Aims of Fairholme Junior

Fairholme Junior provides a vibrant, supportive and nurturing environment that fosters and encourages the development of strong relationships between children, staff, parents and the wider community.

Fairholme Junior acknowledges the importance of the acquisition of strong literacy and numeracy fundamentals embedded through meaningful and differentiated learning experiences across all curriculum areas.

Innovative teaching programs, reflecting 21st century learning models and contemporary thinking, are characterised by a balance between modelling and scaffolding, and investigative and activity-based learning.

The integration of Information Communication Technology enhances the learning process in receiving, reflecting and applying information to shape the girls' thinking and understanding.

The rich play-based program, a feature of Fairholme Kindy, builds on the children's natural curiosity and love of learning. Through play the children are immersed in a wide variety of openended learning experiences which stimulate their

imagination and provide strong foundations to build upon during the lifelong learning process. Fairholme Kindy creates the stepping stones into Fairholme Prep.

Highly qualified, experienced classroom teachers and specialist teachers deliver an all-encompassing curriculum. The girls sing in choirs, learn musical instruments, stage musicals, enjoy speech and drama, perform in singing recitals, play chess, debate, take part in Maths Olympiad and Opti-MINDS, participate in swimming, cross country, athletics, gymnastics, tennis, netball, touch, cricket and basketball, and enjoy camps and excursions.

The unique culture of acknowledging each girl's gifts, talents, interests and abilities enables her to experience opportunities to shine in academic pursuits, through cultural endeavours and on the sporting arena.



House System

The House System was introduced into the Boarding School in 1936 and was extended to the Day School in the following year. Each girl was allocated to one of the three houses — Black House, Stephens House and Cameron House — named after three benefactors of the College.

With increased enrolments in 1959, a fourth house was formed: Powell House, named after an important benefactor, Mr Ray Powell.

All the girls from Prep become members of a House on enrolling in the Junior School and they remain in this House for their time at Fairholme. The girls are able to join the same House as members of their family who have attended the College.

A range of sporting and cultural activities are held among the four Houses, annually. There has always been a fine tradition of House spirit, high participation rates, with connections across year levels of fundamental importance.

Competition at the interhouse level gives students the opportunity to participate in Swimming, Cross Country, Athletics and Gymnastics competitions.

House Polo Shirts

The girls are required to wear House-coloured polo shirts for all Interhouse sporting competitions. Throughout the year there are a range of Interhouse academic, cultural and sporting activities.

Pastoral Care

A caring, compassionate and supportive attitude, Christian worship, a positive respect for self and others and a dedication to developing honesty and integrity are integral parts of everyday life at Fairholme Junior.

The other premise from which we proceed is the practical realisation that in all communities, rules, guidelines and consequences are necessary. It is our experience that when the girls are set clear guidelines, they enjoy the emotional security which results from knowing and understanding boundaries.

Pastoral care underpins all practices within the Fairholme community. It exists within the restorative approach to conflict resolution and in the respectful way we treat one another. Every teacher provides pastoral care by maintaining a classroom climate of support and encouragement.

All classes participate in a weekly Christian Education lesson. The girls from Prep to Year 6 attend a weekly Chapel service led by the Head of Faith and Wellbeing. Buddies are assigned to new students when they arrive. Year 1-6 students also participate in weekly Holme Group meetings.

Pastoral Care Programs

A vertical House system operates in the Junior School and girls are assigned to small Holme Groups (HG) and a HG Teacher.

A HG meeting is held several times each term

and provides opportunities for girls from Years 1 to 6 to interact and establish links with girls of all ages in their Houses. These groups provide peer support and friendship to the girls, under the guidance of their HG Teacher. Separate Pastoral Care programs operate in the Kindy and Prep classrooms.

The Pastoral Care Program focuses upon building self-esteem and in developing skills to assist the girls with the personal skills they need to negotiate the increasingly complex world in which they live.

