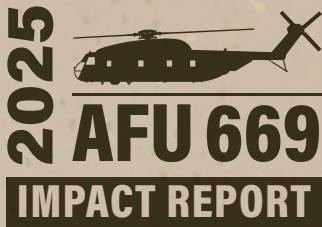

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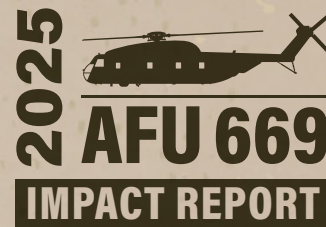
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About Unit 669



Unit 669 is the Israeli Air Force's Airborne Combat Search and Rescue Unit and one of the elite special operations units of the Israel Defense Forces (IDF).

Established after the 1973 Yom Kippur War, when the IDF lacked the capability to rescue downed pilots behind enemy lines, the unit was created to ensure that no soldier would be left behind. Over the decades, its mission has expanded significantly.

Today, Unit 669 is responsible for search, rescue, and medical evacuation of both military personnel and civilians, operating in combat zones, disaster areas, and complex emergency situations.

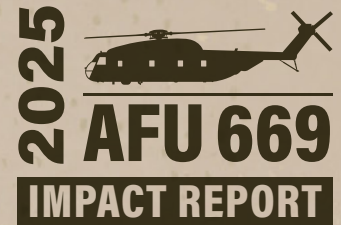
On call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, the unit responds to everything from battlefield rescues and special operations to terror attacks, mass-casualty events, and civilian emergencies.

During more than 50 years of operations, Unit 669 has rescued over 20,000 soldiers and civilians, serving as Israel's national airborne rescue force and a critical safety net for the country both within Israel and beyond its borders.

Many of these veterans go on to become leaders in Israeli society.

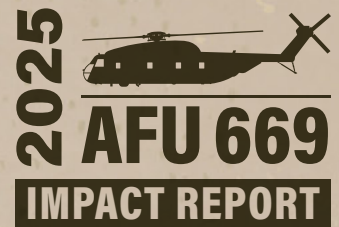

The Symbiosis of AFU669 & the Cat Organization



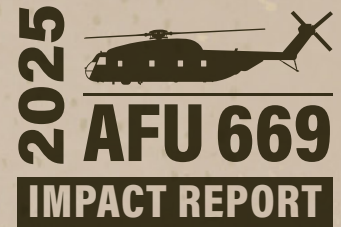

A Letter from our Executive Director



Dear Friends and Supporters,

These past 2 years have reminded us why Unit 669 exists.

For more than fifty years, we, the soldiers of Unit 669 have answered the same call: "In your distress you called, and I rescued you" (Psalm 81:7).

Whether rescuing pilots behind enemy lines, evacuating wounded soldiers from the battlefield, or reaching civilians in the most difficult circumstances, our mission has always been simple and sacred—to save lives.

Since October 7, that mission has taken on a new and painful intensity.

Unit 669 has operated across multiple fronts, in Gaza, in Lebanon, in the Middle East, and in countless emergency situations that most people will never hear about. Our soldiers have rescued the wounded under fire, brought families back from the brink of tragedy, and carried out missions in places where the line between life and death is measured in minutes.

This is where our mission begins.

The American Friends of Unit 669 exists to ensure that the soldiers and veterans of our extraordinary unit are never left alone. During our service, in our transition to civilian life, and in the long years that follow. 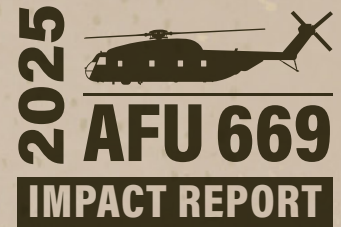

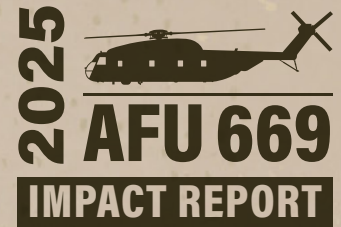

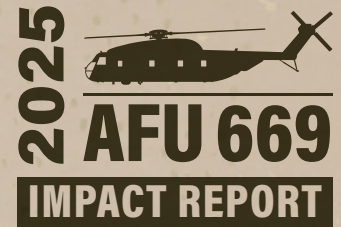

Project Overview

In response to the unprecedented operational intensity of the past 2 years and the events of October 7th, our organization spearheaded a dedicated project for processing combat experiences for Unit 669 reserve teams. This report summarizes the journeys of the four organic teams- 34, 42, 43, 46, who participated in intensive therapeutic journeys in Romania and the Berkshires, MA.

