## WHAT TRUTH IS NOT: A Catholic Perspective



Truth is a foundational concept in Catholicism, as Christ Himself declared, "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6).

Yet, in today's world, the understanding of truth is often distorted or misrepresented. To grasp what truth truly is, it's equally

important to explore what truth is not.

Below is an in-depth Catholic perspective on what truth is not, along with examples and references.

### 1. TRUTH IS NOT SUBJECTIVE

One of the most prevalent misconceptions in modern society is the belief that truth is subjective, varying from person to person based on feelings or opinions. Phrases like "my truth" and "your truth" embody this idea.

However, from a Catholic standpoint, truth is objective and universal, not subject to personal interpretations or preferences.

Truth is grounded in the reality of God's existence and His revelation.

Jesus affirms that truth is not fluid but eternal: "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away" (Matthew 24:35).

Catholic teaching stresses that while individuals may have different perspectives or experiences, truth itself remains constant and unchanging.

There is one ultimate truth rooted in God, not a multitude of personal truths.

### 2. TRUTH IS NOT DETERMINED BY MAJORITY OPINION

In a democratic society, it is tempting to believe that truth can be determined by consensus or the majority's opinion.

However, Catholic teaching asserts that truth is not subject to popular vote or cultural trends.

St. Thomas Aquinas teaches that truth is "the conformity of the intellect to reality" (*Summa Theologica*), meaning it reflects the way things actually are, regardless of how many people believe otherwise.

An example of this can be seen in moral issues such as abortion or euthanasia.

Even if a majority of society comes to accept these practices, the Church maintains that they are contrary to the truth about human dignity and the sanctity of life.

As Pope John Paul II stated, "Truth cannot be arrived at by consensus, but only by conformity to God's law" (\**Evangelium Vitae*\*).

### 3. TRUTH IS NOT RELATIVE TO CIRCUMSTANCES

Relativism posits that truth changes according to circumstances, situations, or cultural context.

The Catholic Church firmly rejects this notion, emphasizing that moral and doctrinal truth remains the same regardless of the time, place, or situation.

Pope Benedict XVI referred to relativism as "the dictatorship of relativism," a worldview that undermines the objective nature of truth by allowing it to shift based on personal convenience or societal trends.

Consider the moral law against lying.

While the temptation to lie may seem justified in certain circumstances, the Church teaches that lying is always wrong because it goes against the truth of human relationships and the divine order.

Catechism of the Catholic Church states that "A good intention...does not make behavior that is intrinsically disordered...good or just" (CCC 1753).

Therefore, truth does not bend to fit circumstances; it demands integrity and adherence even when inconvenient.

### 4. TRUTH IS NOT MERELY FACTUAL KNOWLEDGE

Another misconception is equating truth solely with factual or empirical knowledge—what we can see, measure, or quantify.

While facts and scientific discoveries are valuable, truth encompasses more than just data or sensory experience.

Catholicism teaches that truth includes metaphysical and spiritual realities that go beyond what the empirical sciences can grasp.

St. Augustine emphasized that ultimate truth is found in God, not just in the material world: "You have made us for Yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in You."

For example, while science can explain the biological processes of the human body, it cannot answer the deeper questions about the purpose of human life, morality, or the existence of the soul.

Catholic truth encompasses both reason and faith, affirming that spiritual truths—like the existence of God, the immortality of the soul, or the reality of the sacraments—are just as real as empirical facts, even if they cannot be scientifically measured.

### 5. TRUTH IS NOT CONVENIENCE

Sometimes, people distort the truth to align with their desires or convenience, thinking it is more "practical" to bend or ignore truth.

This is common in cases of moral compromise or when people justify immoral actions because they suit their immediate goals.



However, from a Catholic perspective, truth does not cater to convenience or comfort.

Pope Pius XII warned that "the sin of the century is the loss of the sense of sin," indicating that distorting truth for convenience leads to moral decay.

An example of this can be found in situations where individuals justify dishonesty in business, relationships, or other areas of life, believing that small compromises are harmless.

Yet, Proverbs 12:22 clearly states, "Lying lips are an abomination to the Lord, but those who act faithfully are His delight." Truth demands integrity, even when it comes with personal cost or discomfort.

**6. TRUTH IS NOT EMOTION-BASED**

Emotions, while an essential part of the human experience, do not define or constitute truth.

It is easy to equate strong feelings—whether joy, anger, fear, or sadness—with truth, but Catholic teaching holds that emotions must be guided by reason and aligned with God’s truth.

Jeremiah 17:9 warns, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick; who can understand it?" Emotions are powerful, but they can lead us away from truth if not governed by reason and moral principles.

Consider the example of moral decision-making.

A person might feel overwhelming compassion for a loved one who is suffering and might believe that assisting in euthanasia is a merciful act.

However, the Church teaches that taking a life—even out of compassion—is contrary to God’s will.

The emotional pull does not override the objective truth about the dignity of human life, as found in Exodus 20:13, "You shall not kill."

