COURSE NUMBER

101 Training for Service

This course deals with knowledge of the Bible, Old Testament, New Testament, Between the Testament, The Church, the Letters.

This course is an examination of the life and teachings of Jesus Christ as presented in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and John.

This course will teach you the best and worst of religious and world events, Christ continues to call and cleanse his bride, the church. Examinations Final Exams: The time limit for final examinations is two hours and shall be strictly adhered to according to the schedule published. Late finals are permitted only in extreme emergencies and must be approved by the Dean. Early finals are not permitted.

A student who misses an exam because of illness or personal reasons should contact the professor to indicate the problem and get a suggested time for make-up. A student who misses an exam for no valid reason should be expected

to take a make-up at the professor's/grader's convenience and will incur a point penalty.

The makeup exam must be taken within two weeks of the missed exam. Failure to take the make-up test within the allotted time period will result in the student receiving a grade of zero for the exam. Academic Grievance Procedures. In

accordance with the practice of biblical precedent, all student complaints and concerns regarding academic matters will be dealt with in the following manner:

- 1) The student is first to contact in writing the professor of the course in which the concern has arisen.
- 2) The two are then to seek to understand the situation and to bring about a resolution.
- 3) If the student is not accepting the resolution proposed by the instructor, then the student is to contact the Dean to establish a time when the student, the professor, and the Dean can meet to discuss the situation.
- 4) If the student is not satisfied with the results of this meeting, the student can appeal to the President of the College.

Incomplete Work.

At the end of a term, an Incomplete shall be given if the student has not completed ~~the required work~~. All incomplete work must be turned in to the instructor by the allotted time.
