GRANT IN ACTION

THE ISAIAH 117 HOUSE

Isaiah 117 House was awarded a \$12,488 grant through the Community Good Grants program from the Knox County Community Foundation that allowed them to purchase a full security system and install flooring in their Knox County Isaiah 117 House.

"The Knox County **Community Foundation filled** two of our biggest needs flooring and a security system. We had to have flooring, and they were able to step in and help with that."

The Isaiah 117 House provides a safe and welcoming location for over 250 children who have been removed from their homes by the Department of Child Services (DCS) in Knox County. The facility includes showers, baths, food,

bedding, and clothes.

Each child receives three days' worth of clothes, hygiene products, books, blankets, toys, and a Bible.

The overall goal of the Isaiah 117 House is to reduce each child's stress as much as possible. "We are here to serve the kids and do whatever we can to reduce the trauma in their lives," said Jacquelyn Cunningham, Isaiah 117's Knox County Program Coordinator. The Isaiah 117 House has volunteers ready 24/7 to greet

the child and get whatever he or she needs to make them comfortable.

Every Isaiah 117 House must have a security system with lights inside and out. "These types of security systems can be expensive, so it was amazing for the Community Foundation to step in and cover that expense," stated Cunningham.