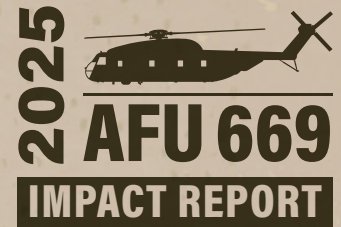
Program Structure

The therapeutic model designed for both teams consisted of a ten-day program:

- **Opening in Israel (2 Days):** Mental preparation, expectation setting, and establishing a safe group space before departure.
- **Journey in Romania (8 Days):** Staying in isolated cabins deep within the forest, far from daily stressors. The secluded environment allowed the operators to disconnect from operational alertness and engage in profound emotional work.
- **Methodology:** The program focused on group processing circles and workshops held in the heart of nature, facilitated by clinical psychologists and a professional support staff.



PTSD Prevention Workshop



Primary Focus

1. Processing personal loss (the falling of Ido Yehoshua z"l) and cumulative trauma from rescues under fire.
2. Bridging the gap between "combat mode" and civilian life; processing continuous operational stress.
3. Processing Loss: For the first time since October 7th, the team held an in-depth group discussion regarding the loss of their teammate.

Key Outcome

1. Transitioning from the "silent warrior" archetype to open emotional dialogue and shared grieving.
2. Strengthening unit resilience and providing tools for a healthier return to family and professional life.
3. Human Connection: The journey allowed them to shed their "combat armor" and reconnect with their shared humanity and brotherhood.

Summarize

The journeys in Romania have proven to be a critical tool in maintaining the mental resilience of reserve operators. Providing a full professional and logistical envelope allowed the fighters to focus solely on the work of healing. As one operator stated: "It wasn't just a trip; it was an opportunity to mend the cracks in our souls."

To the AFU669 team and our donors.

I'm writing this not only as a member of Team 43, but as a brother who finally feels like he can breathe again.

As you know, the past two years have been brutal. For those of us in Unit 669, the missions have been relentless. Nonstop rescues and extractions under fire in Gaza and Lebanon. We live on adrenaline and immediate action. Then came October 7th, and the unthinkable: we lost our brother, Ido Yehoshua, in Hamas's murderous attack on the southern communities. Losing Ido broke us. We are trained to save lives, yet we could not save his, and the silence surrounding that pain has been overwhelming.

The ten-day processing journey you organized for us in Romania was far more than just a trip, it was a lifeline.

For the first time, truly the first time, we were able to sit together as a team and openly talk about the trauma we have carried over the past two years. The constant operational stress, the weight of the rescues, and the images we cannot forget finally had a safe place to surface. This was possible thanks to the incredible work of the clinical psychologists and the entire professional support team. Knowing that every logistical detail was taken care of allowed us to focus fully on the difficult but necessary work of healing.

Most importantly, for the first time since October 7th, we spoke together about the loss of Ido. We didn't have to be the tough, silent warriors. We were simply brothers grieving one of our own. That shared, tearful conversation was the most meaningful moment of the journey. It wasn't about closure, but about finally opening the wound so that healing could begin, together.

This journey gave us the rare opportunity to step out of the combat zone and into a dedicated space for recovery. It was deep, it was exhausting, and it was profoundly meaningful. You didn't just organize a trip, you gave us the chance to reconnect with our humanity and begin mending the cracks in our souls.

From the bottom of my heart, and on behalf of every member of Team 43, thank you. Thank you for seeing us, for supporting us, and for giving us the opportunity to heal as a unit. We will never forget what you did for us.

