Observations, with Caveats

For the moment, we'll go with the above title, but we'll be considering other options! Thanks for the comments. Onwards! This weekend I had the truly wonderful experience of someone asking a question with the actual intent of hearing what I had to say! You are no doubt aware that, frequently, some people (elsewhere, of course!) often ask questions as a way of stating their disapproval of something and don't actually want an answer, which they have already decided will be wrong! To the story, with a short introduction!

As you may have noted, it is our custom here, at Mass, after the priest has said "*The peace of the Lord be with you always*" not to add "*Offer each other a sign of peace*". This phrase, "*Offerte vobis pacem*", if used, should perhaps be better translated as "*Offer each other the kiss of peace*" ("kiss" being very biblical). This is completely optional. The priest may freely choose to add or omit it. We omit it, and not because we're mean!

Many, nevertheless, do offer a "sign" of peace even though the invitation is not given. There is, of course, no "liturgical gesture police force", nor should there be one, so one is, I imagine, free to do so, although it isn't really a historically Catholic approach to add one's own gestures, or those not requested, to the liturgy.

A very pleasant fellow recently asked me why I don't invite people to "give each other a sign of peace". I am happy for the question, about which I've been thinking for some time, and for the chance to begin to address this. The reason for this choice has many aspects: firstly, and most importantly, is the distraction which it brings, intentionally or unintentionally. At that moment in the Mass we are preparing to receive the Lord Jesus, Who is now truly, physically present on the Altar. All attention should be on Him. Of course, we should be at peace with each other before receiving the Lord! It is, however, at least in my experience, doubtful that this action, which often turns (though, thankfully, not here) into a protracted event (and people start talking to each other!!!), really serves that purpose. Many are easily distracted from the magnitude of the Lord's presence; the "sign" of peace, as it is given – usually a handshake – is an entirely secular and inappropriate liturgical gesture (and hugging and kissing your family while only shaking the hands of others does not express unity!); and the whole event – though perhaps "nice" – is at an awkward and disruptive moment in the Mass.

Two suggestions, as we *begin* to think about this (which, thinking, I think, has some merit). I remember how deeply impressed I was by the practice among Catholics in Southeast Asia: at this point in the Mass, each person bows (a thoroughly liturgical, and respectful, gesture) to the person to the right and to the left (only two people – it is, after all, a symbol, and this suffices and does not distract). Perhaps we could try that?

Also, perhaps we could make sure, after leaving the Church, to greet someone we don't know – or don't like! – and there (and everywhere else!) offer the Peace we have peacefully received at Mass?

Which, of course, is fine. But if aggression is necessary, which it never is, it's better to be aggressive than passive-aggressive.

One of the distinctive differences between the traditional Roman Rite and the revised liturgy of the Novus Ordo (new order) is that there are now a number of options from which the celebrant may choose or which he may omit. The value of having such options I leave to your discussions: it is, however, not a traditionally Roman way of thinking about liturgy.

Though opinions may vary . . .

This includes, sadly, things like waving at people across the church and, in some places, leaving one's seat! And chatting!!

Which I reluctantly accept ;)

This general principle applies also to such gestures as extending one's hands while saying "And with your spirit" (mimicking, as it were, the celebrant's gesture at "The Lord be with you") and holding hands (at any point in the liturgy) or praying with raised hands, again, copying of the priest's gestures. None of this has any basis in Catholic liturgical practice. While not seeking to limit anyone's freedom, I simply point out that these gestures have found their way into the liturgy – often from Protestant forms of worship – and are alien to Catholic practice and thinking, even if they are often seen. There is in fact a lot to consider in this question, which, while not urgent, is nonetheless important.

Or simply welcome Jesus! It cannot often enough be mentioned – because for the last fifty or so years almost no one has mentioned this – that it is NOT necessary to receive the Eucharist, the Body and Blood of the Lord, at every Mass! If – and this is an important "if" – If one is in a state of grace, that is, not aware of serious sin (and, since this comes up often, missing even one Mass without a serious reason constitutes serious sin requiring Confession before receiving Communion), then one is, of course, free to receive Holy Communion! However, there are many reasons why one might not be prepared: being conscious of some serious sin (like having missed Mass, but not only that), or whatever, or not having kept the Eucharistic Fast, etc., why one might NOT be ready to receive Holy Communion. There is no obligation to receive Holy Communion at every Mass, and simply because others are getting up, is not a good reason. We do not go to Mass simply to receive Communion; we go to Mass to worship God; receiving Communion if we are not prepared is **not** a way to worship God.

Many liturgists, of all stripes, would agree with this. Perhaps better would be the moment of the Offertory, as in the East? Of course, we need a lot more bowing in our society! It is not intrusive, it is gracious, it is humble, and it is fun!



Isaías 58,7-10

Este oráculo de Isaías está en línea con la exigencia de interiorización de las prácticas religiosas; es decir, que no se queden en un mero formalismo y que produzcan frutos de justicia, ya que brotan de la sinceridad del corazón. Se enumeran aquí los frutos que produce la práctica de la justicia.



1 Corintios 2,1-5

Pablo parece tener una idea casi obsesiva: la elección gratuita de los corintios por parte de Dios, sin méritos propios por su parte. Se pone a sí mismo como ejemplo de esa gracia de Dios, insistiendo en contarles cómo se presentó ante ellos sin prestigio ni sabiduría humana convincente y persuasiva, sino débil y temblando de miedo. Todo lo que tenía y sabía venían de Jesús, y éste tampoco se presentaba como un rey poderoso, sino como un crucificado. Según Pablo, él no transmitía ningún conocimiento humano superior, sino que su fuerza procedía del Espíritu.



