Goal #1

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**Goal Statement** 

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Students in kindergarten through sixth grade at Book Cliff Elementary will increase proficiency levels (green or blue) in Acadience Reading by 15 percentage points from the beginning-of-year benchmark to the end-of-year benchmark.

Academic Area

Measurements

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Book Cliff Elementary has historically faced challenges in literacy achievement. By the end of the 2024 school year, RISE ELA scores showed a 4% increase in proficiency among third-through sixth-grade students. Acadience Reading, another key assessment analyzed by the council, indicated a 10.23% increase in proficiency from the beginning to the end of the year for kindergarten through sixth grade in the 2023-2024 school year. However, 54% of students remain below grade-level expectations based on Acadience Reading benchmarks. The council is committed to improving reading proficiency across all grade levels and will use Acadience Reading (K-6) as the primary measure to track progress.

#### Action Plan Steps and Expenditures

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- 1. Professional development will be provided for teachers to increase teaching capacity and improve tier-one instruction. (\$ 5,839)
- 2. Assemblies will be scheduled to motivate, educate, and address academic barriers among our student body.
- 3. Authors will be invited to the school to model great reading and writing abilities. In addition, these authors will hold student workshops with each grade level.
- 4. Acadience reading data and progress monitoring data will be reviewed in grade-level PLCs and school team meetings. In addition, RTI groups will be formed and students will be placed in targeted intervention groups.
- 5. Acadience reading BOY, MOY, and EOY assessments will be given and progress monitoring for all students. progress monitoring frequency will be dependent on student scores.
- 6. The Really Great Reading program will be taught in K-3 and in reading intervention groups.
- 7. Lexia Core 5, SRI, Vocabulary City, Skill Struck, IXL, and DreamBox computer programs will identify reading gaps, increase spelling and vocabulary, and practice reading skills among students K-6. (\$ 7,000)
- 8. Book Cliff's Constitution Bee, art and science fair will continue as a way to improve reading across all subjects and showcase student work with all stakeholders. (\$3000)
- 9. Books will be purchased for all students and will be given to students at our Breakfast with Books event as a way to support literacy at home.
- 10. Really Great Reading student books, UEN science books, Mystery Science, and Generation Genius will be purchased to increase reading skills and academic vocabulary and provide the necessary science reading materials for all Book Cliff students. (\$ 5,000)
- 11. Chromebooks, headphones, and mice will be purchased to continue our one-to-one technology ratio. (\$ 7,000)
- 12. Overnight accommodations will be provided for presenters, teachers, and staff to participate in professional development opportunities. (\$1000)
