

God's presence has been apparent and influential at Fisk University since its founding in 1866. The American Missionary Association was instrumental in the establishment of this great institution. In fact, members of the clergy served as Presidents of the institution during its formative years. The historical record further reveals that Fisk University once served as a training ground for students who expressed an interest in becoming Christian missionaries. The Fisk Jubilee Singers furthered the mission of our beloved institution by amassing financial resources by traveling throughout the United States and Europe while singing the Spirituals. Professor Aaron Douglass captured the essence of this Judeo-Christian tradition in his paintings titled "Noah's Ark" and "Building More Stately Mansions." Fisk Professor James Weldon Johnson captured the essence of the Creation Story in his book titled God's Trombones. The prayers of W.E.B. Dubois (class of 1888), Fisk's most recognized alumnus, were published in Prayers for Dark People edited by Herbert Aptheker. In short, God is, was and shall forever be an integral part of the life and legacy of our esteemed institution. The pages that follow capture but a glimpse of God's presence in our University community throughout the previous, academic year.

I remain in awe of the people who have expressed their love for God and humanity through the internal ministries and the external, outreach efforts of the Fisk Memorial Chapel. Their zeal for service, commitment to excellence, willingness to sacrifice and interest in strategic planning are evidence of God's presence in their lives as well as the life of the Chapel. Throughout the past



year, the "Church within the Chapel" has engaged in ministries which concern community outreach, social justice, music, student leadership, alumni, interfaith endeavors, health awareness, ecumenism and fellowship with neighboring colleges and universities. The friends and constituents of the Fisk Memorial Chapel insist that spirituality isn't limited to one's personal relationship with God or limited to a Sunday, morning worship experience. Spirituality often finds expression in community, and it becomes relevant, vibrant and meaningful through the process of loving one's neighbor wherever he or she may be found (Matthew 22:39).

Welcome to the Fisk Family: The Pinning Ceremony and the Class of 2015

The idea, significance and sacredness of a rites of passage ceremony has been both practiced and recorded (via the oral tradition) for thousands of years. A rites of passage ceremony signifies to family members, friends and members of the community that people have completed an important phase of their lives, and that they are now embarking upon another important journey in life. A rites of passage ceremony is also fundamental to the existence of human civilization. George G. M. James wrote about its importance in the land of Kemet (Egypt) in Africa in the book titled The Stolen Legacy, and John Mbiti discussed the religious significance of the ceremony in African Religions and Philosophy. The famous psychologist Erik Erikson also discussed the importance of moving from one stage of life to the next in his book titled Childhood and Society. In short, the presence of a meaningful and sacred rites of passage ceremony undoubtedly contributes to the holistic development of people, because it makes use of all of the available cultural, spiritual, academic and familial resources to welcome people to the next phase of life.

On Sunday, August 24, 2011, the Fisk University community welcomed the Class of 2015 into the Fisk Family through a rites of passage ceremony known as the Freshman Pinning Ceremony. At the conclusion of the University Worship Service, members of the Class of 2015 received an official Fisk University pin which bears the insignia of the Fisk Jubilee Singers. The pin was placed on the dress or lapel of the incoming students by members of the Sophomore, Junior and Senior classes at Fisk University. Members of the administration, faculty and community were present, and the members of the Class of 2015 were warmly received by everyone in the Fisk Family. Jennie Wilson reminds us in a famous hymn that "time moves with swift transition;" and, we recognize that the four years of their blessed, Fisk University experience will pass rather quickly. Special Sundays in the Fisk Memorial Chapel

The value of the programs or ministries of the Chapel is often expressed within the overlapping section of two concentric circles: 1) the circle of religion in general and Christ in particular, and 2) the circle of Fisk University. Within the circle of religion, a person may find programs to strengthen his or her understanding of the Christian faith while developing an interest in and appreciation for other faiths throughout the world. Also, within the circle of religion, one may discover and participate in ministries (e.g., dance, singing and preaching) which are designed to inspire human beings as they glorify God within our campus community. Within the circle of Fisk University, we find students, faculty and administrators who are committed to the mission of our beloved institution. As people, they are often in need of hope, help and healing, and through the miraculous power and presence of God, they find their way to the doors and programs of the Fisk Memorial Chapel. We often recognize and celebrate the moment when the mission of Fisk meets the inspiration of Christ through the Special Sundays in the Chapel.