Mateo 5,13-16

Las breves parábolas de la sal y de la luz completan la proclamación de las bienaventuranzas y terminan el discurso del Sermón del Monte. Estos dos elementos tan necesarios en la vida cotidiana, la sal y la luz, son parte del mundo simbólico de casi todas las religiones y culturas. La sal se utilizaba no solo para dar sabor, sino también para preservar alimentos en un mundo en que no existían los congeladores. Dar sabor y preservar también es símbolo de sabiduría; para San Mateo esta sabiduría es la Palabra de Dios, la Buena Noticia, personificada en los creyentes. En la visión de Isaías de la ciudad irradiando luz desde lo alto y atrayendo a los pueblos, el evangelista ve la misión universal de los cristianos de anunciar la Buena Noticia.

Ustedes son la luz del mundo y sal de la tierra

Oración introductorio: Dios mío, me has llamado a la santidad. Ilumina mi mente y mi corazón en esta oración para descubrir dónde se encuentra la verdadera felicidad, sólo ésta quiero desear y no las burdas imitaciones que me ofrece el mundo. Señor, te pido que deje entrar tu luz a mi conciencia para ser sal que ilumine y dé sabor a la vida de los demás.

Meditación del Papa Francisco: ¿Quiénes eran aquellos discípulos? Eran pescadores, gente sencilla... Pero Jesús los mira con los ojos de Dios, y su afirmación se entiende precisamente como consecuencia de las Bienaventuranzas. Él quiere decir: si seréis pobres de espíritu, si seréis mansos, si seréis puros de corazón, si seréis misericordiosos... ¡Ustedes serán la sal de la tierra y la luz del mundo!

Para comprender mejor estas imágenes, tengamos en cuenta que la ley judía prescribía poner un poco de sal sobre cada oferta presentada a Dios, como un signo de alianza. La luz, entonces, para Israel era el símbolo de la revelación mesiánica que triunfa sobre las tinieblas del paganismo. Los cristianos, el nuevo Israel, reciben, entonces, una misión para con todos los hombres: con la fe y la caridad pueden orientar, consagrar, hacer fecunda la humanidad. Todos los bautizados somos discípulos misioneros y estamos llamados a convertirnos en un Evangelio vivo en el mundo: con una vida santa daremos "sabor" a los diferentes

ambientes y los defenderemos de la corrupción, como hace la sal; y llevaremos la luz de Cristo a través del testimonio de una caridad genuina. Pero si los cristianos perdemos sabor y apagamos nuestra presencia de sal y de luz, perdemos la efectividad.» (Ángel de S.S. Francisco, 9 de febrero de 2014).

Reflexión: "Miren cómo se aman" decían de los primeros cristianos. Ése era su distintivo: el amor. Parecería que Cristo nos está pidiendo que no seamos humildes: "Brille así vuestra luz delante de los hombres para que vean vuestras buenas obras -pero es ahora donde viene lo importante:- y glorifiquen a vuestro Padre que está en los cielos. No dejemos de hacer el bien por esa falsa humildad, el secreto está en que no nos glorifiquen a nosotros sino a Dios, pero recordemos que somos luz, sal, estamos hechos para brillar, para dar sabor, que el mundo vuelva a sentir nuestra presencia, y que cuando nos vean tengan que exclamar asombrados: "Miren cómo se aman". Miren cómo brillan en el mundo, miren cómo iluminan el camino, son como una lámpara que hay que poner en lo alto, para que alumbré a todos. No se nos olvide que somos lámpara, llevamos la luz en nosotros, pero la luz es Cristo, es a Él a quien tienen que dar gloria. Se tienen que admirar de la luz, que es Cristo. Cristo hace milagros. Dice el evangelio que si la sal se desvirtúa ya no sirve para nada, pero todo tiene

solución mientras dura la vida porque Dios es omnipotente. Si tú, siendo cristiano, siendo sal de la tierra, crees que has perdido el sabor, confía plenamente en que hay uno que se lo puede devolver, confía en que hay uno que puede hacerte ser otra vez sal de la buena, de ser sal insípida a ser sal que da sabor. Si tú te consideras una lámpara sin luz, de esas que si se tendrían que poner debajo del celemin porque ya no alumbran, acércate a Cristo porque Él es la luz, es Él el que da sentido a nuestra vida, Él nos hará ser lo que debemos ser y así prenderemos fuego al mundo entero. Así podrán exclamar un día también de nosotros como exclamaban de los primeros cristianos: "Miren cómo se aman". ¡Animo! ¡Como los primeros!

Propósito: Ser el primero en disculparme u ofrecer una solución en alguna discusión que se presente.

Diálogo con Cristo: Jesús, me llamas a ser la sal y la luz para los demás, esto implica que mi testimonio de vida, palabras y acciones deben ser un reflejo de tu amor, de tu misericordia infinita. Tu gracia es la fuente para la felicidad. Ayúdame, Señor, a guiarme en todo por el Espíritu Santo, para que Él sea quien edifique, en mí, al auténtico testigo de tu amor.


y que apartes siempre los crueles abrojos que seas la dicha y que canten todos tu felicidad.
