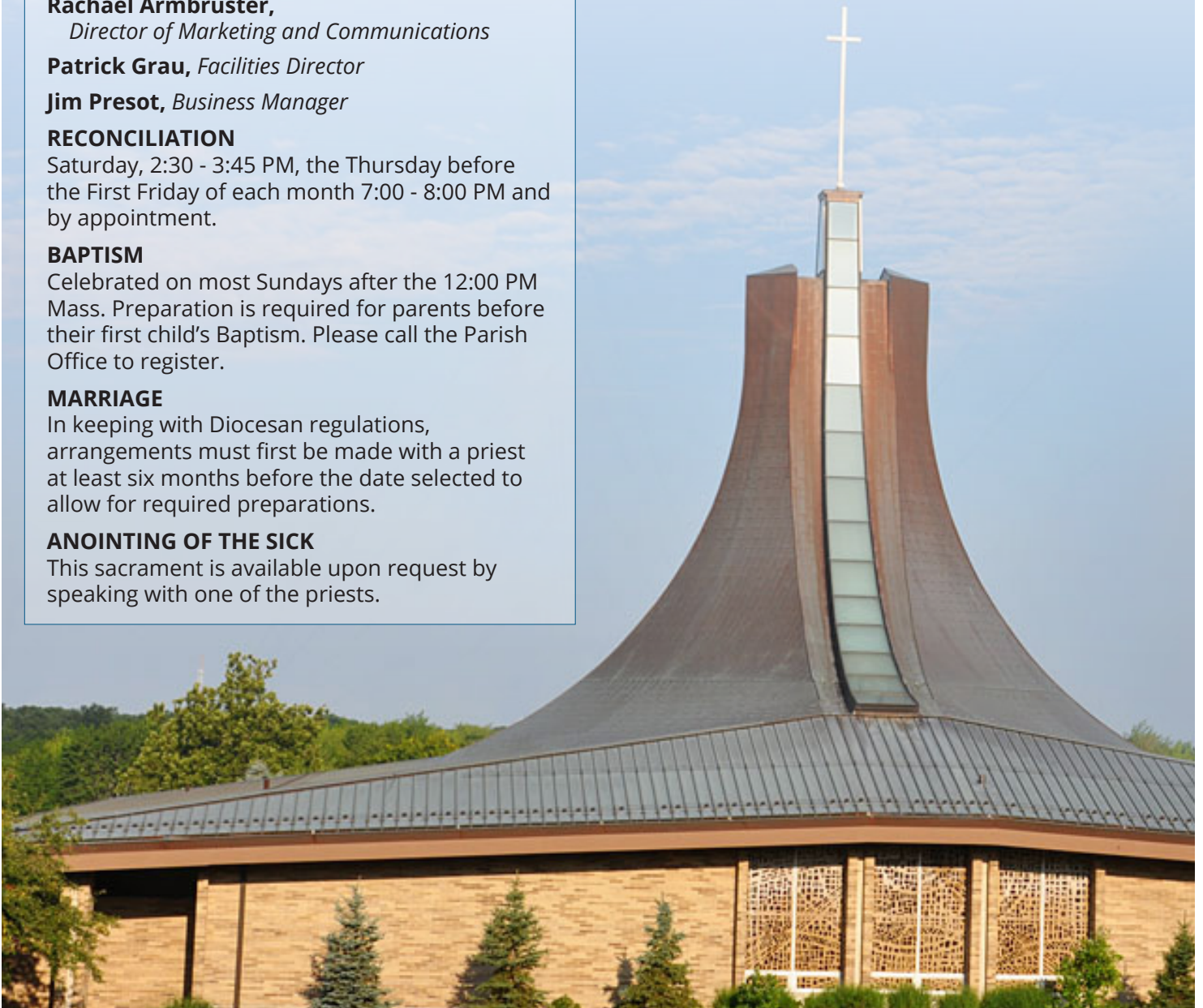

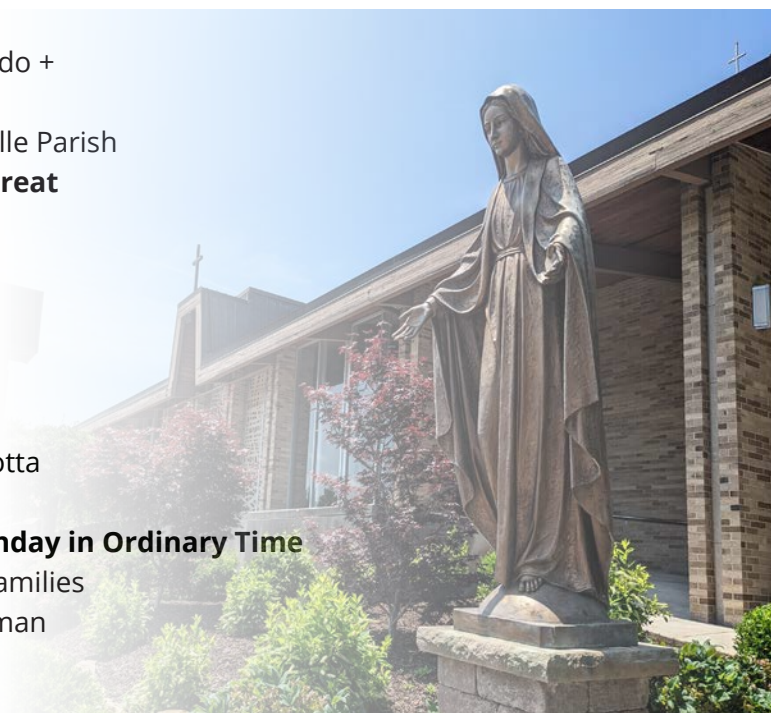

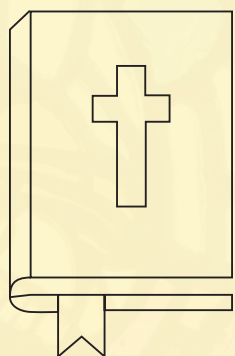

LETTER FROM THE PASTOR



HAPPY LABOR DAY WEEEEKEND!

On Monday, September 1st our parish offices will be closed in observance of the Labor Day Holiday and we have Mass at 9 AM.

LABOR DAY AS CATHOLICS!

Labor Day was not intended to signify the end of summer, or the beginning of school, or the start of football season. Labor Day is a national holiday in which we are to celebrate the economic and social contributions of workers. As Catholics, we have a rich history of Scripture and tradition pointing to the dignity of work and its true purpose. In 1981, Pope St. John Paul II released an Encyclical letter entitled, "On Human Work" which beautifully presents a Christian vision of the dignity of human work and the worker. In the introductory paragraph, he wrote: "Work means any activity by man, whether manual or intellectual, whatever its nature or circumstances; it means any human activity that can and must be recognized as work, in the midst of all the many activities of which man is capable and to which he is predisposed by his very nature, by virtue of humanity itself. Man is made to be in the visible universe an image and likeness of God Himself, and he is placed in it in order to subdue the earth." "From the beginning therefore, he is called to work. Work is one of the characteristics that distinguish man from the rest of creatures, whose activity for sustaining their lives cannot be called work. Only man is capable of work, and only man works, at the same time by work occupying his existence on earth. Thus, work bears a particular mark of man and of humanity, the mark of a person operating within a community of persons. And this mark decides its interior characteristics; in a sense, it constitutes its very nature."

