This activity supports the services delivered by Head to Health mental health hubs previously funded through the Primary Mental Health Care Schedule.

There are currently two commissioned Head to Health hubs located at Officer and Berwick. The Frankston Head to Health hub was

decommissioned on 30 June 2023 with all consumers transitioned to the Frankston Adult and Older Adult Local Mental Health and Wellbeing Centre or other mental health providers or services.

The purpose of SEMPHN's program is to:

- provide additional mental health support and arrange referrals to more intensive mental health care or social supports as needed
- commission evidence-based clinical primary mental health care services in line with stepped care approach
- support general practice by providing funding to organisations to employ multidisciplinary teams of mental health workers
- ensure clinics provide culturally safe mental health services for vulnerable populations
- enhance the availability of existing services to support referrals from practitioners engaged through the mental health clinics, to best meet the needs of people who present at the mental health clinics
- develop and deliver communication and engagement activities to support access to mental health services
- support the transition of services to the nearest State funded Adult and Older Adult Local Mental Health and Wellbeing Centres.
