Dedication of the Fisk Memorial Chapel, July, 1893

“At last Fisk may pride herself upon possessing an audience room suitable for the accommodation of her guests...In the possession of this beautiful memorial chapel for our Sunday worship and for concerts and anniversary occasions, we are greatly rejoicing and today we say with deeper meaning than ever before, Hitherto hath the Lord helped us.” The Fisk Herald.

Dear Friend in Ministry,

The words of the prophet Isaiah will always have a special meaning for the members of our Fisk Family who have had the opportunity to visit the Fisk Memorial Chapel. Engraved above the entrance to the Chapel is a message that has touched the hearts, minds and souls of people throughout the world for more than two-thousand years. It reads: "Arise, shine; for thy light is come, and the glory of the LORD is risen upon thee (Isaiah 60:1)." The words that are inscribed within the stone of the Chapel have inspired our campus community since 1892; however, they have new meaning in light of the period of rebirth and renewal that is now occurring at Fisk University. Theologians confirm and our experiences agree that the attributes of a good and generous God are an ever-present reality. Indeed, they can be seen in the life of our University community. I am pleased to report that God continues to find favor with Fisk University, and the period of rebirth and renewal proclaimed by Isaiah, has found new expression among the faculty, staff, students, alumni and friends of our beloved University.

The Religious Life Program at Fisk University greatly contributed to the Fisk Renaissance that occurred throughout our campus during the past year. Dr. H. James Williams, the 15th President of Fisk University, was inaugurated in the Chapel. The Religious Leaders for Fisk hosted an Inaugural Prayer breakfast in the Appleton Room. The Second Annual HIV/AIDS Awareness Observance sponsored by the National Consortium of Black Women in Nashville was held for the first time in the Chapel. The first annual Fisk for Fisk Benefit Concert, which featured the outstanding singing talents of our alumni, occurred in the Chapel. The exterior of the Fisk Memorial Chapel was painted,

and nationally and internationally renowned ministers such as the Reverend Miles Munroe and the Rev. Dr. Marvin McMickle preached in the Chapel. We were also fortunate to have organizations such as The Consortium of Doctors, which is an organization of African-American women who have achieved the doctoral degree in their fields of study, visit the Chapel. Indeed, we are the humbled and blessed beneficiaries of God's grace, and we are fortunate to witness and participate in God's unmistakable activity of renewal in the Chapel.

Angela and I hope that you will find value in this Year In Review. As you peruse the pages, we pray that you will be inspired to visit the Chapel on Sunday morning at 9:00a.m. throughout the academic year, participate in the ministries of the Chapel, and/or continue to contribute to the growth and vitality of Fisk University. On behalf of our entire University, we thank you for your love for and loyalty to Fisk University. May God continue to bless and keep you in the years to come.