We live in an age that has lost sight of the true dignity of work - precisely because we have lost sight of the dignity of the worker. This loss is one more bad fruit of the rupture which was wrought by sin. In the industrial age, men and women were often reduced to mere instruments in a society that emphasized "productivity" over the dignity of the human person, the worker. The technological age promised something different, but it has failed to deliver on that promise. Too often, men and women are still viewed as instruments and objects rather than persons and gifts. Even Science, a great gift meant to be placed at the service of the human person, human flourishing, the family and the common good, has often promoted a view of the human person as an object to be experimented on and disposed of at will. This fundamental error is the root of the contemporary culture of death.

Finally, John Paul II unveiled for his listeners an important understanding of the Incarnation, that Jesus, the "Divine Worker of Nazareth" also reminds us that 'life is more than food' and that work is for man, not man for work. What makes a life great is not the entity of gain, nor the type of profession, or the level of the career. Man is worth infinitely more than the goods he produces or possesses." What a profound and truly liberating message for us all to consider on this Labor Day! The Catholic Catechism instructs us: "Human work proceeds directly from persons created in the image of God and called to prolong the work of creation by subduing the earth, both with and for one another. Hence work is a duty: "If anyone will not work, let him not eat." "Work honors the Creator's gifts and the talents received from Him. It can also be redemptive. By enduring the hardship of work in union with Jesus, the carpenter of Nazareth and the one crucified on Calvary, man collaborates in a certain fashion with the Son of God in His redemptive work. He shows himself to be a disciple of Christ by carrying the cross, daily, in the work he is called to accomplish. Work can be a means of sanctification and a way of animating earthly realities with the Spirit of Christ. Work united to Christ can be redemptive." (Catechism 2247)

This Labor Day, spend some time balancing work, prayer and family. Remind yourself that your worth and dignity are not tied to the goods you produce or the money you make but rather your identity as a beloved son or daughter of a heavenly Father who loves you!