Our Pastoral Care Program is underpinned by the incorporation of social and emotional learning as part of the curriculum to foster resilience and student well-being. Strategies and skills are taught using the Better Buddies, the Bounce Back program and Circle Time.

Pastoral Care Services

- > Our **Head of Faith and Wellbeing** leads the vibrant Christian life of the school and plays an active role in the welfare of the students. She is responsible for leading the school in worship as well as oversight of the Christian Education program at the College.
- > The College employs a **Social Worker** who works alongside the Head of Fairholme Junior to offer proactive support to our students. Parents and students are able to establish appointments with our social workers.



Day To Day

First Days What to Expect

We note that many students find the first days of the new school year a little daunting. Through our Orientation Program, we aim to make the transition as comfortable as possible and ensure that each student knows what to expect.

School Hours (Prep to Year 6)

Starting time 8.25am

Morning Tea 10.30-10.50am

Lunch 12.30-12.50pm

Play time 12.50-1.20pm

Lessons resume 1.25pm

Finishing time 3.10pm

A staff member is on duty from 8am to 8.20am in the P&F Courtyard (or in Greta Junior on wet weather days).

Junior School students waiting for after school cocurricular activities are supervised on the Arts Lawn until 3.30pm.

Bus travellers report to the staff member on rotunda duty before moving to the bus zone.

A staff member is on duty at the Rotunda each afternoon until 3.30pm.

Assembly

This is held every Tuesday commencing at 12 noon in L Assembly. The Year 6 girls lead the Assembly. Parents and visitors are most welcome to attend.

Chapel / Christian Education

The overall aim of the Christian Education program in the Junior School is to communicate the love of God for all people in a clear and interesting manner. The intention is to introduce students to God and his saving purposes for the world through his son, Jesus Christ.

The students are encouraged to incorporate Christian values such as, kindness, faithfulness, courage, compassion, patience, forgiveness, loyalty, peace, joy, hope and love, as they relate with other members of the school community.

Chapel Services are an integral part of school life and are conducted weekly by the Head of Faith and Wellbeing, assisted occasionally by other members of the Junior School staff.

Chapel is held every Wednesday in the New Chapel from 1.30-2pm.

Diaries

All girls from Prep to Year 6 receive a Student Diary at the beginning of the year. The Diary is an excellent means of communication between the student, teacher and the parents.

Teachers will check the Diary daily and write comments regularly. Parents are asked to sign their daughter's Diary each night. The girls are expected to keep a neat, well-presented Diary to assist them in developing effective planning skills.

It is important for girls to:

- > have their Diary with them every day
- > show their Diary to their parents daily
- > record homework and task details
- > plan ahead by entering activity deadlines
- > use their Diary to remind them of approaching events
- > store any notes that need to be returned to the class teacher.

Student Attendance

Attendance at school matters – it enhances connections, gives greatest access to quality learning and strengthens relationships. For these reasons, we seek parental support of student attendance.

Our term dates are published on the *myFairholme* parent portal for the College Community at least 6 months prior to the beginning of the new school year and we thank all families for noting these dates and booking any family holidays or trips during the term breaks so that all students can complete the full learning expectations each year.

The girls in Prep to Year 6 are expected to be at school five minutes prior to the start of school, at 8.20am, to be ready to start school at 8.25am sharp. The electronic class rolls are marked at this time and again after lunch at 1.25pm.

Further, full attendance at extra-curricular activities and practices is expected. This is about learning commitment and team responsibility, as well as developing skills associated with the activity.

Late Arrival to School

If your daughter arrives after 8.25am she is to go to the Junior School Office to sign in, and to obtain a late arrival slip. She will then present this late arrival slip to her class teacher.

Leaving the College Campus

When girls leave and/or return during the school day, a parent or guardian is required to sign their daughter in/out via the Junior School Office.