Throughout the past year, the Chapel highlighted the relationship between physical, mental and spiritual health through its annual Health Awareness Day service. Members and supporters of the Fisk-Meharry Medical College (MMC) HBCU Wellness Project, which is directed by Ms. Elizabeth Stewart, both attended and participated in the worship service. In an effort to call attention to the plight of impoverished citizens throughout the world, the Chapel hosted Bread for the World Sunday. The Reverend LaMarco Cable, the Mid-Atlantic and Central Southern Regional Organizer for Bread for the World, preached an outstanding sermon which advocated on behalf of the “least of those” who often lack the resources to advocate for themselves. We were blessed to hear a poem and song from John Curry and Nia Curry on Easter Sunday, and the graduating seniors, who were Chapel Assistants, received awards on Senior Sunday. Lastly, the entire University community was tremendously blessed to hear the Baccalaureate Sermon titled “Words Matter” by the Reverend Dr. Otis Moss Jr., Pastor Emeritus of the Olivet Institutional Baptist Church and former Chair of the Board of Trustees at Morehouse College.

We are fortunate to hear from the members of this esteemed group on Jubilee Day, during individual senior recitals, at community-wide concerts headlined by accomplished artists who are former Jubilee Singers and during Commencement exercises at the end of the academic year. The Jubilee Singers continue to inspire audiences throughout the nation and the world, and the Chapel continues to serve as the host venue for current and former members of this legendary group. Dr. Paul T. Kwami is the Musical Director and the Curb-Beaman Chair of the Fisk Jubilee Singers.

Throughout the past academic year, many of the Spirituals that were made famous by the Jubilee Singers were sung by Dr. Oral Moses; Professor of Voice and Music Literature at Kennesaw State University and a former Fisk Jubilee Singer. Dr. Moses' deep baritone, voice moved and inspired people in the Chapel which was filled to capacity.



Oral Moses, a bass-baritone, performs regularly throughout the United States and Europe singing oratorio and recitals with special emphasis on "a wide variety of Negro Spirituals and Art Song repertoire by African-American composers."

Dr. Moses has had numerous successes in oratorio and opera, performing major roles in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, *Regina, La Boheme*, *Albert Herring*, *Tremonti*, *Rigoletto* and *Die Zauberflöte* among many others. His symphonic engagements have included works with the Nashville Symphony, the Jackson Symphony, Detroit Symphony, Lansing Symphony, Tacoma Symphony and the Atlanta Symphony. Throughout his tours of Eastern Europe, Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Austria and in Berlin, Dr. Moses has sung the role of *Porgy* in *Porgy and Bess*.

He has recorded several CDs of art songs and spirituals by African-American composers among which is his latest CD entitled, "Oral Moses Sings... Songs of America." His CD, "Extreme Spirituals," is a collaboration with the controversial eclectic rock/classical band Birdsongs of the Mesozoic on the Cuneiform Records label. In 2001 Albany Records released a

Lending a Helping Hand: The Value of Community Service

Community service is an indispensable aspect of the Christian life. In the book titled The Meaning of Service by Harry Emerson Fosdick, one of the most prominent pastors and theologians of the twentieth century discussed how the methods and models of Christian service will inevitably change; however, the need for service, as reflected in the life of every disciple of Christ, will never go away. The Chapel was founded in 1892, and it's current constituents continue to foster and develop programs and ministries which are designed to meet the spiritual and existential needs of the members and friends of the Fisk University community. Service, as expressed in the D.E.T.A.I.L.S., is a Core Value of Fisk University, and the programmatic thrust of the Chapel for the previous academic year both recognizes and celebrates the meaning of service in the life of the University, the nation and the world. In short, we seek to serve the affluent and the indigent, Americans and those from other countries, intellectuals and those who may be functionally illiterate, those who may know about God and those who have yet to find God's love in their lives.

