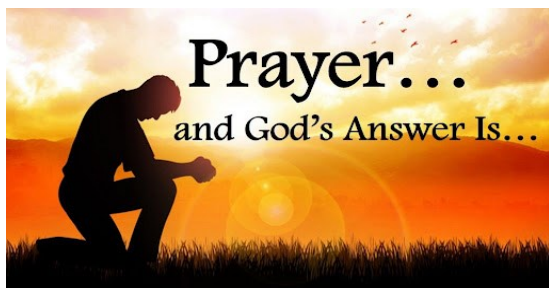

### UNDERSTANDING GOD'S RESPONSES TO OUR PRAYERS:

#### A Catholic Perspective

Prayer is a fundamental aspect of Catholic spirituality, serving as a way to communicate with God, seek His guidance, and express our needs and desires.

While many approach prayer with specific requests, it is important to recognize that God, in His infinite wisdom and love, responds in ways that are best for us.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 2735-2737) teaches that God's answers to prayer are always aligned with His will and our ultimate good, even if they do not align with our expectations.

Here, we explore five ways God may answer our prayers, each revealing a different facet of His divine plan and love for us.

#### 1. "YES. I NEVER THOUGHT YOU'D ASK."

**Understanding the Affirmative Response:** This response represents a straightforward "yes" to our prayers.

It reflects God's joy in giving us what we ask for, especially when our desires align with His will and our prayers come from a place of sincerity and trust.

It can be seen as a moment where God's will and our request coincide perfectly.

**Example:** Consider a person praying for the grace to forgive someone who has hurt them. God answers "yes" to this prayer because forgiveness is a virtue He desires for us.

By granting this grace, God aligns His will with our desire for reconciliation and peace, and He rejoices in our openness to forgive, which mirrors His own forgiveness towards us.

**Biblical Reference:** In Matthew 7:7-8, Jesus teaches, "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you." This passage reflects God's eagerness to answer our prayers when they align with His will.

#### 2. "NO. I LOVE YOU TOO MUCH."

**Understanding the Loving Denial:** Sometimes, God's response is a loving "no." This answer reflects God's

protective nature and His understanding of what is truly best for us, even when we may not see it.

A "no" from God is not a rejection but a redirection towards a greater good or protection from harm.

**Example:** A person might pray fervently for a specific job, believing it to be perfect for them.

However, God, knowing the future challenges and moral compromises the job might require, may lovingly say "no" to protect the person's soul and guide them towards a more suitable opportunity.

**Biblical Reference:** In 2 Corinthians 12:7-9, Paul speaks of a "thorn in the flesh" that he asked God to remove three times. God's response was a "no," but He explained, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." This teaches us that God's "no" often comes with a deeper purpose or lesson.

#### 3. "YES, BUT NOT YET. THE TIMING IS NOT RIGHT."

**Understanding the Delayed Answer:** Sometimes, God says "yes," but asks us to wait. This response teaches us patience and trust in God's perfect timing.

God sees the bigger picture and knows the right moment for things to unfold. His delays are not denials but are meant to prepare us or the circumstances around us.

**Example:** A couple might pray for a child but face years of infertility. God's "not yet" could be preparing them for parenthood or waiting for circumstances to align in a way that would best support the family and the child's future.

**Biblical Reference:** The story of Abraham and Sarah in Genesis 17-21 is a profound example of waiting on God's timing. Though they prayed and waited many years for a child, God's promise was fulfilled in His perfect time, showing that waiting can be part of God's divine plan.

#### 4. "YES. AND HERE'S MORE."

**Understanding the Abundant Response:** Occasionally, God answers our prayers with a "yes" and gives us even more than we asked for. This response showcases God's generosity and His desire to bless us abundantly.

It is a reminder of Ephesians 3:20, where St. Paul writes that God "is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think."

**Example:** Someone might pray for the financial means to pay off a debt.

God not only provides the needed funds but also opens up new opportunities for stable income or blesses them with financial wisdom



that changes their life.

Biblical Reference: In the feeding of the 5,000 (John 6:1-14), Jesus does not just provide enough food for everyone to eat; there are twelve baskets of leftovers.

This miracle illustrates God's abundant generosity, exceeding what was needed or expected.

## 5. "YES. BUT DIFFERENTLY THAN YOU THOUGHT."

Understanding the Unexpected Yes: God sometimes answers our prayers with a "yes," but in a way we did not anticipate. This response teaches us to remain open to God's methods and trust His wisdom, knowing that His ways are higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8-9).

It encourages adaptability and faith in God's unique plan for us.

Example: A person might pray for healing from a physical illness, expecting a miraculous recovery. Instead, God grants healing through medical treatments and the hands of skilled doctors.

The outcome is the same, but the method is different, showing God's care through various means.

Biblical Reference: When the Israelites prayed for deliverance from Egyptian slavery, they likely did not expect the series of plagues or the miraculous parting of the Red Sea (Exodus 7-14).

God answered their prayers for freedom, but in a way that showcased His power and sovereignty.

## CONCLUSION:

Trusting in God's Perfect Responses

God's responses to our prayers reflect His wisdom, love, and perfect knowledge of what is best for us.

Whether His answer is a direct "yes," a protective "no," a patient "wait," an abundant "yes, and more," or an unexpected "yes, but differently," each response is a call to trust in His divine plan.

As Catholics, we are encouraged to approach prayer with humility, openness, and a readiness to accept God's will, knowing that He always acts for our ultimate good and spiritual growth.

