UNDERSTANDING SPIRITUAL DRYNESS IN CATHOLICISM

Spiritual dryness, also known as aridity, is a phase in a believer's spiritual journey where one feels distant from God, unable to pray with fervor, or finds little joy in spiritual practices. This phenomenon is not uncommon among Catholics and has been experienced by many saints throughout history. Spiritual dryness serves as a crucial aspect of spiritual growth, offering an opportunity to deepen one's faith, trust, and love for God, even in the absence of consolations.

Biblical Foundations

The Bible offers several examples of spiritual dryness, which provide comfort and guidance for those experiencing it. One of the most profound examples is found in the Psalms. King David, a man after God's own heart, often cried out to God in moments of spiritual desolation:

- Psalm 22:1-2: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish? My God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, but I find no rest."

This cry of abandonment reflects the deep spiritual dryness that David experienced. Yet, despite his feelings of being forsaken, David's psalm ends with a declaration of trust in God, demonstrating that spiritual dryness is not a sign of God's absence but rather an invitation to trust Him more profoundly.

Another biblical figure who experienced spiritual dryness is Job. Known for his unwavering faith amidst immense suffering, Job's experience reveals that spiritual dryness can be a test of faith:

- Job 30:20: "I cry out to you, God, but you do not answer; I stand up, but you merely look at me."

Job's lament is a powerful expression of the silence of God in the midst of suffering. However, Job's perseverance and ultimate restoration remind us that spiritual dryness is not the end but a passage toward deeper communion with God.

Even Jesus Christ, in His humanity, experienced spiritual dryness in the Garden of Gethsemane and on the Cross:

- Matthew 26:38-39: "Then he said to them, 'My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me.' Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, 'My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."
- Matthew 27:46: "About three in the afternoon Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?' (which means 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?')."

These verses show that even Christ felt the weight of spiritual desolation, yet He surrendered to the Father's will, setting an example for us to follow during our periods of dryness.

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Teachings from the Catechism

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) addresses the concept of spiritual dryness within the broader context of the life of prayer and the spiritual journey. It acknowledges that such experiences are common and necessary for spiritual maturity.

- CCC 2731: "Another difficulty, especially for those who sincerely want to pray, is dryness. Dryness belongs to contemplative prayer when the heart is separated from God, with no taste for thoughts, memories, and feelings, even spiritual ones. This is the moment of sheer faith clinging faithfully to Jesus in his agony and in his tomb. 'Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.' If dryness is due to the lack of roots, because the word has fallen on rocky soil, the battle requires conversion."

This passage from the Catechism emphasizes that spiritual dryness is a test of faith, a call to cling to Jesus even when one feels no emotional connection or spiritual consolation. It is a moment to exercise pure faith, trusting that God is at work, even in the silence.

The Catechism also highlights that spiritual dryness can be a purification process:

 CCC 2015: "The way of perfection passes by way of the Cross. There is no holiness without renunciation and spiritual battle. Spiritual progress entails the ascesis and mortification that gradually lead to living in the peace and joy of the Beatitudes."

Here, the Catechism teaches that spiritual dryness can lead to greater holiness, as it requires renunciation of personal desires and a deeper surrender to God's will. It is through these trials that one is drawn closer to the heart of God, experiencing the true peace and joy that come from living according to the Beatitudes.

Saints Who Experienced Spiritual Dryness

Several saints have experienced profound periods of spiritual dryness, offering us examples of how to persevere through such trials with faith and trust in God.

1. St. John of the Cross

St. John of the Cross, a 16th-century Spanish mystic and Doctor of the Church, is well-known for his writings on spiritual dryness, particularly in his works "The Dark Night of the Soul" and "Ascent of Mount Carmel." He describes spiritual dryness as a purifying process where the soul is stripped of all attachments to spiritual consolations, leaving it in a state of pure longing for God. This "dark night" is not a sign of God's abandonment but a necessary step toward a deeper union with Him.

2. St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa)One of the most famous modern examples of spiritual dryness is St. Teresa of Calcutta, who experienced nearly 50 years of deep spiritual desolation. Despite feeling abandoned by God, she continued her work among the

poorest of the poor, relying solely on faith. Her letters, published posthumously in "Come Be My Light," reveal her intense suffering and her unwavering commitment to serving Christ, even in the midst of profound spiritual dryness.

3. St. Thérèse of Lisieux

St. Thérèse of Lisieux, also known as the Little Flower, experienced spiritual dryness in the final years of her life. Known for her "Little Way" of spiritual childhood, she endured severe physical pain and spiritual desolation, doubting even the existence of heaven. Yet, she offered her suffering as a prayer, trusting in God's love despite her lack of consolations. In her autobiography, "Story of a Soul," she writes, "I am willing to remain in this state of spiritual dryness for as long as it pleases the good God."

4. St. Teresa of Ávila


St. Teresa of Ávila, another Doctor of the Church and a contemporary of St. John of the Cross, also experienced periods of spiritual dryness. In her autobiography, "The Life of Teresa of Jesus," she recounts how she struggled with prayer and felt distant from God for many years. However, she remained faithful to her spiritual practices, trusting that God was working in her soul, even when she could not feel His presence.

Embracing Spiritual Dryness

Spiritual dryness, though challenging, should not be viewed as a punishment or abandonment by God. Instead, it is an invitation to grow in faith, hope, and love. The saints remind us that spiritual dryness is a purifying fire that strips away attachments to spiritual consolations, leaving the soul in a state of pure longing for God.

During these times, it is essential to remain faithful to prayer, even when it feels dry or meaningless. Continuing to participate in the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, is crucial, as it provides the grace needed to persevere. Seeking guidance from a spiritual director can also be beneficial in discerning the purpose of one's dryness and how best to respond.

In conclusion, spiritual dryness is a profound aspect of the Catholic spiritual journey. It is a test of faith, a call to deeper trust, and a purification that prepares the soul for a more intimate union with God. By looking to the examples in Scripture, the teachings of the Catechism, and the lives of the saints, Catholics can navigate these periods with hope, knowing that God is drawing them closer, even in the silence.




blessed company of angels and men united in God."


