My favorite church holiday is easy -- every Sunday is important!

Some 60-odd years ago, I had a back injury playing tennis and went to the Healing Mission for prayer. I became conscious of how powerful and important that experience can be. On another occasion, I experienced "at-one-ment" during a healing session where I felt a powerful connection with the whole world -- with eternity. So I now am part of the Healing Mission prayer team. I also find community in the Wednesday night evening prayer and potluck. I've been on vestry and other committees but I'm done with those ministries now.