## The Configuration and Vocational Synthesis

The final 4 years of seminary bring a shift in focus. More confident in his identity as a disciple of Jesus, the man enters the Configuration Stage and begins the formal study of theology. Here, his humanity is more intentionally shaped so as to mirror Christ the Shepherd. He studies Scripture, doctrine,

moral theology, liturgy, and pastoral theology with an eye toward preaching, celebrating the sacraments, and shepherding souls. The man regularly spends his weekends assisting at liturgy, engaged in parish ministries, and functions in a ministerial capacity.

In the fall of his final year of seminary, the man is ordained as a transitional deacon and enters the Vocational Synthesis Stage. At this point, he has completed his academic training and will now live and serve full-time in a parish. This year is truly a "synthesis" because everything converges here: prayer, study, service, community life, and ministry, demonstrating that the seminarian has become a man of integration, freedom, and priestly witness who is ready to step forward into priesthood.

These final stages are not just about learning what a priest does, but about becoming who a priest is. Through study, service, and the grace of the sacraments, the man is configured more fully to Christ the High Priest, ready to lay down his life for God's people.

### MAKE: A PASTORAL LETTER FOR THE PEOPLE OF THE DIOCESE OF JOLIET

In October, Bishop Hicks released his Pastoral Letter: MAKE to the people of our Diocese. Your Discipleship Team here at Holy Ghost are carefully reading the document to identify areas we are already tending to and areas we need to expand as disciples.

In the coming months I will quote sections of the letter in the bulletin and newsletter so that all parishioners can become familiar with it and know how our parish is responding. As you read these articles, please feel free to reach out to me if you have additional ideas for the staff and discipleship team to consider.

From Bishop Hicks: "If we are to grow as a thriving vibrant Church, one serious about passing on the faith to future generations, we must move from maintenance to mission. To make this shift, I have invited everyone to follow a vision focused on three essential paths summarized in five words: Catechesis, Evangelization, and Faith into Action."

The discipleship team began with **CATECHESIS** to name how we are currently supporting in our parish. We need to remember that catechesis puts us in touch with the person of Jesus and is a lifelong journey which engages our heads and our hearts. You might say the parish has a responsibility to support growth and knowledge in one's faith from womb to tomb. (to be continued)

"I Have Loved You" — A Gift from the Holy Father



The wait is over! After just five months of being elected, Pope Leo XIV has speedily penned and shared with us his first Apostolic Exhortation, *Dilexi Te* ("I Have Loved You"). It radiates the heart of Jesus and reminds us that love for Christ and love for the poor are inseparable. The Holy Father teaches that when we draw close to those who are weak, forgotten, or struggling, we meet Christ himself. It is not only an invitation to charity; it is a call to conversion.

In last month's column, I invited everyone to read my pastoral letter MAKE! which lays out our diocesan vision for evangelization. If you have not yet done so, I encourage you to take some quiet time to read and pray with it, and now to also read *Dilexi Te*. These two letters, the Holy Father's and ours, speak to one another with one voice: a call to be a Church that listens, serves, and brings the love of Christ into action.

Some may think this theme of love for the poor is simply a continuation of Pope Francis and something that only Francis and Leo share in common. However, Pope Leo shows in a scholarly and deeply pastoral way that love for the poor has always been at the very heart of the Church. Throughout *Dilexi Te* he grounds this teaching in Scripture from the Old and New Testaments and draws upon the wisdom of the Early Church Fathers, the lives of the saints, and the witness of countless religious orders and popular movements. He even highlights how Saint John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI carried forward this same conviction in their own teaching. Far from being a new idea, Pope Leo reminds us that this is part of the Church's unbroken tradition, one that the world urgently needs to hear again today.

Reading *Dilexi Te* moved me deeply. It reminded me that when we share life with the poor, they evangelize us. During my years serving in El Salvador at a home for orphaned and abandoned children, I remember when a donation allowed us to buy doughnuts for all 525 children.

We ran out before the adult staff could have any, including me. Then a little boy approached and offered me two thirds of his doughnut. I said, "That's generous, but give me one third and keep two thirds." He replied, "No, Padre, you're bigger and probably hungrier, you get more." That small act of love preached the Gospel better than any homily.

I was struck by Pope Leo's reminder that poverty is not only material. There is also a spiritual poverty, an emptiness and isolation that affects many, especially in our own country. He warns that this kind of poverty can be even more dangerous because it hides behind comfort or distraction. This insight challenges us to see the poor not only as those who lack food or shelter but also as those who hunger for meaning, mercy, and belonging. Our call is to reach both kinds of poverty with the same love of Christ.

Not long ago, I visited a parish food pantry where volunteers gathered to pray before they served. It was not simply about groceries; it was catechesis, evangelization, and faith in action all at once. One volunteer said, "Bishop, we try to do more than give out donations. We are trying to share God's love and see the face of Christ in everyone we serve." That is *Dilexi Te* come to life. When love meets action, we encounter Christ, and transformation happens.

May *Dilexi Te* be a roadmap for a Church that truly believes what it proclaims: that Christ's love is most visible when we serve, listen, and walk with the poor. In every act of mercy and every parish outreach, may we turn faith into action and reveal the love that Pope Leo describes so powerfully. And may we, as disciples here in the Diocese of Joliet, make that love visible in our words, our witness, and our works every single day.