Absences

The Head of Junior School oversees and monitors student absences. Parents are to advise the College of all absences, appointments, early leave or late arrivals by 8am.

Requests for planned absence from school are to be sent to the Head of Fairholme Junior for approval.


Medical, dental, and other professional appointments may be made during school hours for emergencies or with specialists only. Please notify your child's class teacher and the Junior School Office. The girls must not leave the school grounds without first being signed out by a parent or guardian from the Junior School Office.

Compulsory Events

Day To Day

Pick Up and Drop Off

To reduce congestion at the start and end of the school day, we encourage parents to use the designated drop-off and pick-up zones at the front of the Rotunda adjacent to the front car park accessed from the Wirra Wirra Street car park entrance (see map over page), and adhere to the staggered pick-up times outlined below.

- > Kindy 3pm
- > Junior School from 3.10pm
- > Middle and Senior School from 3.20pm

The pick up lane has a maximum wait time of five minutes. If you arrive too early, and your daughter is not ready to be picked up, you will be requested to move on. Support of this protocol is for the good of all. When utilising on-street parking in the area, please be considerate of our local residents and observe all traffic rules.

If you choose not to use the drop off zone, please ensure you park your car and escort your daughter in. Junior School girls who walk across the road into school must use the designated crossings.

Kindy

Kindy parents must park in the car park (not drop and go area) and walk to Kindy to drop off and collect their child.

Prep

For the commencement of the Prep school year, the girls in Prep must be accompanied to the Prep classroom and collected from the Prep classroom by an adult. Please notify the Prep teacher in writing or by email should an adult other than a parent be involved in bringing or collecting your

daughter.

We ask for your co-operation, please, in the matter of arriving and leaving punctually. With increased confidence and independence (usually towards the end of Term 1), Prep parents will be notified when their Prep children can be delivered to and collected from the Rotunda each morning and afternoon.

Years 1 to 6

The girls in Years 1 to 2 are to be delivered to, and collected from, either their classrooms or the Rotunda at the front of the Junior School. They are encouraged to increase their independence in moving to and from their classroom as they progress through the year levels.

The girls in Years 3 to 6 are generally able to move to and from their classroom independently of their parents; this is to be encouraged.

The Years 1 to 6 girls who are waiting after school to be collected wait at the Rotunda with the teacher on duty. After 3.30pm any girls still in this area will be required to go to the Fairholme Junior Office and parents are phoned. This is for the safety of all girls.


After School Activities

If girls are staying for after-school practices for sporting teams or music and drama activities, they are supervised on the Arts Lawn until 3.30pm.

They are to be collected promptly by a parent or carer at the conclusion of the activity. They are asked not to wait in front of L Assembly. No supervision will be provided after the conclusion of these activities.

Other Information

Camps

During the year, Year 3 to 6 students attend a year-level camp. These are hosted off campus (apart from Year 3 – onsite sleepover) and are important undertakings which allow the development of a range of skills important to the students' social and emotional growth.

Invariably, students are placed in situations where challenge, teamwork and collaboration are the skills of focus and development. We value the learning that occurs in these situations and expect that all students attend their relevant camp.

Any associated costs for these camps are included in the College fees.

Camps are part of the curriculum from Year 3 to Year 6.

- > Year 3: overnight 'sleep-in' at the College held in Term 4
- > Years 4 and 5: two-night camp at Alexandra Headland in Term 3
- > Year 6: Week-long tour of Canberra in Term 3

Birthdays

As the girls enjoy celebrating birthdays, parents may send along cupcakes or single-serve items, e.g. ice blocks, on the nearest school day to their daughter's birthday. Please be very sensitive when organising birthday parties. The staff will only give out the invitations when it is a party to which every girl is invited.

Greta Junior (Junior School Library)

The Fairholme Junior Library aims to serve the recreational and academic needs of all Junior School students.

Greta Junior is open Monday to Friday from 8am to 3.30pm and the online library is open all day every day.