Through the 2011-2012 academic year, the members of the Fisk Memorial Chapel primarily engaged in the following community service projects: 1) The Second Harvest Food Bank of Middle Tennessee, 2) the Soles4Souls community shoe campaign, and 3) the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Awareness Walk in Brentwood, Tennessee. The Second Harvest Food Bank of Middle Tennessee project consisted of collecting cans of food as well as boxes of dry food goods and donating them to the organization. The Fisk Memorial Chapel Assistants also volunteered for several hours in Second Harvest's warehouse by organizing and sorting food items. The Chapel Assistants collected more than one hundred pairs of shoes for Soles4Souls within the past two years. The shoes continue to be distributed to the victims of the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. Lastly, members of the Fisk Memorial Chapel participated in Nashville's annual Race for the Cure. The Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure is both an educational and fundraising event which seeks to eliminate breast cancer throughout the world.

Religious Emphasis Week (REW) is both an ecumenical and interfaith endeavor at Fisk University. It is a week which overtly seeks to strengthen the body of Christ while it recognizes and celebrates the diversity of religious expression. Diversity is a Core Value at Fisk, and although the majority of the organized and registered groups on campus have a mission statement which boldly reflects the values of the Church, there are also prominent individuals on campus who proudly embrace the tenants of religions such as Islam and Judaism. Just as Jesus had a meaningful conversation with the Samarian woman at the well about the Living Waters (John 4:1-42), members of the Fisk Family look forward to meaningful dialogue with people of the same faith and different faiths. As a Fisk Family we may disagree about the meaning of God and the significance of the world's greatest teachers; however, common ground is often achieved within our religious community through 1) a recognition of the sacredness of all human life, 2) a healthy respect for our global environment, 3) a recognition that war is inhumane, 4) a realization that faith can exist with reason, 5) a belief that poverty is a human creation and therefore should be eradicated, and 6) justice for all people can be achieved. Even though REW often occurs during Holy Week, it is more than a time of reflection, devotion, celebration and praise for one particular faith. It is recognition that all people were created in the Imago Dei (in the image of God) and that the normative, theological ethic of agape love is able to provide help, healing and wholeness for people throughout the world.



REW was hosted by the Leaders of the Interfaith Fellowship Team (L.I.F.T.). Dean Curry designed L.I.F.T. in September of 2003. The mission of L.I.F.T. is to 1) provide a forum for dialogue among students who are both leaders and representatives of religious denominations or organizations at Fisk, 2) enhance the religious life for students, faculty and administrators at Fisk, 3) promote tolerance and acceptance of the variety of different religious perspectives that exist at Fisk and 4) promote interfaith activities (e.g., panel discussions) that stimulate both critical and analytical discussions about issues affecting humanity (e.g., poverty).






It is widely known that the alumni of Historically Black Colleges and Universities in general and the alumni of Fisk University in particular have been at the forefront of issues relating to social justice for more than a century. The publications or audio and video recordings of Civil Rights leaders such as Dr. W. E. B. DuBois, Congressman John Lewis and Dr. Diane Nash continue to stand as a testament to Fisk University's outstanding legacy and contribution to the area of social justice as it is expressed in America and throughout the world. As a result of the outstanding leadership of the aforementioned civil rights leaders as well as the contributions of many others, the goals of the Civil Rights Movement have been achieved. However, the statistics and empirical data associated with social problems related to poverty, illiteracy, incarceration without rehabilitation, unequal compensation, immigration and the institution of marriage suggest that there is still a need for moral and political leadership in the area of social justice.

