OBSERVATIONS, WITH CAVEATS

If you, dear reader, are now laying your eyes upon this page, then we have all survived the **Snowpocalypse**. Congratulations! As I sit, quite comfortably inside on Sunday, watching the somewhat gentle but nonetheless insistent falling of snow, it seems that the mad dash to the grocery store for, as anecdotes indicate, more milk and even more toilet paper, will pay off; we will have survived the not-quite-a-day-and-a-half of relative isolation. While clearly mocking the fever-pitch to which the media gleefully seeks to drive us, concerning impending (or not) doom (and everything else), it is, in fact, about common sense and safety that I wish to write, especially regarding the very important but often misunderstood obligation to attend Holy Mass.

That all Catholics are obliged to attend Holy Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is a positive law of the Church: in fact, it is the 1st of the 5 Precepts of the Church – which all Catholics should know and to which all are bound! Clearly, this precept is related to the 3rd Commandment, to keep holy the Sabbath which, now, because of the Resurrection, is Sunday, the Lord's Day, the first day of the New Week, the New Creation in the Resurrection. Let's start with the Catechism of the Catholic Church, which, in # 2181 states:

The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor.

Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin.

This obligation binds all Catholics. It is sinful, gravely sinful, to miss Mass without a good reason. This obligation, however, can “disappear” in basically two ways. It can either be dispensed by a legitimate authority or it, as it were, by the law itself, when conditions render it impossible or unreasonable.

Let's start with the first: dispensation by a legitimate authority. The legitimate authority to dispense from attending Mass on a particular occasion (or a series of them) is the Pope (obviously!); the local Ordinary or Bishop of a diocese, or someone to whom he gives this authority (the Vicar General, or the Episcopal Vicars); or, by the law itself, a person's pastor. The second way is, interestingly, quite hard for some to understand. The obligation is deeply important, but not absolute.

“*Those excused for a serious reason*” describes situations which, by their nature, dispense from the precept. And a general rule is: no one is obliged to the impossible, nor to what is unreasonable, or harmful. Let's start simply: you are in the hospital! Of course you do not sin by missing Mass! You cannot possibly go! Or, you are being held prisoner by pirates somewhere: of course you have not sinned by missing Mass! This is obvious. Or is it? There are many good people – believe me – who interpret the obligation incorrectly as absolute; there are also, of course, people who sadly ignore the precept entirely and simply come (or don't) to Mass whenever they like. Both miss the point, though for different reasons.

“Fr Daniel's Musings” as I had tentatively and uncomfortably named this column, never really grabbed me. Aside from the obvious, unattractive self-absorption of using my name (really, only to defend against the unkindness of inferring that someone else might be responsible for my pseudo-literary drivel (but, then, anyone who's waded through my treacherous prose could never really blame anyone else!)), “musings” strikes a jejune note. So, I'm trying out different titles. Comments – snide, snarky or even serious – are welcome. Today's choice seems pretentious and self-mocking enough.

The noun “media” should be plural, although it often passes as singular. I reject this. Scripture recounts the demon's words: Λεγιῶν ὄνομά μοι, ὅτι πολλοί ἐσμεν. “My name is Legion, for we are many.” (Mark 5:9) Just saying.

All Masses after 4:00 pm on Saturday evening (and on the day before Days of Obligation) fulfill the obligation, regardless of the Mass formulary used. Such Masses are properly called “anticipatory Masses” and not “vigils”.

In the United States they are: Christmas Day; The Octave of Christmas – Mary, Mother of God (January 1); Ascension Thursday (where celebrated on Thursday, as happily it is in New York); The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Aug. 15); All Saints' Day (Nov. 1); and, The Immaculate Conception (Dec. 8).

They are: 1) to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation; 2) to go to Confession at least once a year; 3) to receive the Eucharist at least once a year, during the Easter Season; 4) to observe the obligatory days of Fasting and Abstinence, and 5) to provide, according to one's means, for the material needs of the Church.

The question of ‘mortal’ and ‘venial’ sin, though extremely important, does require more attention than can properly be given here. For this reason, let's go for the moment with the term used in the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, grave sin.

So, for this reason, the auxiliary bishops of our diocese would have this ability not because they are bishops but because they are Vicars of the Bishop, or Pastors in their own right. Canon Law is fun! No, really!

In this case, Fr Gabriel can grant this dispensation to his parishioners (as he did this past weekend); I cannot.

Were you, however, held captive by pirates because of your own nefarious activity, then you would be responsible!

“I was not at Mass – therefore I sinned.” Well, perhaps, but we have to know the circumstances. And even the intention! This and all subsequent questions about the obligation presumes that one is a) aware of the obligation and its importance and b) wants to fulfill it. If we are investigating this question to “find ways to avoid going to Mass”, well, then we have other, very serious problems! But let’s presume that’s not the case!

The *Catechism* lists, not exhaustively, two exceptions to the obligation: illness and the care of infants. Even here, however, we are required to make a prudential judgement, and this is for many quite vexing. What is needed is prudence, the virtue guiding the applications of the other virtues, which determines – as far as it is able – what is the correct course of action (among those that are possible and good) in a situation. A prudential judgement may, at times, be inaccurate (because of our reason’s limitations, etc.) but it is not therefore necessarily “wrong”, i.e., sinful or culpable, and such ambiguity (not about everything, of course, but about some things) is part of being, as we are, imperfect, limited creatures! It also requires, most importantly, trust in God.