Reading for enjoyment is encouraged both in weekly library lessons and when individual students visit Greta Junior. Within a supportive environment, the girls learn vital information literacy skills necessary to retrieve and utilise information from a range of print and digital sources.

The students are encouraged to borrow books from various areas of the collection and reading during the holidays is encouraged with students expected to borrow extra books between Terms 1, 2 and 3.

Parents are encouraged to borrow books to share with their children, as well as, for information for their own use from the Parents' Collection.

Other Information

Outside School Hours Care (OSHC) - Team Kids

Outside School Hours Care is outsourced to TeamKids, and is located next to the Prep classroom, in the Early Childhood Centre.

The OSHC program is available to Fairholme College children from Kindy until Year 6. TeamKids is fully approved for the child care rebate.

Parents can enrol their child via the TeamKids website (Scan the QR code below).

Before School Care Hours

Before School Care operates from 6.30am to 8.30am for students who arrive before 8am. The OSHC educator will bring the students to their classroom in time for the commencement of the school day.

After School Care Hours

The After School Care program operates from Monday to Friday from 3pm to 6pm and is available for all students from Kindy to Year 6.

Girls from Years 1 to 6, who are attending After School Care, meet a member of the OSHC team who will be waiting for them in L Assembly.

The Prep girls are collected at 3.10pm for OSHC from their classroom. The Kindy children are collected at 3pm from their classroom.

Health Centre

The Fairholme College Health Centre, located

in the Boarding House complex, is staffed by registered and experienced nurses, to support boarding students 24 hours a day.

Junior School students are supported by Junior School staff as the first point of contact, rather than at the Health Centre. If students are unwell, Junior School office staff will phone parents to arrange collection.

Your daughter must remain at home when she is unwell. Colds, flu and stomach complaints spread quickly amongst young children. If your child has an infectious disease, please notify the Junior School Office and enquire about any exclusion period.

Communication regarding notifiable diseases is provided via the Health Centre. When a student becomes ill at school, or is involved in an accident, the teacher in charge of the class will obtain immediate medical assistance from staff including, where required, the College Health Centre.

If illness or an accident occurs on an excursion, immediate medical assistance will be sought. The teacher in charge will inform the school immediately. The Principal or Deputy Principal and Head of Junior School must also be notified of any serious accidents or injuries. College staff will be in immediate contact with family members.

Mobile Phones and Wearable Technology

From when students step onto the school campus until they leave the College in the afternoon, phones and wearable technologies (such as smart watches and air pods) are away for the day. If for medical reasons, wearable technology or a mobile device is required, families are to liaise directly Head of Fairholme Junior so that appropriate health information from medical practitioners, and technological requirements, can be clarified.

Fairholme Fare (Tuckshop)

Boarders are provided with three nutritious meals a day by the dining room, as well as morning tea, afternoon tea and supper. Day students (including Junior School girls) may bring a packed lunch or enjoy the same morning tea and lunch as the Boarders.

In Junior School, this is known as Fairholme Fare.

Meals are ordered and paid for online via Events on myFairholme. Meals can be ordered in Week 1 for the whole term or alternatively ordered weekly. The menu is updated weekly and posted to Happenings@Holme on a Tuesday.

Fairholme Fare will not be available on Week 1 of each term and the final school day of each term. Please note refunds are unavailable on the day for girls who are absent.

Nut / Nut Products

We have a number of staff and students who suffer from a severe allergy to peanuts and other foods. This can be very serious and potentially life threatening. To prevent any allergic reactions, we ask all families to refrain from using any nut products in their children's lunches. Peanut paste or Nutella are not able to be used, neither are any raw mixed nuts or peanuts. Also, foods such as muesli bars, fruit and nut bars, and foods that have nuts listed in the ingredients are not acceptable.

Technology

The girls in Years 4 to 6 use laptops in their daily learning experiences. Laptops are purchased by, and remain the property of the College.