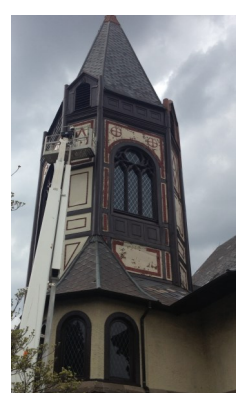

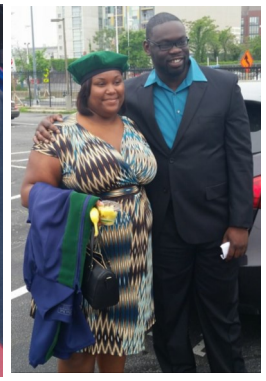

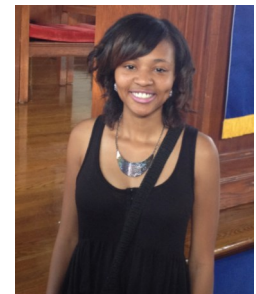


The Gift of Song: Students Lifting their Voices to the Lord in the Chapel

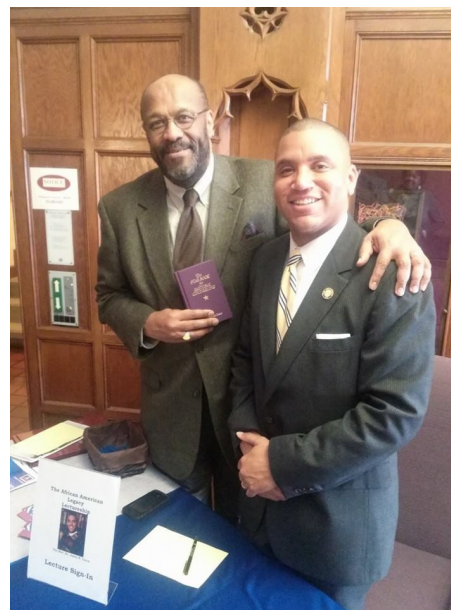

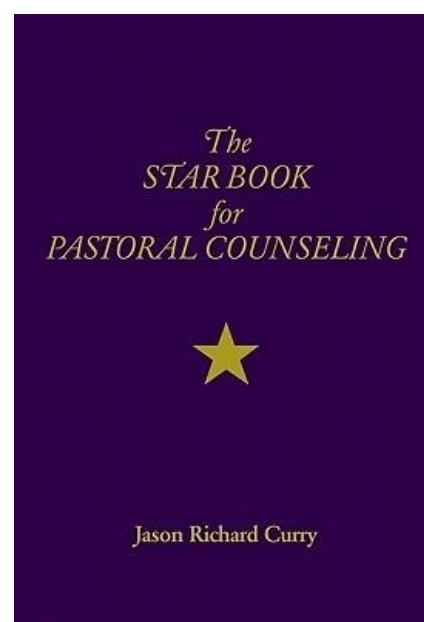

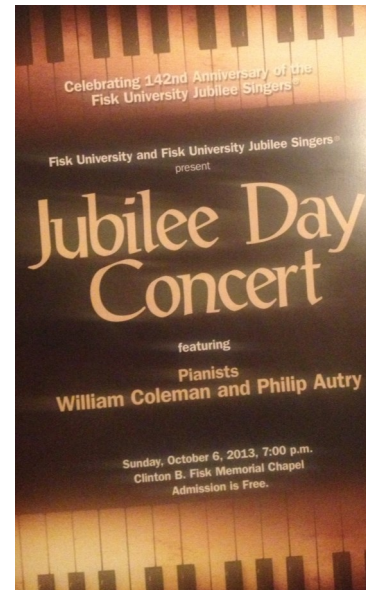

Dr. William Coleman has over 15 years of professional experiences as an artist, performer, educator and public servant. Currently, he serves as the Director of Arts Access for the Tennessee Arts Commission. The Arts Access program is designed to support underserved constituents and organizations across the state and identify barriers to Commission programs and funding for these groups. In addition to these grant management responsibilities, Mr. Coleman also serves as the agency Title VI and Accessibility Coordinator.

Mr. Coleman is sought after as a coach and collaborative artist across

the country such as world renowned Soprano, Leona Mitchell, for the Langston University Mast Class and Concert Series. As collaborator and artistic director, Mr. Coleman's performances have touched every genre of music. Recently, he was called on to accompany renowned Flamenco Artist, Shannon Calderon, at the St. Louis Tap Festival.

As an educator, he has served on the faculties of Fisk University, Langston University, the University of Central Oklahoma and Middle Tennessee State University. He has done extensive work with the elderly and the youth populations.

Dr. Philip Autry played solo piano recitals throughout the United States, and presented at national conferences of MTNA, MENC as well as the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy and World Piano Pedagogy Conference. His playing has been described as "clarity and precision coupled with feeling and emotion." He is the recipient of the Gail Boyd de Stwolinski Award from the University of Oklahoma School of Music. He is currently the Music Discipline Coordinator in the Fisk University Department of Arts and Languages. Formerly, he was on the faculty of Angelo State University in San

Angelo, Texas.

Other professional activities include participation in the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy and Mentors and Coordinators Conference of the United Negro College Fund and Mellon Foundation. He has presented at the National Association of Schools of Music Annual Meeting. He was a co-coordinator for the first annual Historically Black College/University Conductor Summit at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D. C. Dr. Autry was awarded the Ridley/Jones Prize from the Fisk University's History Department for original primary research on Fisk University.