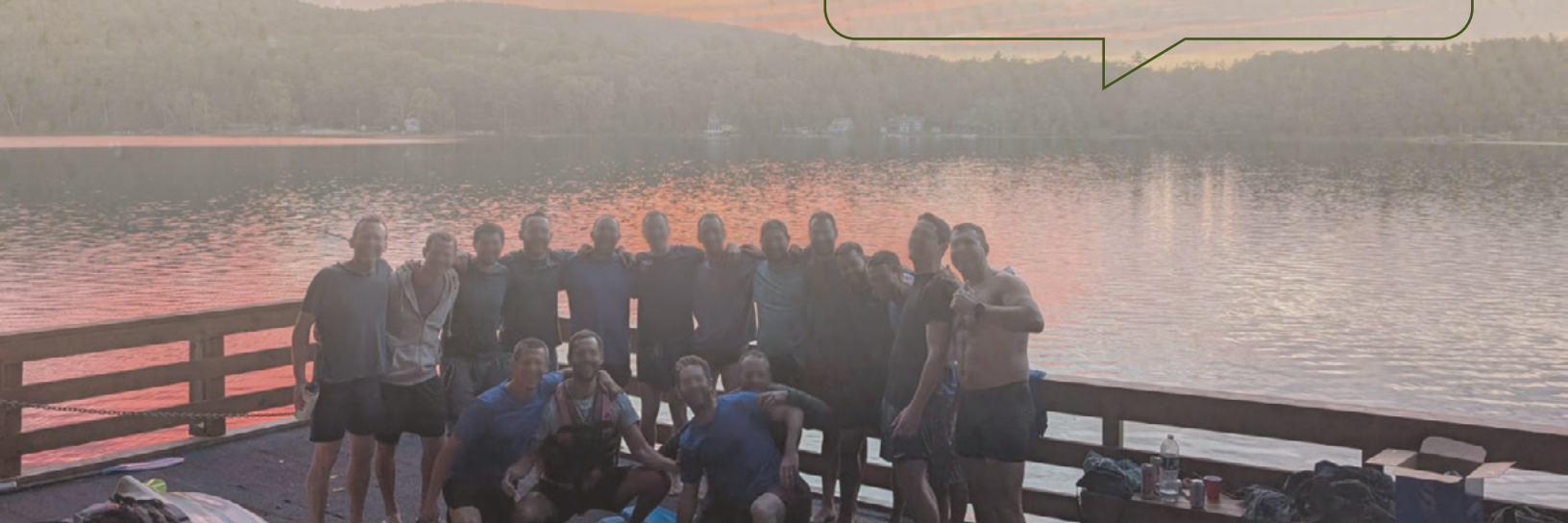

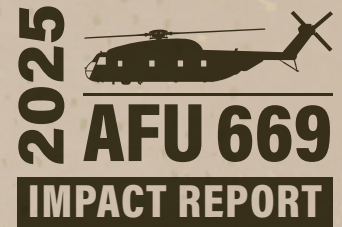

In early 2026, team 44, who lost Major Ben Shelly in Dec. 2023 is supposed to participate in such a workshop.

Maj. Ben Shelly, 26, a deeply principled and purpose-driven man from Kidron, was killed in a battle evacuating the wounded to a hospital in Shajaiya, Gaza on December 3.

A platoon commander in Unit 669. Ben encountered a fierce battle assisting the Golani Brigade. His team was hit by an exploding device killing Ben instantly. Eight other soldiers fell on that same day.

Always striving for success, Ben was perpetually concerned for the welfare of Israel and its people.

Dear wonderful people at the AFU669.

I am writing this as a combat soldier from team 45, and as someone who has been given a critical chance to step back into life after the war.

The past two years, particularly during the Iron Swords War and the relentless operations in Gaza and Lebanon, were nonstop. We extracted hundreds of wounded and fallen soldiers from the battlefield. Our job was to run toward the danger and carry the weight of every moment.

But when I finally came home, the war did not stop. I found myself in a constant state of hypervigilance. I was always wired, avoiding anything that reminded me of the missions. I began to realize that I was developing symptoms of PTSD, and the wall I had built around myself felt impossible to break through.

Then you stepped in by giving me a puppy and enrolling me in the Therapeutic Canine Training program.