Information is shared via a Parent Information session in Term 4 of each year. The ICT Acceptable Use Policy is located on myFairholme.

Students in Years 4 to 6 are to apply for an @ fairholme.qld.edu.au email address by completing the Application for Email Address Form located on myFairholme.

Email may be used as a study aid, but must not be used for contacting family members during the school day or sending messages to classmates out of hours.

Digital Technologies

Online services are available to the girls at school and accessible through the internet from home. The girls have safe, internet access and in addition the girls in Years 4 to 6 have access to the College webmail.

Online databases and resources on the Fairholme College intranet can be accessed from home on personal devices. Fairholme College filters and monitors all online services to ensure a safe and appropriate learning environment.

The College continues to educate students in cyber safety and making good decisions for themselves when online.



Year 6 Leadership

All the Year 6 girls in their final year in the Junior School are provided with the opportunity to participate in leadership roles. The girls apply to be a Leader in a specific area in which they are interested, where they have personal capacity and where they would like to make a positive contribution and a difference.

HOLMEstore Uniform Shop

Located within the College grounds, our HOLMEstore offers professional customer service and expert advice for all your uniform and stationery supplies.

Staff will guide you through the required uniform items for all seasons and occasions. New and secondhand uniforms, hair accessories and swim attire are available for purchase, as well as an extensive range of Fairholme College merchandise and stationery items.

HOLMEstore Accounts

A HOLMEstore account is automatically created for each student upon enrolment. Students may charge uniform, stationery and personal supplies to the account or pay for items at the time of purchase by either cash or eftpos.

Accounts are emailed out at the beginning of each month and are payable online or over the phone by calling the Main Administration Office.

Parents can place an order for uniform items by calling or emailing the HOLMEstore and have them charged to their account and delivered to the classroom.

Books and Stationery

Back-to-school stationery can be purchased from Browns Office Choice and parents (both new and existing) will be notified when booklists are online and ready for ordering. All back-to-school stationery orders can be collected from the HOLMEstore, Browns Office Choice, or delivered to home.

Second Hand Uniforms

Only clean and current uniforms are accepted for resale at the HOLMEstore. Winter skirts, jumpers, blazers, panamas and ties will be dry cleaned and the cost of this deducted from the sale. Any items already dry cleaned will need proof of dry cleaning attached when left for resale.

Proceeds from the sale of items will be credited to the HOLMEstore accounts of current students or their siblings, and a bank transfer made to parents of past students.

Uniforms not deemed acceptable for resale will

only be held for a period of one month from receipt of your letter of notification, after which they will be discarded.

Second Hand Uniforms Facebook Page

A Facebook group exists with the purpose of selling second hand uniforms privately between parents. Please request to join the group called Fairholme Second Hand Uniforms. Please note this operates separately to the HOLMEstore, however, it is moderated by Fairholme staff.

Lost Property

All student property is to be clearly labelled with each student's full name.

Lost property is returned to Junior School for students, or stored in the red bin located outside the Junior School Office. Lost property stations are also located in the Middle School, Senior School and the gymnasium.

Wearing Your Uniform

Hats

The rule in the playground is NO HAT, NO PLAY. All students must have a Fairholme bucket hat for any outside activity whether for play or for a lesson. All students are required to wear a hat, both to and from school each day.

General Uniform Guidelines

- > The College panama with hat badge must be worn to and from school each day and when students are attending excursions or school activities, unless directed otherwise. It is worn at all times outside the College grounds when in uniform.
- > Full uniform, including panama, to be worn in public, e.g., at shopping centres.
- > Blazers are compulsory for all girls in Years 4-12 and are to be worn with full winter uniform to and from school and when wearing the uniform in public.
- > The length of the summer dress is to be below the knees and the winter skirt is to be worn mid-calf length.
- > Black lace-up College shoes fashion styles are not permitted. No straps, t-bars or buckles. Shoes

should be cleaned and polished and kept in good repair at all times.

