celebrated the sacraments. We have strengthened our mission to be a vibrant and evangelizing Church. Through Confirmations, ordinations, graduations, the Chrism Mass, baptisms, funerals, community service, and our care for the most vulnerable, I saw Jesus Christ revealed in you. And each time we gathered for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, you strengthened my faith and drew me closer to God. And I pray that I have done the same for you.

I am deeply grateful to our priests who faithfully serve with pastoral hearts and leadership. To our deacons, wives, and families, thank you for your steadfast ministry of charity and your service. To our religious women and men and consecrated virgins, your prayerful presence and collaborative ministry have been a constant blessing. I am grateful for every sacrifice and every quiet act of love that often goes unseen but never goes unnoticed by God.

I also want to thank our diocesan staff and all employees who work as a vocation to ensure that the Church continues its mission. Our administrators, teachers, catechists, and youth ministers form disciples in classrooms and parish halls. Our musicians, liturgical ministers, and countless volunteers give life and beauty to our worship and mission. And to every parishioner across our seven counties, please know how grateful I am for your generosity and witness to faith in your homes, parishes, and workplaces.

Through baptism, we are all called to continue living the mission of Jesus Christ. I now move forward to serve in New York, trusting that the good work we have begun together will continue to bear fruit here in the Diocese of Joliet.

Many have asked who will become the next bishop. Soon, an administrator will be appointed who will continue to guide and govern the diocese while the apostolic nuncio and the Dicastery of Bishops offer recommendations to our Holy Father, Pope Leo. In due time, he will appoint the seventh Bishop of Joliet. Please join me in prayer for that discernment process.

Even though my ministry will continue in another place, I believe that prayer keeps us close. Every time we pray for one another, we remain closely united in Christ. So let us keep lifting each other up before God. I will carry you with me in my heart and in my daily prayer, and I humbly ask you to remember me in yours.

I also encourage you to be disciples who make disciples. Please continue to embrace my pastoral letter entitled MAKE. Pray with it. Reflect on it. Share it. Put it into practice every day. The Church grows when every one of us answers the call to live the Gospel with conviction and joy.