ST. GREGORY THE GREAT, PRAY FOR US!

On September 3rd, the Church celebrates a man truly worthy of the title history has ascribed to him – Saint Gregory the Great. He was born in Rome in 540 AD to a prominent and wealthy family. His father was a Roman senator and served as administrator of one of the seven regions of Rome. This allowed Gregory to receive a very good and well-rounded education, despite the extremely tumultuous times into which he was born.

Just a few decades earlier (476 AD), the Roman Empire in the west had fallen to various barbarian tribes who rushed over the borders of the empire and established a patchwork of barbarian kingdoms. However, just before Gregory's birth, the Emperor Justinian swept in from the east and reconquered Italy, reasserting Roman rule there. But all this tumult in such a short time left things a bit chaotic.

Gregory himself demonstrated a great talent for administration and was appointed by the emperor as Chief Magistrate of Rome. After his father's death, he used the family's wealth to endow several monasteries and even turned his family home into a monastery. He would eventually become a monk himself. Looking back at his life, Gregory would come to regard the time he spent in the monastery as the happiest years of his life. But his reputation as a man of learning and administration would lead him to be called upon very often by the Church. He would serve as the secretary to Pope Pelagius II, he would be sent as an ambassador to the imperial court in Constantinople. Later, Gregory would be named abbot of the monastery of Saint Andrew and eventually would be elected Pope (despite his attempts to flee and an appeal to the emperor because he did not want the job).

For much of Gregory's life, he suffered from ill health and was even bedridden for extended periods of time. But, despite these things, he became one of the most active and influential Popes in the Church's history.

During an outbreak of plague, he established hospitals to care for the sick and dying. When famine struck the city, he organized food distribution, even inviting the poor to dine at his own table. Because of the political turmoil, he had to assume de facto imperial powers, directing the military and diplomatic affairs of Rome. He negotiated peace with the barbarian Lombard tribe. Within the Church, he accomplished many things: reformed the liturgy, was credited with developing Gregorian Chant, preserved the tombs of saints and wrote their biographies, authored numerous treatises, advocated religious art in an age of illiteracy, enforced clerical celibacy, and greatly advanced the Church's missionary activity.

One day, before he became Pope, he was walking through the slave markets in Rome and was fascinated by these fair-skinned, light-haired people whom he had never seen before. He inquired who they were and was told that they were 'Angles,' to which he replied: "No, not Angles, but angels. How sad that people with such bright faces should be slaves of the prince of darkness when they should be co-heirs with the angels in heaven." Gregory would later send Saint Augustine of Canterbury and forty monks to bring the Gospel to them. Gregory died in AD 604, after having established the Church as the force that would shape the new civilization that would arise from the ashes of the old one. Each of us, perhaps not on as grand a scale as Gregory, is called to do the same, to shape our immediate world into a Christian society.

Never forget, the Lord Jesus is with us, always!

Ozanam Hunger Center Thursday Night Hot Meal (3 - 6 PM)

Volunteers are needed to work alongside members of our Good Samaritan Ministry to serve a hearty meal to the poor at the Ozanam Hunger Center at Holy Name Church in Slavic Village. Duties include preparing the buffet line, serving the food, and cleaning up afterward. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age.

St. Columbkille Meal Ministry - St. Columbkille School Kitchen (2:30 - 4 PM & 4:30 to 5:15 PM)

Kitchen workers are needed from 2:30 to 4:00 PM in the St. Columbkille School kitchen to help prepare food and pack meals. Drivers are needed to deliver the meals to our homebound parishioners between 4:30 and 5:00 PM. Report to the St. Columbkille School kitchen at 4:15 PM to pick up meals and a delivery route. Deliveries should take no longer than a half hour to 45 minutes to complete. Drivers may bring along a buddy to help carry the meals from the car to the person receiving the meals. Children are welcome to accompany an adult on deliveries.

