Dear friends,

Thanksgiving day is coming once again this week. For most of us the day will involve gathering with family and friends to share some time together and to share a meal together. These are such important times for us as we gathering with family and renew the ties that bind us. With all the great cooks we have in the parish, I have no doubt that the food at these Thanksgiving meals will not only be tasty and scrumptious, but will be abundant as well.



As I have come to know and love you these past twenty-five years, I know there would always be a place for me as well at your thanksgiving meal. And because I know your spirit of generosity, I know you would extend that invitation to other people who might be with me. "Of course, Father, bring them along, there will be more than enough for everyone." And when I got ready to leave, you would be quick to add, "Can I fix you something to take home?" What a great spirit of hospitality!

Well, I have some people to bring to Thanksgiving Dinner this year. I'm thinking of our school children at our sister parish in Haiti—St. James. We have about 960 students and staff in our grade school and high school. Now, I can't really bring them to your house for a meal on Thanksgiving, but I'd like to appeal to help us bring some food to them, not just on Thanksgiving but each day of the school year. These meals are pretty simple—rice and beans, with maybe some dried peas and perhaps some fish. The menu doesn't change much from day to day but for so many of the children, it is the only meal they will eat.

Even this simple meal costs money—about \$.45 per meal. And even this can get to be expensive when you are trying to provide food for 960 kids and staff for each day of school. We figure it costs about \$2.25 per week to feed one child, about \$9 to feed one child per month and about \$80 to feed a child for the whole year. Trying to do this for all the students and teachers can be a pretty big undertaking.



For the past several years at Christmas, we have invited people to give money to help provide food for our school children. We've called this "Haiti Gifts of Compassion." We've invited people to give money for food in honor of a loved one at Christmas. Once again we have set up a special kiosk in church where you will find gift cards that you can send your loved ones to tell them that you have honored them at Christmas by giving money for food in their name.

So I'm hoping you will join me in this effort. While the task before us may seem insurmountable, and what we can offer may be small, I think of the words St. Paul told the people of Ephesus, that God's power, working in our lives, can do for more than we can ask or even imagine. (Ephesians 3:20)

You can use the gift cards at the special "Haiti Gifts of Compassion" kiosk in church, or simply put your donation for food in the collection or send it to us at the parish office. I thank you, in advance, for loving our sisters and brothers in Haiti and honoring with the gift of food.

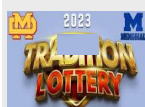

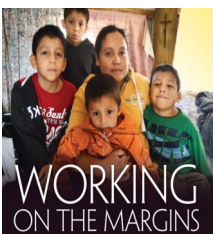

ON THE LOVE FOR THE POOR

We are reading from the Apostolic Exhortation *Dilexi Te* of Pope Leo to all Christians on the Love of the Poor



In that time, the needy and the sick, lacking the necessities of life, frequently found themselves forced to beg. They thus bore the added burden of social shame, due to the belief that sickness and poverty were somehow linked to personal sin. Jesus firmly countered this mentality by insisting that God “makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous” (Mt 5:45). Indeed, he completely overturned that notion, as we see from the ending of the parable of the rich man and Lazarus: “Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony” (Lk 16:25).

It becomes clear, then, that our faith in Christ, who became poor, and was always close to the poor and the outcast, is the basis of our concern for the integral development of society’s most neglected members. I often wonder, even though the teaching of Sacred Scripture is so clear about the poor, why many people continue to think that they can safely disregard the poor. For the moment, though, let us pursue our reflection on what the Scriptures have to tell us about our relationship with the poor and their essential place in the people of God.

MERCY TOWARDS THE POOR IN THE BIBLE

The Apostle John writes: “Those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen” (1 Jn 4:20). Similarly, in his reply to the scribe’s question, Jesus quotes the two ancient commandments: “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might” (Deut 6:5), and “You shall love your neighbor as yourself” (Lev 19:18), uniting them in a single commandment. The Evangelist Mark reports Jesus’ response in these terms: “The first is, ‘Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.’ The second is this, ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’ There is no other commandment greater than these” (12:29-31).

The passage from the Book of Leviticus teaches love for one’s neighbor, while other texts call for respect – if not also love – even for one’s enemy: “When you come upon your enemy’s ox or donkey going astray, you shall bring it back. When you see the donkey of one who hates you lying under its burden and you would hold back from setting it free, you must help to set it free” (Ex 23:4-5). Here the intrinsic value of respect for others is expressly stated: anyone in need, even an enemy, always deserves our assistance.

Jesus’ teaching on the primacy of love for God is clearly complemented by his insistence that one cannot love God without extending one’s love to the poor. Love for our neighbor is tangible proof of the authenticity of our love for God, as the Apostle John attests: “No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us... God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them” (1 Jn 4:12,16). The two loves are distinct yet inseparable. Even in cases where there is no explicit reference to God, the Lord himself teaches that every act of love for one’s neighbor is in some way a reflection of divine charity: “Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me” (Mt 25:40).