Over the past six months, through the dedication of the professional staff and the power of the group training sessions, I have gone through a profound transformation. The dog is more than just a pet, he is a partner, a regulator, and an anchor. He forces me to stay present. He senses the shift in my breathing when I begin to spiral and brings me back to the ground. Thanks to him, I have slowly

begun to reorganize my life and face things I could not even approach before.

He has even become part of the team. Having him join us at the recent team PTSD workshop at the villa in the North was incredibly meaningful. It allowed the guys to see the process in action, and for me it reinforced his role as a constant, healing presence.

What you gave me is not just a dog, it is the feeling that I am not alone in this journey back to life after the war. He has become an inseparable part of my healing process and a constant reminder that my focus must remain on the future.

Thank you for your vision, your support, and for investing in this life-changing therapeutic path. You truly helped lift me back up again.

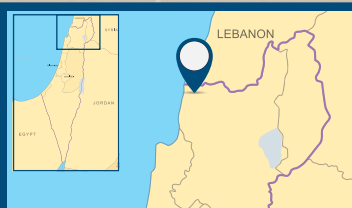

Dear supporters,

I want to share a few reflections from a powerful experience our team went through over the past three days.

Twenty members of our team, who fought together over the past two years in Gaza and Lebanon, gathered at a villa in Betzet for a recovery workshop. At first, the atmosphere was familiar; jokes, cynicism, quick hugs, and the usual ways we avoid deeper conversations.

But slowly, something began to change.

Through guided sessions, including yoga and a sweat lodge ceremony led by professional facilitators, the walls began to come down. In the sweat lodge, something remarkable happened. Hearts opened, tears flowed, and voices that had been silent for a long time finally spoke. It became a deeply healing and connecting experience. One that many of us had never experienced before.

For years, our team had struggled to reconnect on a deeper level. The intensity of the war, and the distance that came with time, had left much unspoken. This experience reminded us that the team is more than a unit, it is a home.

Over the following days, through workshops, conversations, and even physical activities like kayaking in the sea, we continued to process what we had been carrying. There was space for difficult emotions, but also for laughter, connection, and release.

When it was time to leave, something had shifted. You could feel it in the hugs. Long hugs filled with genuine love. Tough men allowing themselves, perhaps for the first time in a long while, to simply rest in the embrace of their brothers.

These three days came at exactly the right moment. They gave us the opportunity to reconnect, to heal, and to begin mending the wounds we carry from the past two years.

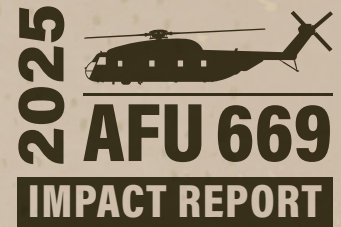

Emergency First Aid Medical Kits and Training Program



Empowering Israeli Families with Emergency Response Skills

As an Elite Search and Rescue Unit with decades of experience in trauma care and life-saving treatment, veterans of Unit 669 understand one critical truth: in an emergency, the first few minutes determine whether someone lives or dies.

In Israel, even before Oct. 7th, but especially since then, many families live under the constant threat of terror attacks, accidents, and other traumatic emergencies. In these critical moments, medical professionals are often minutes away, and many civilians lack the knowledge and tools to respond effectively.

To address this gap, we developed the Emergency First Aid Medical Kit & Training Program back in 2019- a comprehensive initiative that equips families with both life-saving equipment and the practical knowledge to use it.

Tens of thousands of Israeli personnel have already participated in our workshops and received life-saving kits. The training empowers civilians to act confidently and effectively in moments of crisis, turning bystanders into first responders.

In many cases, the knowledge and tools provided through this program can mean the difference between life and death during a terror attack, car accident, or other traumatic event.

Our goal is simple and powerful- to ensure that every Israeli family has access to a life-saving trauma kit and the knowledge to use it.

