Regional Collaboration Solves Homelessness

This summary provides an overview of the FY2025 Annual Report for the Greater Richmond Continuum of Care (GRCoC). Between July 1, 2024 - June 30, 2025, GRCoC agencies and partners served 8,939 people experiencing homelessness or within 3 days of losing their housing. This collective and collaborative effort, rooted in compassion and accountability, makes a difference in our region.

Homelessness in Our Region

The GRCoC is a coordinated and compassionate network of homeless service providers in our region supporting our neighbors pushed into homelessness. More than 34 agencies worked together to meet basic needs and help our neighbors get on a pathway to permanent housing.








Our region has undergone significant changes and challenges in recent years and become an increasingly expensive place to call home, pushing more people toward housing instability and homelessness.














Funding Homeless Services

Through a network of 13 partner agencies funded through GRCoC coordinated funding programs, this network offers an array of proven services: Triage and Assessment, Coordinated Street Outreach, Year-Round Housing-Focused Emergency Shelter, Seasonal Walk-in Shelter, Rapid Re-Housing, Joint Transitional and Rapid Re-Housing Programs, and Permanent Supportive Housing.

Annual estimated cost of targeted GRCoC programs: \$30 Million

Transparency and accountability are two cornerstones of the GRCoC. Projects funded through the GRCoC must meet extensive reporting requirements to ensure they have the largest impact possible.
