Marriages:

It is necessary that all couples desiring to be married at Holy Ghost Church call the parish office to schedule an appointment with a priest at least six months prior to the date of their wedding and BEFORE they set a date with a banquet facility. Please call us to register.

Religious Education:

Our Religious Education Program builds and supports informed, practicing, and faith filled families. The program is held on select Sundays from September through April between 9:00-10:15 AM. Families are then encouraged to attend mass together either at 8 AM or at 10:30 AM Please call us to register. 630-766-4509

Reconciliation and Eucharist:

Instruction for children on these sacraments is currently being offered in the 2nd Grade. It is diocesan policy that a person be in the Faith Formation program for two full years before receiving sacraments. A child needs to be in First Grade Faith Formation to be on track to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist in Second Grade. Instruction in these sacraments are part of the Faith Formation (RE) program. Please call us to register. 630-766-4509.

Confirmation:

Youth instruction for the sacrament of Confirmation is currently being administered within the 8th Grade (Parish 8) religion curriculum in the Faith Formation programs. It is diocesan policy that a person be in the Faith Formation program for two full years before receiving sacraments. A child needs to be in Seventh Grade Faith Formation to be on track to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in Eighth Grade. Initiation Sacraments for Adults: Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation Through the parish OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation for Adults) process, adult candidates (individuals who were baptized and now wish to complete their initiation into the Catholic Church) may receive formation in the sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation. At the end of the instructional period, all candidates will complete their full initiation into the Church.

Adult Catechumen (individuals who seek to enter into the Catholic faith for the first time) will receive instruction in Baptism, First Eucharist, and Confirmation. THE ETERNAL SACRIFICE OF CHRIST MADE PRESENT IN THE MASS AND ITS PERPETUAL CELEBRATION

At the heart of Catholic worship is the Eucharist, a profound mystery that makes present the once-and-for-all the sacrifice of Christ at Calvary. Although Christ's sacrifice was a unique historical event, its effects are eternal, allowing the faithful to continually participate in it through the celebration of the Mass. Central to this participation is the epiclesis, the calling down of the Holy Spirit to transform the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. This essay will explore how Christ's one sacrifice is made present in the Mass, why the Church repeats the celebration of the Eucharist, and the role of the epiclesis in this sacred mystery, referencing Scripture, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, Apostolic Tradition, and the Early Church Fathers.

THE ONCE AND FOR ALL SACRIFICE OF CHRIST

The belief that Christ's sacrifice on the Cross was unique and unrepeatable is central to Christian theology. The Letter to the Hebrews declares, "He has appeared once for all at the end of the ages to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself" (Hebrews 9:26), highlighting the definitive nature of His offering, which accomplished humanity's redemption.

Catholic teaching holds that while this sacrifice was offered once in history, its effects are continually accessible through the Eucharist. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains, "The sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are one single sacrifice" (CCC 1367). The Mass does not repeat Christ's sacrifice but makes it present, allowing the faithful to unite with His offering. Thus, the Eucharist is not a mere memorial but a real participation in the mystery of redemption.

BIBLICAL FOUNDATION OF THE EUCHARIST

At the Last Supper, Jesus instituted the Eucharist, commanding His disciples to "do this in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:19). The Greek word used for "remembrance" (anamnesis) signifies more than a simple recollection—it refers to making a past event present and effective. Through the Eucharist, the once-for-all sacrifice of Christ is made present, and the faithful participate in it.

Saint Paul reinforces this in his First Letter to the Corinthians: "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes" (1 Corinthians 11:26). Every celebration of the Eucharist is a proclamation and participation in Christ's sacrificial death and resurrection, allowing the faithful to partake in its redemptive power.

THE EPICLESIS: THE ROLE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

A key element in the Eucharistic liturgy is the epiclesis, the invocation of the Holy Spirit, asking that the gifts of bread and wine be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. The Catechism teaches that in the epiclesis, "the Church implores the power of the Holy Spirit that the gifts offered by human hands be consecrated, that is, become Christ's Body and Blood" (CCC 1105). This prayer highlights the essential role of the Holy Spirit in making Christ's sacrifice present in the Eucharist.

The epiclesis mirrors the role of the Holy Spirit throughout salvation history. Just as the Spirit overshadowed Mary to bring forth the Incarnation of the Word (Luke 1:35), so too does the Spirit descend in the Eucharistic celebration to bring forth Christ in the consecrated elements. The same Holy Spirit that brought Christ into the world makes His eternal sacrifice present in the Mass.

HEAVEN, EARTH, AND PURGATORY UNITED IN THE EUCHARIST

One of the most profound realities of the Eucharist is that it unites heaven, earth, and purgatory. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that the Eucharist is "the pledge of the glory to come" (CCC 1402). Each Mass draws the faithful

into the heavenly liturgy, where the angels, saints, and the souls in purgatory worship God unceasingly. This union between the Church in purgatory (the Church Suffering), the Church on earth (the Church Militant), and the Church in heaven (the Church Triumphant) is a foretaste of the eternal communion with God promised to the faithful.