> Sports shoes should be predominantly white and have non-marking soles.

Hair

- > Hair longer than the collar must be neatly tied back with hair bands and navy ribbons, or school tartan scrunchies and plain navy clips or bobby pins matching hair colour.
- > Headbands must be navy or College tartan. No fashion bands are to be worn.
- > Hair must be worn off the face and must be natural colour.

Jewellery and Make-Up

- > A plain watch with a gold, silver, black, navy or tan band.
- > Earrings: Only one small pair of plain gold or silver studs (maximum 5mm) or sleepers may be worn. No gemstones or pearls. If ears are double pierced, only one matching set may be worn, in the ear lobe.
- > No other jewellery may be worn.
- > No make-up or nail polish to be worn.



College Badges

- > The College Badge is worn on the left collar of the summer uniform and on the left blazer lapel with the winter uniform.
- > The House Badge is worn on the right collar of the summer uniform and on the right blazer lapel with the winter uniform.
- > All Leadership badges are worn above the College Badge.
- > The Name Badge is worn above the House Badge on the right collar of the summer uniform and on the right blazer lapel with winter uniform.
- > Charity badges are only to be worn for the duration of the campaign.

News Communications

The primary method of communique with parents occurs through the *myFairholme* parent portal and the Fairholme College app where you will receive news tailored to your daughter's year level and/or interests.

In addition to the Happenings@Holme feed, news is communicated regularly via the Fairholme College At Holme newsletter and College social media channels. From time to time, as needed, College Staff may email or phone parents to discuss topics that relate specifically to their daughter.

myFairholme Parent Portal

myFairholme is the College's parent, student and staff portal. On commencement at Fairholme, students and their parents are sent a separate username and password to access myFairholme.

Restorative Practices

Respectful relationships matter at Fairholme College. We seek a range of ways to work together positively on a daily basis, seeking to work with students and their families in all aspects of life and learning, engaging with high expectations and a high degree of support. We foster co-operation, collaboration, responsibility and accountability.

When things aren't going well, or if a relationship fractures, then our preference is to use a restorative approach to [re]building and maintaining good relationships. The use of Restorative Practices – listening to one another and resolving difficulties respectfully, enhances the culture and learning environment of our school. This approach offers us clear conflict resolution strategies that allow us to improve our own communication and build healthy relationships with our peers, school community and our families.

Restorative Practices offer us a chance to work through difficult conversations in a supportive and respectful manner. From time to time, staff may invite students to have a conversation about a community expectation that they are not keeping or, on occasion, students may be involved in a more significant discussion. If there is a situation where harm has been caused to students either through words, action, or inaction then it is our preference to meet together and reach a respectful

understanding and resolution. Common questions asked in such conversations might be: What happened? What were you thinking about at the time and what have you considered since? What do you need to happen; or, what do you want to happen in order to resolve the problem?

We all need to be accountable for our actions and to be able to discuss the way our actions impact other people. Good accountability is a learned skill. You can think of this process as you would a dial that only turns to the next stage if meaningful change hasn't been made.

The Accountability Dial (from the work of Jonathan Raymond):

- > Mention: All ok? Tell the person what you have noticed.
- > Invitation: Offer a few examples when the behaviour has been observed ... What's the pattern here?
- > Conversation: Unpack the issue. How can this problem be resolved?
- > **Boundary:** Make an agreement about what needs to change, by when and the actions the person agrees to undertake.
- > Limit: Final conversation offering the chance to make a meaningful breakthrough.



Teaching and Learning

The Junior School curriculum is based on eight learning areas with programs being formulated upon the Australian Curriculum designed by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA), and the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) materials. These are:

- > English
- > Mathematics
- > Science
- > History and Geography
- > Technologies
- > Health and Physical Education
- > The Arts
- > Languages

Reports

The College publishes formal reports to parents each year, at the end of each semester.