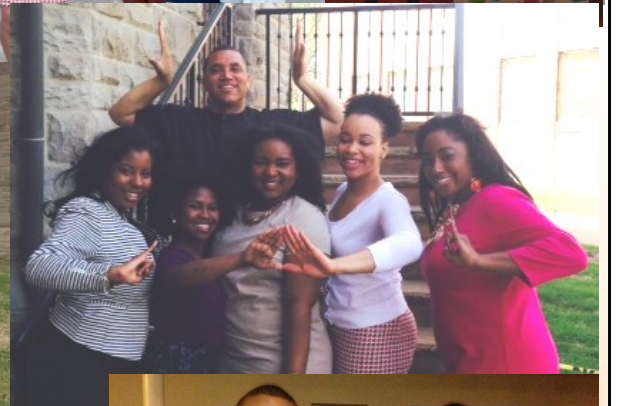

African-Americans have amassed both political and economic capital throughout the past one-hundred years. For example, there are a number of African-American Congressmen on Capitol Hill, and the most powerful elected official in the world is an African-American, President Barack Obama. According to an online article written by C. Daniel Baker, which was published on November 28, 2013 in *Black Enterprise*, the buying power of African-Americans is projected to reach \$1.1 trillion in 2015. However, in spite of our advances, political (e.g., challenges to the 1964 Voting Rights Act), economic (e.g., disproportionate rates of unemployment and underemployment), environmental (e.g., food deserts in urban communities), educational (e.g., disproportional dropout, suspension and expulsion rates for African-American boys), social (e.g., the pervasive use of racial profiling as a method to curtail crime) and spiritual (e.g., the absence of a holistic message, which addresses our existential plight as well as our spiritual predicament) challenges continue to confront, if not plague, the African-American community. The Clergy Roundtable at WFSK, Fisk University's radio station, is a forum hosted by Ms. Sharon Kay, General Manager of WFSK, and Minister Xuam Lawson, Program Director of WFSK, that is designed to 1) inform a larger audience about the aforementioned challenges in African-American life, and 2) present potential and/or real solutions to these challenges. African-American clergy from around the nation have an opportunity to discuss the ways in which the church in general, and the Black Church in particular, can effectively address these challenges. Violinist Stefan Petrescu has won numerous prizes as a violin soloist in his native Romania. He served as concertmaster of the Constanta Chamber Orchestra in Romania, which toured America and Western Europe. In addition, he has performed in recitals and as a soloist with orchestras in France, Germany, Italy, Spain, Hungary, Russia and the USA. As a member of the orchestra and associate concertmaster, he worked extensively with the Nashville Symphony Orchestra. Mr. Petrescu is currently a member of the string faculty at Tennessee State University and Fisk University. A highly sought after teacher and performer, he is very active in recording and composing. One of his most popular virtuoso works is the Tennessean Fantasy for unaccompanied violin.

By the time he earned a bachelor’s degree in music and theory, he was considering the priesthood and law school. 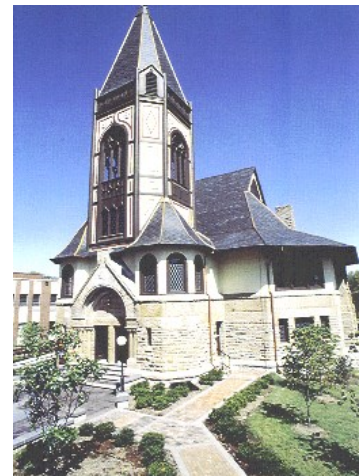

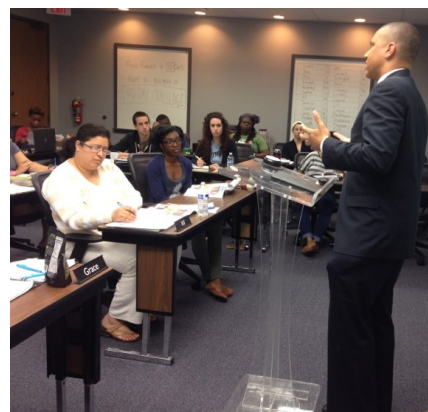

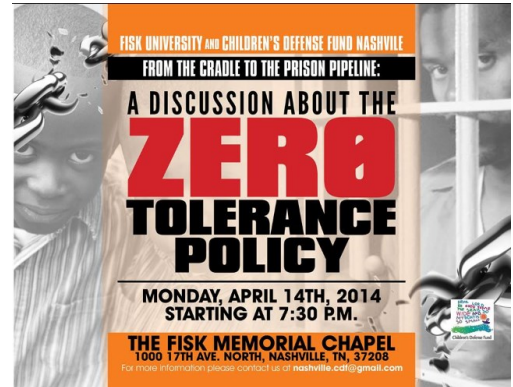

Dr. Giovanni remains as determined and committed as ever to the fight for civil rights and equality. Always insisting on presenting the truth as she sees it, she has maintained a prominent place as a strong voice of the Black community. Her focus is on the individual, specifically, on the power one has to make a difference in oneself, and thus, in the lives of others.

