Letter From the Treasurer:

Brother Biography: Since 2005 many of our newsletters have included Brother biographies.

After much prodding Stephen Garanin BS 70, MEd 72 sent the following.

Sometime during the Summer of 1968, while living at the "old" Chapter House, I had an epiphany. If I wanted to actually graduate, I would need to do something drastic to get my grades up to snuff. For me, living at the House was not cutting it; too many distractions...card games, parties, loud music, women, beer, fun, etc. Late that summer I move, along with Steve Karoul, into an apartment on Main Street.

The process worked out well. I was able to complete the requirements for a BS in Fisheries Biology, with a minor in Botany. It did take an extra semester, but that was a small price to pay for a degree. I had also applied for and was accepted into a Master's program in the Botany Department.

Concurrent with this concentrated push to graduate, I realized that graduation meant only one thing...I was going to be drafted. Vietnam was becoming a major conflict and the Army needed bullet stoppers. Having gotten myself together academically, I had to find a way to start grad school. I spoke to a number of people and they suggested the National Guard as an alternative to active duty. In early January 1970, I received my diploma and draft notice simultaneously. I went to the armory in Greenfield, my hometown, and swore allegiance to God and Country; two months later I found myself at Fort Polk, Louisiana.

I ended up graduating with a Med in Botany and Secondary Science Education in December 1972. Prior to that I obtained a position as a Junior High School science teacher at Hampshire Regional School in Westhampton, MA. This lasted for three years. I then did long term subbing throughout the Valley. I realized that I needed to find a new career path as school administrators and parents were going to making me crazy.

I worked for the Greenfield YMCA as Membership and PR Director for a year while trying to figure out where my career path would take me. Using several great contacts, I obtained the Fuel Assistance Director for a n anti-poverty agency in Franklin County. This job got me interested in the broad field of Management.

While working at this position, I went to the Northampton branch of Antioch College. They had an accelerated intensive program to obtain a MED in Public Administration/Organizational Development. I was able to complete the degree requirements in 14 months. The question now was what to do with the skills learned with the new degree. Realizing the Valley was perhaps a bit restrictive, I opted to move to the BIG CITY---Boston.

(Did I mention that after 10 years with the National Guard, making it to Staff Sergeant, I decided that if I was going to stay for 20 years, I should do it as an officer. I got commissioned, along with Brother Fran Bourdon, in July 1979.)

After several months if I would ever get a job in the Boston area, I landed a Fuel Assistance Director position for Revere and Chelsea. This job challenged my knowledge, skills and abilities, but with a great staff guiding me. We were able to become the #1 program in

the state in two years!

Two years later I was asked by ABCD of Boston to take over and fix their ailing program. I accepted the challenge. After streamlining the processes and organizing their staff, we were steadily moving up the state rankings. However, fate once again intervened before I could become complacent and bored.

A good friend and previous company commander with the MAARNG was working fulltime for the Guards. He had a special project that needed to be done that required organizational skills on a large scale. Right up my alley! I took two weeks' vacation from the Fuel Assistance position to work with him. I was surprised just how much I liked the work, camaraderie and environment in the military. Several months later I was offered a fulltime position of my own with the MA National Guard. I accepted!

As with any military organization, you go where ordered and do what the organization needs done. Over the next 28 years, until retirement, I held a number of positions in the fulltime force: Facilities Management Specialist, Staffing Specialist, Supervisory Contract Specialist, Deputy State Logistics Officer, and State Human Resources Director, are the most prominent.

Concurrent with these positions, my military rake appointments increased. In August 2004, I reach my highest rank, Colonel. This gave me the opportunity to help guide, in some small way, the Massachusetts Army National Guard into the twenty-first century. I remained with the MAARNG until November 2008, when I reached my Mandatory Retirement Date.

Not being content to merely retire and fade away, I found, applied for and obtained a position with the Federal Department of Transportation in Cambridge. I was hired as a Senior Contract Specialist. This mostly entailed contracting for all the necessary supplies and services for the 1000 person workforce and the 14 story building. I stayed with this job for almost four years. I then realized that, not getting any younger, it was time to treat myself with some time to do what I wanted to do: RETIRE!

Since that time, I have spent more time doing all those postponed things: traveling with my wife Bonnie, finishing paddling the Connecticut River and many others, spend more time in the forest hunting deer and bear, work on a research for a series of article about the Connecticut River and the Connecticut River Valley, and generally enjoying the finer things in life (like attending PSD reunions.)