Families are notified when reports are available and they can access these via the *myFairholme* parent portal.

Parent/Teacher/Student Interviews

A report provides only a snapshot of student progress. The Parent/Teacher/Student interview does not have to focus on any particular concern; it may be an opportunity to meet teachers and to see some of the work completed by your daughter.

Face-to-face Parent Teacher Interviews are scheduled in the closing weeks of Term 1 and Term 3. Parent Teacher Interviews are booked on *myFairholme*.

Beyond these scheduled interviews, parents are encouraged to contact their daughter's teachers either by email or phone throughout the year if they have any specific concerns regarding their academic progress or wellbeing.

Students are encouraged to attend interviews with their parents and teachers. It is, after all, their learning that is being discussed and practicing respectful conversations with teachers about academic progress is an important part

of developing into an independent, mature and responsible learner.

Booking Interviews

Parent/Teacher/Student interviews are held at the start of Terms 2, 3 and 4.

Families can access a booking system via the myFairholme parent portal and select interviews, as desired or as requested by staff.

To assist, the system displays your daughter's classes and teachers to aid your interview selections.

Homework

Students can expect to be asked to complete regular homework activities by their class teacher. Homework should be completed on time and reflect a genuine effort to understand the material. Students are encouraged to seek help if they encounter difficulties, ensuring they grasp the concepts fully.



Learning Enhancement Centre

The Learning Enhancement Centre (LEC) aims to support the learning needs of all students in the College through its targeted programs and initiatives.

Support and Enrichment

Learning Enhancement at Fairholme Junior is multifaceted and incorporates support and enrichment components, most of which are delivered through the classroom curriculum.

The provision of appropriate curriculum for all students is of paramount importance at Fairholme Junior. Both enrichment and modification are considered vital elements of our differentiated curriculum.

Enrichment is embedded within every class program in the form of classroom topics focusing on high-interest concepts and ideas, higher-level thinking techniques, open-ended investigations, and critical and creative thinking.

It also takes the form of the many co-curricular activities that are on offer at Fairholme Junior.

The Learning Enhancement Teacher and assistants support and assist classroom teachers in designing and implementing programs where necessary.

Junior School Learning Enhancement Committee

The Junior School Learning Enhancement Committee meet to review teacher referrals and to discuss individual students. Additional learning pathways programs may be implemented in addition to a differentiated curriculum where necessary.

Procedures are in place to identify students who may require learning enhancement in the form of either enrichment or learning support. This takes place in consultation with the Head of Fairholme Junior, the Learning Enhancement Teacher, the Class Teacher and the parents.



The Arts

The Arts at Fairholme offers students a wide variety of highly creative and immersive experiences such as Dance, Drama, Music, Visual Art and Debating.

All opportunities and events in The Arts are communicated through myFairholme and Happenings@Holme.

Dance

This focuses upon choreographing, performing and appreciating dance. This is integrated into other facets of The Arts and the classroom programs and in addition, each class from Kindy 3 Day through to Year 6 will experience one term of dance.

The teaching program in The Arts is supplemented by visits from artists and groups as well as visits to productions performed in local venues. These provide live theatre experiences for the students.

Fairholme Physie Team

The Junior School offers girls the opportunity to be a member of our Fairholme Physie team. 'Physie' (also known as Physical Culture) is the combination of movements designed to increase strength, fitness and flexibility. The benefits are increased coordination, brain development and confidence. Physie is a synchronised, team-based sport for all ages that's social and fun and an excellent low impact dance and aerobic activity.

Drama

As well as developing a student's knowledge and understanding of drama skills, Drama allows learners to explore and understand their own social contexts, relationships, emotions and experiences. It assists and promotes:

Choral Music

The girls who have participated in the Year 4 Band Program are encouraged to continue playing their instrument in the Junior Band in Years 5 and 6.