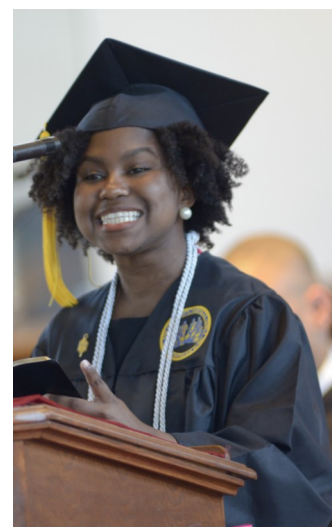
Many of Dr. Giovanni's books have received honors and awards. Her autobiography, Gemini, was a finalist for the National Book Award; Love Poems, Blues: For All the Changes, Quilting the Black-Eyed Pea, Acolytes, and Hip Hop Speaks to Children: A Celebration of Poetry with a Beat were all honored with NAACP Image Awards. Blues: For All the Changes reached #4 on the Los Angeles Times Bestseller list, a rare achievement for a book of poems. Most recently, her children's picture book Rosa, about the civil rights legend Rosa Parks, became a Caldecott Honors Book, and Bryan Collier, the illustrator, was given the Coretta Scott King award for best illustration. Rosa also reached #3 on The New York Times Bestseller list. Shortly after its release, Bicycles: Love Poems reached #1 on Amazon.com for Poetry.

Dr. Giovanni's honors and awards have been steady and plentiful throughout her career. The recipient of some twenty-five honorary degrees, she has been named Woman of the Year by Mademoiselle magazine, The Ladies Home Journal, and Ebony magazine. Prior to her practice of law, Judge Lee served as Magistrate for the city of Birmingham, Alabama (1986-87). Judge Lee practiced law in the Birmingham community for more than sixteen years with the firm of Shores and Lee until her judicial appointment in January 2003.

She is a graduate of Fisk University. She received her M.A. in Clinical Psychology from Pepperdine University in Los Angeles, California and the Juris Doctorate from Samford University, Cumberland School of Law in Birmingham, Alabama. Judge Lee has been happily married to Bob Lee for fifty years.

When it comes to her personal philosophy, she has this to say:

“As a child, I learned from my parents early the importance of giving back to the community. As an adult, I have found that the giving of your time and service can be one of the most rewarding experiences in life. If I am to promote the welfare of my community and make my city a better place to live then I must get involved and I must give of my time, my service and myself for the benefit of others. 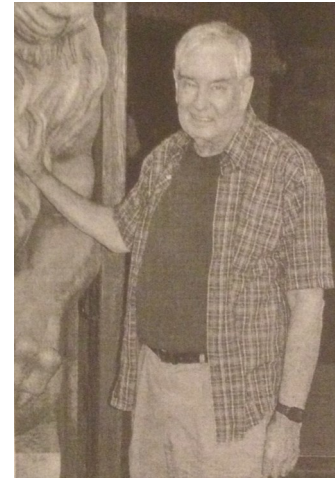
In Memorium

A leader of leaders, Dr. Myles Munroe was an internationally renowned author, lecturer, teacher, life coach, government consultant, and leadership mentor. He spent the last thirty years traveling the world and training leaders in business, education, government, and religion. He delivered his message on personal and professional development to more than 500,000 people yearly and millions through his Media program.

Dr. Munroe was a multi-gifted, international motivational speaker, best-selling author, and business consultant to governments, Fortune 500 Companies, and corporations, addressing the critical issues that affect every aspect of human, professional, leadership, social, and spiritual development. He wrote over 38 books; many of which have become bestselling books in the marketplace including Becoming a Leader, The Spirit of Leadership, The Principles & Power of Vision, The Pursuit of Purpose, Rediscovering the Kingdom, Understanding Your Potential, Releasing Your Potential, God's Big Idea, and In Charge among many others.

Dr. Munroe had been invited to over 80 nations as an ambassador of his nation, the Bahamas, to address government bodies, business leaders, universities, and religious organizations. He had also been honored by the government of the Bahamas with the Silver Jubilee Award (SJA) for providing 25 years of outstanding service to the Bahamas in the category of spiritual, social and religious development. Dr. Munroe and his wife Ruth Ann Munroe were the proud parents of two young adults, Charisa and Chairó (Myles Jr.).