Throughout the previous academic year, the Fisk Memorial Chapel has been involved in a number of programs and activities which were designed to enhance the moral fabric of our society. For example, Dean Curry and other representatives of the Chapel participated in a prayer vigil in support of Troy Davis: an African-American who was sentenced to death even though several witnesses to the events surrounding his crime recanted their stories. The anti-death penalty and Pro-Troy Davis Prayer Vigil was held at Vanderbilt Divinity School and it was supported by many members of the Vanderbilt University community. Members of the Fisk Memorial Chapel also participated in the protest in support of Trayvon Martin; an unarmed African-American teenager who was killed in Florida. The rally in support of Trayvon Martin, which attracted hundreds of people from the Middle Tennessee area, occurred in the downtown area of Nashville. Lastly, the Chapel Assistants participated in the annual Martin Luther King Day march in Nashville, TN which concluded at the campus of Tennessee State University. Over one-thousand people participated in the march.






Service to our Global Community through Compassion International



In Memorium

Dr. Marcellus Brooks was born on June 24, 1941 to the late Roosevelt Brooks and Beatrice Hibbler Brooks.

He is survived by his devoted wife of 38 years, Lula Vaughn Brooks, son Marcellus Vaughn Brooks, sisters, Elnora Hill, Corean Jackson and his "brother from another mother", and main "road dog", Dr. Lucius Turner Outlaw, Jr.

Dr. Brooks' attended Hamilton High School (Memphis), Fisk University, graduating in 1964 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Spanish; The University of New York in conjunction with the University of Madrid with a Master of Arts degree. He continued his studies toward a Ph.D. at the University of Illinois and Vanderbilt University.

Dr. Brooks' entire professional career was at Fisk University as Assistant Professor of Spanish, Chair of the Modern Language Department and Director of the Division of the Humanities and Fine Arts and, for a number of years, University Marshall. During his tenure at Fisk, he developed the Fisk Study Abroad Program in 1974 by taking students to Mexico City. The Program continued with students going to Africa, Dominican Republic, South America, Egypt, Italy, and Estudio Sampere in Salamanca, Spain. Dr. Brooks was a true son of Fisk, "ever on the altar."

Dr. Brooks' involvement did not end at Fisk, it continued in the community. He assisted in developing the North Edgefield Organized Neighbors (NEON) that included tutoring, art programs, summer job programs and outreach programs for youth. He also served as Board Chair. In addition, Dr. Brooks was a Cub Master for a Cub Scout troop at NEON. He held memberships in Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, The Agora Assembly, The Optimist Club, The Nashville Sons of Africa, and the Meharry, Fisk, and TSU Faculty Breakfast Club.

Mr. Newton S. Holiday, Jr. was born on March 25, 1926 in Fort Worth, Texas to Newton Sarailia Holiday and the former Louise Evelyn Scruggs Holiday. He later moved with his family to his mother's hometown of Nashville, TN. He died on March 15, 2012 at Centennial Medical Center.

Mr. Holiday received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Fisk University in 1949 where he studied under Aaron Douglass, famed artist-illustrator of the Harlem Renaissance. Mr. Holiday assisted in the installation of the internationally-acclaimed Alfred Stieglitz Collection of Modern American and European Art at the Carl Van Vechten Gallery. He later briefly left Nashville for New York where he received the Master of Arts degree from Columbia University in 1956.

Mr. Holiday served as an art instructor at Tennessee State University for several decades, as well as an instructor of art and photography at Fisk University.

A lifelong member of the Howard United Church of Christ (Congregational), Mr. Holiday was instrumental in the concept and design of the current building. He was a life member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. and was past President of the Tau Lambda Chapter. A member of the Fisk University Alumni Association, Mr. Holiday had been named a Golden Son of the University and was a previous class alumni president. He was also a member and a past president of the Nashville Fisk Club and the Nashville Jubilee Singers. An accomplished musician, he played the piano and the organ for many years—and continued to enjoy classical concerts, as well as listen to the works of Bach, Mendelssohn, Chopin, and Handel during his leisure time.

Mr. Holiday is survived by his wife of nearly 57 years, Ernestine Holiday of Nashville as well as additional family members.