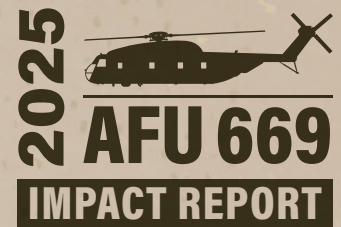

The program includes:

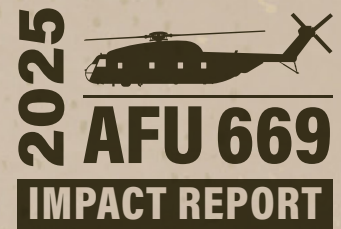
- **Life-Saving Trauma Kits;** Specially designed by combat medical professionals, these kits contain essential supplies needed to stabilize victims during a variety of trauma situations until professional medical teams arrive.
- **Interactive Training Workshops;** Led by Unit 669 veterans, including combat medics, paramedics, and trauma physicians. These hands-on workshops teach participants how to properly use the equipment and respond effectively during emergencies.

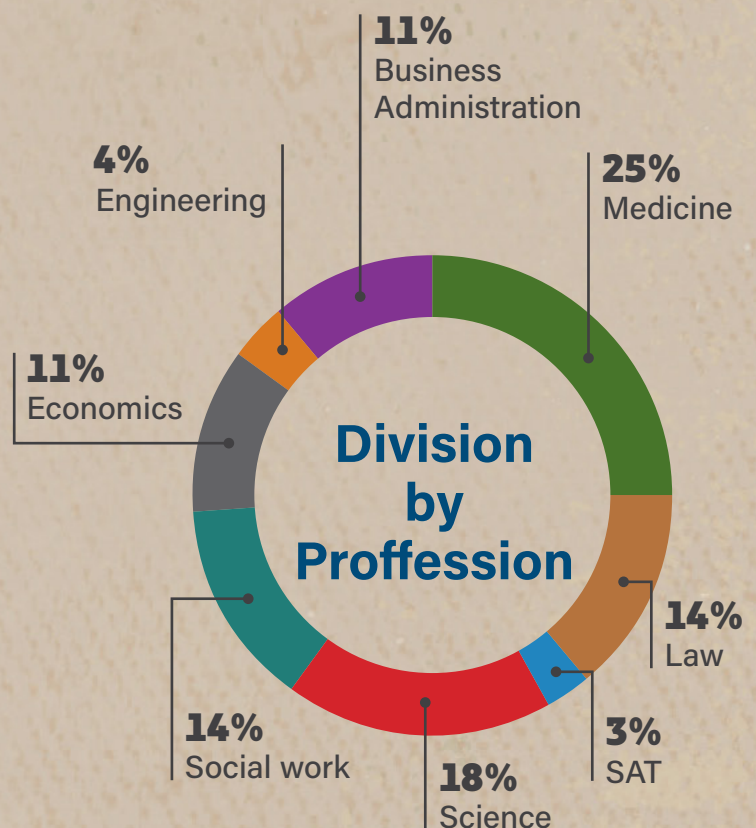

Scholarship Program

As veterans of Unit 669 continue to serve several weeks of reserve duty each year due to the demanding nature of their service, our organization provides academic and professional scholarships to help them pursue their goals in civilian life. Since October 7th, many reservists have served **300-500 consecutive days**, forcing them to pause their studies and significantly increasing the need for support this year.

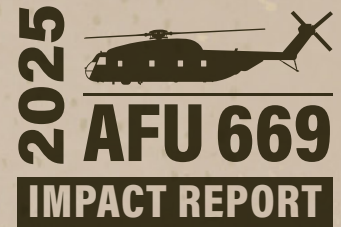
Each year, we award **80 academic scholarships** to veterans pursuing higher education, with **25% reserved for medical students**, many of whom later return to serve as physicians within the unit.

Scholarships are awarded based on **financial need and exceptional service** in Unit 669. In return, each recipient becomes an ambassador of our **"Pass It Forward" Program**, dedicating **130 volunteer hours annually** to social impact projects in their communities and creating meaningful, lasting contributions to Israeli society.

Dear Donors,

First, I would like to thank you for the generous scholarship and for your continued support of Unit 669 veterans.

Let me begin by sharing a bit about myself. My name is R.A., I am 32 years old, and I currently live in Cambridge, Massachusetts. I grew up in Gan Yavne, Israel. I am an only child, and my father was killed in a terror attack while working in Gaza when I was one year old only. In my free time, I enjoy spending time with my two amazing children. I am currently pursuing an MBA at MIT.