“I am ill; do I go to Mass?” That depends! First, how ill am I? Will I make others ill? Am I young and relatively healthy? Do others depend on me, so that if I become more seriously ill, they will suffer? And so on. *“It’s snowing out; do I go to Mass?”* Yes, unless age, distance, the severity of the weather, the danger of endangering others, indicate otherwise. There are always many elements to consider. That’s why, by the way, – and quite prudently, I believe – Fr Gabriel 1) encouraged everyone to attend the Saturday anticipatory Masses and 2) cancelled the Masses on Sunday (so as to protect those who might not prudently respond to this particular situation), and 3) dispensed anyone who didn’t go on Saturday evening (which the circumstances themselves would have done, but his dispensation was supererogatory and generous).

What about caring for infants, then? Are there times that it is necessary or reasonable to stay home with an infant? Yes. Does that mean that, simply because one has infants, one no longer goes to Mass? No. The basic obligation is to go to Mass (and not (literally) for God’s sake – He doesn’t *need* us there); we need to be there, and others need us to be there. The obligation has personal as well as communal aspects.

There is not enough time or space here to investigate all the possibilities which surround the question of how to fulfill this obligation lovingly and faithfully. But, presuming that we begin with the intention to fulfill the intention to be at Mass (an obligation of love!), then we can ask, as a way of understanding the nature of the obligation, what we think of God! Does He want us there? Of course, because He wants what’s good for us. Does He want us there no matter what difficulty or impossibility exists? What do you think?

His love and care for us, indeed, does call for our attendance, which, in love, we should also want and seek and, within reason, even sacrifice to achieve. We should be generous and prudent, willing to put ourselves out to go, but willing, also, to be humble enough to realize that there can be times and situations where our absence is understandable. Both circumstances and desire play a role in our prudential judgments.

So, start with love and gratitude and the desire to be present at Mass, dismissing laziness and self-indulgence, then add a dose of common sense and a dash of humility, and round this off with the knowledge of God’s love, which calls us to Mass and which understands when that is not possible. With a bit of prayer, this is a good way to go about making a prudential judgment. Also, ask for a dispensation if really unsure!

And now a (perhaps surprising) word about “TV Masses”. There is **no circumstance whatsoever** in which watching Mass on television fulfills the obligation to attend Mass. Never! There can be, I recognize, spiritual value in watching Mass on television – when one is unable to attend or whenever one wants to. That’s fine. But in no circumstances does watching Mass fulfill the obligation: the obligation to attend Mass, which can be dispensed either by a legitimate authority or by the circumstances themselves, **is never transferred to watching Mass on television**. The Church, collectively, has sadly done a bad job explaining this, and our mostly positive experience during Covid confuses us. So, if you (legitimately) can’t or shouldn’t get to Mass, the obligation **has already been dispensed**. Watch Mass on TV if you will – there is no obligation to do so – but don’t confuse that with attending Mass or fulfilling the obligation.

Anyway, more than enough said! Be prudent and trust God. See you at Mass!





Sofonías 2,3; 3,12-13

Mateo 5,1-12

El evangelista escribe para una comunidad cristiana ya establecida que comienza a organizarse como iglesia y necesita profundizar en su nueva identidad de seguidores de Jesús, después de la ruptura traumática con el judaísmo, de donde procedía la mayoría y que les dejó en una situación de marginación social, cultural y religiosa. Es probable que estas personas fueran realmente pobres, menospreciados y perseguidos.



Felices son los que ponen su deseo de comodidades materiales y sus gustos detrás del bien de los demás. Felices son los que buscan la paz, porque la paz es el fruto del amor de Dios. Felices son los que no viven aferrados a lo que tienen, sino que lo ponen generosamente al servicio de los demás. Ellos saben que lo importante de verdad está dentro de ellos. Todos ellos son felices, dice Jesús, porque prefieren poner a Dios por encima de todo. Son felices porque conocen su condición de peregrinos en esta tierra y no se aferran a cosas que no van a perdurar. Son felices porque saben que su Dios lo es todo para ellos.

Reflexión

De entre todas las virtudes posibles, Dios eligió estas para ti. Seguramente son las más difíciles, pero también son las que te harán feliz. ¿Acaso la felicidad es fácil? Pero, ¿por qué éstas y no otras? Muy sencillo. Imagina estas "otras bienaventuranzas":

Bienaventurados los ricos, porque tendrán poder para abusar de los demás.

Bienaventurados los orgullosos, los rebeldes, los que protestan y no siguen ninguna norma porque sabrán odiar cuando les contradigan.

Bienaventurados los que ríen a carcajadas, porque no les importará el sufrimiento de los demás y podrán disimular su propia amargura interior.

Bienaventurados los airados y resentidos, los que no tienen misericordia, porque no conocerán lo que es el perdón.

Bienaventurados los que se lo pasan bien, los que disfrutan a costa de lo que sea, porque ya no tendrán nada que gozar en el cielo.

Bienaventurados los que siembran revoluciones y guerras, porque ellas se volverán en su contra.

Bienaventurados seréis cuando os alaben, porque seréis esclavos de vuestra propia vanidad.

Así, pues, Jesucristo eligió el "Bien Eterno" y nos dio ejemplo viviendo las Bienaventuranzas.

Mira si te persiguen porque eres honesto, porque no haces trampas como todos, porque no calumnias, porque das a cada uno según una medida justa.

Ese es el camino de los profetas, de los santos, de los mártires. Sólo estaré seguro de que lo sigo si "me duele". Y sólo me pondré a caminar si Cristo me da su fuerza y su amor. Sin Cristo las bienaventuranzas son una locura, son un fracaso, son una derrota. Con Cristo hay alegría incluso en los momentos más difíciles de la vida.