**7. TRUTH IS NOT MANIPULATION OF FACTS**

Truth is often compromised when facts are selectively presented, twisted, or exaggerated to fit a specific narrative.

This manipulation of facts to deceive others is a direct violation of truth from a Catholic standpoint.

Catechism of the Catholic Church 2485 emphasizes, "By its very nature, lying is to be condemned."

An example of this can be seen in media or political discourse, where selective reporting or skewed presentation of facts is used to promote a particular agenda.

Pope Francis warned against this type of falsehood, calling it "fake news" and an offense to truth.

The virtue of truthfulness requires us to present facts honestly and fairly without distorting them for selfish gain.

**8. TRUTH IS NOT NEUTRAL**

Catholic teaching rejects the idea that truth is indifferent or neutral.

Truth, by its nature, makes moral demands on individuals. It calls for a response and a commitment to live according to it.

John 8:32 declares, "And you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

This verse implies that knowing the truth requires a choice to embrace it and let it shape our lives.

For instance, the truth of the Gospel is not neutral but transformative, calling people to repentance, conversion, and discipleship.

It is not enough to passively acknowledge the truth; one must live in accordance with it.

**9. TRUTH IS NOT A TOOL FOR PERSONAL GAIN**

Lastly, truth is not a tool to be used for personal gain, manipulation, or control over others.

St. Augustine wrote, "The truth is like a lion; you don't have to defend it. Let it loose, it will defend itself."

Truth stands on its own and should never be used to exploit others or gain unfair advantages.

In business, politics, or even personal relationships, using partial truths or manipulating facts to gain leverage undermines the moral fabric of society.

In Ephesians 4:25, St. Paul instructs, "Therefore, having put away falsehood, let each one of you speak the truth with his neighbor, for we are members one of another." Truth is meant to build up and unify, not to be a means of exploitation.

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**CONCLUSION:**

Defining Truth Through What It Is Not

Understanding what truth is not helps clarify its true essence.

Truth is not subjective, relative, determined by majority opinion, or based solely on facts. It is not convenient, emotion-driven, manipulative, neutral, or a tool for personal gain.

For Catholics, truth is ultimately grounded in God, who is the source and end of all truth.

Living in alignment with that truth brings freedom, peace, and eternal life.

"The short 1 hour mass is a compilation of all history to present, Old Testament and New Testament"

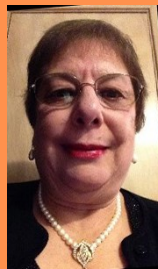

## MAKE CONVERSION: ENCOUNTERING THE SACRED KELLY SCARDINA



I married at 21 years of age, very in love, thinking I would be with my spouse for the rest of my life. We enjoyed our life, had a son, and everyone thought we were the perfect couple. To tell the truth, religion was not all that important to us. Yes, we were married in the Church, our son was baptized and had his sacraments, but we did not pray together as a family, or attend mass regularly. We didn't have time for Church except for special occasions. Jesus was truly missing from our lives.

After 24 years of marriage a downturn in the economy left our small business going bankrupt. My husband looked elsewhere for comfort and consolation. He decided to leave me with 3 mortgages, car payments, and other debts, and move in with his new girlfriend. I was devastated and struggling. Teaching school kept my mind off my troubles during the day, but the loneliness and feelings of abandonment were strongest at night. My consolation was prayer and going to Mass. I would get up earlier in the morning so that I could pray to the Holy Spirit for guidance and help. One Sunday at Mass, after receiving Communion and going back to my seat, I felt the love and care of Jesus wash over me. It was a warmth and feeling that I cherished, and have never felt again since that day. Jesus was comforting me and telling me everything was going to be OK. Jesus helped me get over the resentment and abandonment. He opened new doors and gave me a new chapter in my life. I slowly began to recover, pay off the debts, buy a house on my own, and even save some money. My life was my own and I chose activities that made me happy, such as attending Mass regularly.

Going to Church and engaging in its community became important to me. I started participating in groups such as the Council of Catholic Women where I met many wonderful women who became my friends and gave me the opportunity to serve others. I participated as an instructor for RCIA, and later became a 2nd grade teacher in Faith Formation. Teaching those little ones about Jesus was my joy, especially when we learned about the Mass and how Jesus comes to us in the Eucharist. I became the Holy Ghost Church Bulletin Editor and office worker which brought me closer to the many good people who work there. The people of Holy Ghost have become my family. Through the hardship of my divorce, Jesus has given me the confidence to become my own person and make my own decisions. My prayer life has improved. I never miss a Sunday Mass, and often go to Mass during the week, and set aside time for prayer every day. I feel that Jesus has called me to become a Missionary Disciple to bring his good news to others through me. In my continued prayers, I pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit to give me the words and insights to bring Jesus to others by being a facilitator for the many Formation classes offered here at Holy Ghost and for being on the Discipleship Team.

Thank you for reading my Faith Story. Jesus is with you too! God bless you, and Jesus I trust in you!