The souls in purgatory, although undergoing purification, benefit greatly from the celebration of the Eucharist. The Catechism affirms that "the Eucharistic sacrifice is also offered for the faithful departed who 'have died in Christ but are not yet wholly purified,' so that they may enter into the light and peace of Christ" (CCC 1371). Through the Mass, the merits of Christ's eternal sacrifice are applied to the souls in purgatory, hastening their purification and drawing them closer to the full vision of God. Although they cannot participate actively in the Eucharistic celebration, the Church's prayers and the offering of the Mass bring them grace and help speed their journey toward heaven.

The Book of Revelation describes the heavenly liturgy as an eternal offering of praise to the Lamb who was slain (Revelation 5:6-14). In the Mass, this heavenly worship is made present on earth, as the faithful participate in the same sacrifice that is eternally offered in heaven. As the Sanctus ("Holy, Holy, Holy") is sung during the Eucharistic Prayer, the Church joins with the angels in their praise of God, symbolizing the unity of heaven, earth, and purgatory in this sacred moment.

Bishop Hicks' Column July 2025 A Revival on the Road

"Please don't let this be a one and done!" That was the heartfelt plea voiced by many who attended the <u>National Eucharistic Congress</u> in Indianapolis last summer. For five days, more than 60,000 Catholics from across the country gathered to adore Jesus in the Eucharist, to receive His Word, to be nourished by His grace, and to be sent out on mission. It was not simply a conference; it was a mountaintop moment—a deeply spiritual encounter that ignited hearts with a renewed love for Jesus truly present in the Blessed Sacrament.

Since that unforgettable gathering, we have already begun to see fruits. Across the nation, more people are returning to the sacraments, seeking reconciliation, and encountering the Lord in new ways. Here in the Diocese of Joliet, we saw the number of individuals preparing to enter the Church more than double at this year's Rite of Election, and I believe it is a direct fruit of this <u>National Eucharistic Revival</u>.

To ensure the momentum continues, the organizers of the Congress initiated a profound follow-up, including a Eucharistic pilgrimage across the country. Our diocese had the great honor of being the first to welcome the procession on its <u>journey from</u> <u>Indianapolis toward Los Angeles</u>.

I had the privilege of receiving the Eucharistic Lord in the monstrance, along with many faithful of all ages, at <u>St. Mary Parish in Paxton</u>, Illinois. After a beautiful Holy Hour, I accompanied the Blessed Sacrament to <u>Immaculate Conception</u> in Gilman, where more faithful were waiting in adoration. From there, the journey continued to <u>St. John Paul II Parish</u> in Kankakee for overnight adoration.

The next day, <u>Bishop McNamara High School</u>, with <u>Bishop Spies</u>, hosted a devout celebration with students, teachers, and community members gathered for Eucharistic adoration and praise. Bishop Spies then accompanied the Lord from Kankakee to <u>Immaculate</u> <u>Conception</u> in Morris, Illinois, where we processed and concluded with a beautiful Holy Hour.

I was so proud of our people—not only for organizing these processions and liturgies, but also for the outpouring of thousands of participants of every age and language.

One of the most touching moments for me was driving in the van that carried the Eucharistic Lord and 12 young adult pilgrims from Indianapolis to Los Angeles. As we traveled from Morris to Seneca, the pilgrims prayed a "Eucharistic Rosary of Gratitude." On each of the 50 beads, they took turns expressing a unique prayer of thanksgiving to God for the gifts and blessings they experienced while in the Diocese of



Joliet. Among their heartfelt prayers, one of them expressed gratitude for the simple joy of a delicious homemade breakfast burrito received earlier in Kankakee. That small moment was a powerful reminder: the Eucharist draws us into deep reverence while also opening our eyes to the sacred in the ordinary. Gratitude, born from the Eucharist, transforms how we see the world.

As we made our way west, I handed the monstrance to <u>Bishop Lou Tylka</u> in Seneca, Illinois, and the pilgrimage continued its sacred path across the country. Eventually, the procession reached <u>Los</u> <u>Angeles on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi</u>. This massive, coast-to-coast movement is more than a symbolic gesture; it is a literal and spiritual journey of our Lord passing through cities, towns, farmland, and neighborhoods, blessing the land and sanctifying His people.

And the journey isn't over. Indeed, the <u>National</u> <u>Eucharistic Revival</u> is blossoming into a long-term spiritual renewal. In addition to the pilgrimages, organizers have laid out a bold and inspiring vision for what comes next, including the formation of Eucharistic Missionaries—lay leaders who commit to daily prayer, frequent reception of the Eucharist, and intentional accompaniment of others on the journey of faith. Parish and diocesan initiatives are taking root all over the country, fostering ongoing prayer, Eucharistic formation, and local missionary outreach. And the <u>2029 National Eucharistic Congress</u> is already on the horizon!

But for this revival to bear lasting fruit, it must reach into the very fabric of our daily lives. We are each called to respond with renewed fervor: to make the Eucharist the source and summit of our lives, to witness to the Real Presence of Jesus with joy and confidence, and to put our faith into action by carrying His love to the peripheries—wherever people are hurting, lonely, or searching.

So, thankfully, this <u>Eucharistic Renewal</u> is not a one and done! May this movement continue in our diocesan parishes, in our schools, in Eucharistic adoration chapels, whenever the priest elevates the Host at Mass, and every time we receive this extraordinary gift of Christ's true Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.