During my military service, I served for 12 years in Unit 669, the Israeli Air Force's Combat Search and Rescue Unit, most recently as a company commander. In this role, I led rescue operations and special missions within the unit. I was discharged from active service on August 23, but returned to reserve duty on October 7 as a company commander, replacing Major Ben Shelly (R.I.P.). I continued serving for nearly 320 days before relocating with my family to Cambridge to begin my studies.

I am currently in the first year of a two-year MBA program. I chose this field of study because, as a veteran transitioning from military service, I believe that an MBA will help facilitate my next professional chapter.

Pursuing a master's degree is especially meaningful to me because I am the first generation in my family to attend higher education. Being accepted to a top university like MIT was something I never imagined when I was younger. Much of my confidence and ambition came from my years of service and the

growth-oriented environment in Unit 669, which pushed me to strive for excellence.

Alongside my studies, I continue to volunteer with the AFU669 as a speaker and fundraiser. I help organize visits to the unit and participate in conferences across the United States. This work is very meaningful to me because it allows me to meet incredible people who support both the unit and the State of Israel.

Once again, I cannot fully express how grateful I am for your support. Your generosity not only helps me pursue my studies but also enables me to move forward in the next stage of my life and continue helping others along the way. It is deeply touching to receive such support from individuals who value my service.

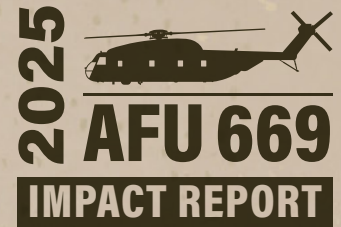

During my military service, I served in Unit 669, as a rescue operator and paramedic. My time in Unit 669 was one of the most meaningful experiences of my life. It taught me responsibility, dedication, perseverance, and the true meaning of teamwork. In addition to my operational duties, I also led medical training exercises both within my unit and in cooperation with other IDF units and international forces.

I am currently in the first year of a seven-year medical program. My interest in medicine began with an inspiring high school biology teacher in Canada, and it deepened significantly during my service in Unit 669, where I treated injured and sick patients. These experiences motivated me to expand my abilities and pursue a career in medicine.

Alongside my studies, I volunteer with the Cat Organization, where I serve as an instructor in our first aid courses and speak with soldiers preparing for their post-army travels, helping them plan safe journeys so they can return home safely.

I believe my contribution is meaningful because it allows me to share my knowledge and experience in ways that help others.

Our Mentorship Program supports 20 young Unit 669 veterans between the ages of 25 and 35, pairing each participant with an experienced volunteer mentor. The program is led by an organizational psychologist and a volunteer project manager.

Through this year-long program, participants receive tools for self-empowerment, critical thinking, creativity, and professional development, along with opportunities for networking and career advancement. The program helps veterans maximize their potential while encouraging their involvement in social initiatives, mutual aid, and civic engagement.

Beyond supporting the veterans themselves, the program also strengthens Israeli society. By remaining active role models in their communities, these veterans inspire younger generations to serve in the military and contribute meaningfully to the country.

Mentors and mentees meet regularly throughout the year, alongside group sessions that focus on shared learning, development, and collaborative problem-solving.

Over the past decade, the program has transformed the lives of many participants, leading to new careers, the creation of startups, stronger family foundations, and significant personal growth.

Building on this success and responding to the evolving needs of our veterans, we have recently launched the program in the United States to support Unit 669 veterans beginning their next chapter abroad.

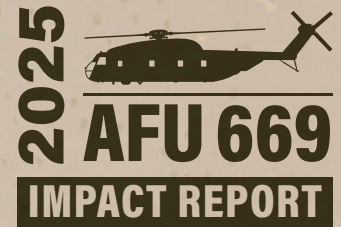

Operational and Tactical Equipment for the Unit and Reserve Forces



Since October 7th, Unit 669 and the broader IDF reserve forces have faced unprecedented operational demands. With more than 300,000 reservists mobilized, the need for specialized operational and tactical equipment has increased dramatically.