Service Saturday, September 20

Food Pantry and Clothing Bank - Ozanam Hunger Center at Holy Name Church (8:30 AM - 12:30 PM)

Help is needed as St. Columbkille volunteers serve the poor at the Ozanam Hunger Center at Holy Name Church in Slavic Village. Duties include packing bags of fresh produce and staple foods, carrying the bags of food to the cars of the 120-130 families who come to the Center for food, and sorting and hanging clothing donations. All volunteers must be able to lift and carry boxes and bags of groceries and must be at least 13 years old. Under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.

Fleece Blankets for Adults & Children with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities - School Gym (9:30 AM - 12 PM)

Members of our Warm Up America Ministry will lead us as we make no-sew fleece blankets for the children and adults at Hattie Larlham, a not-for-profit organization that provides care and support to children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. No-sew fleece blankets are easy to make. If you can tie a simple knot, you can help make a blanket and provide comfort and a big smile to those cared for at Hattie Larlham. All supplies will be provided. School-age children are welcome to volunteer, but those under the age of 16 must be accompanied by an adult.

36th Annual Appalachian Collection - St. Basil the Great Parking Lot (8 AM - 6 PM)

This year, the Appalachian Collection will support those in need residing in the Appalachian Mountains in the Eastern Kentucky area. The Knights of Columbus of Our Lady of Charity Council 14406 would appreciate donations of household goods, including small appliances, cooking utensils, dishes, sheets, blankets, towels, all clothing and toys. Monetary donations will also be accepted and are greatly appreciated. We also need help removing donations from cars and placing them in the 53' long trailer. 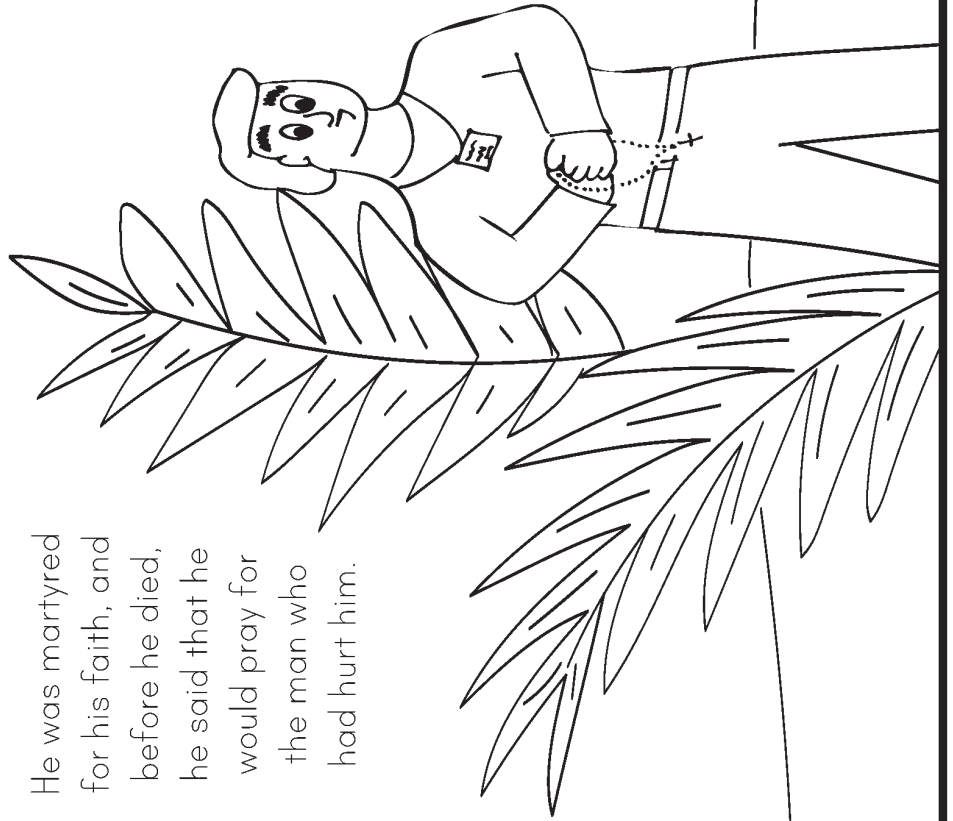

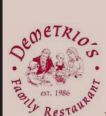

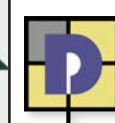