As an elite airborne combat search and rescue unit, Unit 669 operates in some of the most complex and dangerous environments. Extracting wounded soldiers under fire, conducting evacuations in difficult terrain, and responding to large-scale emergencies. These missions require advanced medical gear, rescue equipment, protective equipment, communication systems, and specialized tactical tools that must be available immediately and in sufficient quantities.

During wartime, official supply chains prioritize active-duty operational units, which can leave reserve forces and supporting teams facing critical equipment shortages.

In response, our organization has worked closely with the unit to rapidly procure and deliver essential equipment where it is needed most, ensuring that soldiers have the tools required to complete their missions safely and effectively.

At the same time, we recognize that the responsibility does not end on the battlefield. Alongside providing operational equipment, we also support our injured soldiers and reservists, helping them receive the care, rehabilitation, and assistance they need as they recover and transition back to their daily lives.

The experience of the past two years has made it clear that we must remain prepared for future emergencies. As regional tensions continue, including renewed escalations involving Iran in early 2026, maintaining readiness for extreme and rapidly evolving scenarios has become more important than ever. By supporting both the operational needs of the unit and the well-being of its soldiers, we help ensure that Unit 669 and its reserve forces can continue their life-saving missions whenever and wherever they are needed.

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In the Unit's first 50 years, we lost 11 soldiers, and in the last 2 years, since Oct. 7, we have lost an additional 9 brave brothers, all of whom fell on the battlefield while making the ultimate sacrifice- giving their lives while saving the lives of others.

Each fallen soldier left behind grieving families: parents, siblings, friends, and in some cases wives and young children. Many of these soldiers were reservists, and had already built families, and careers. Their loved ones now face the difficult challenge of rebuilding their daily lives - Emotionally, financially, and professionally.

Our organization works closely with these families to provide the support they need. For some, the help is financial or professional. For others, it is emotional and personal guidance. One widow shared with us that she had never managed the family's finances or investments and did not know where to begin. We connected her with a professional investment manager who now guides her through these decisions and helps secure her family's future.

Last year, we completed a Memorial Monument inside the Unit's base, creating a meaningful place where soldiers, families, and friends can gather to remember and honor those who fell.

In another case, we helped renovate from the ground up the home of the Ayeli family from Ashkelon, who lost their son, Lt. Shay Ayel (z"l), who served in the unit. Shay, who always put others first, was a 21-year-old soldier who fell in northern Gaza on December 21, 2023.

Shay was a true lifesaver. During combat, one of his fellow soldiers found himself caught between life and death. For Shay, the mission was clear - save him. And he did.

As a soldier, Shay viewed every challenge as an opportunity to grow and improve. His next step had already been set: he aspired to become an officer in the IDF.

Our Veterans Post-Service Workshop helps Unit 669 soldiers successfully transition from military service to civilian life after completing five years in the unit, two years longer than the standard compulsory service.

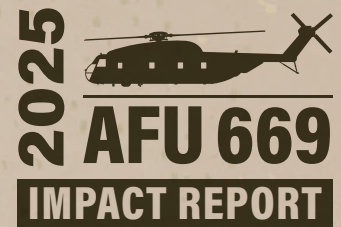
This extended period often creates a significant gap when veterans return to civilian life and reconnect with their peers.

Held several months before discharge and led by experts and professional mentors, the workshop provides practical tools, guidance, and psychological support to address both the emotional and practical challenges of this transition.

Participants gain knowledge in career development, education, personal growth, and life management, helping them bridge the gap between military excellence and civilian success while preparing them to become impactful leaders in their communities.

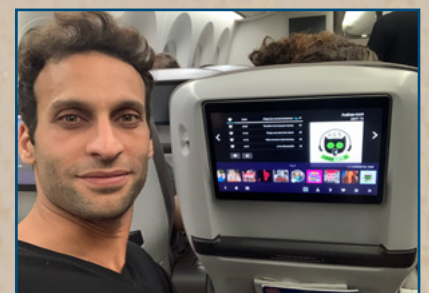

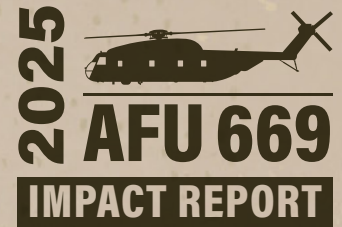
