

Dis de los Muertos "Day of the Dead" IT IS NOT HALLOWEEN!

Dia de los Muertos is a Mexican festival where families welcome back the souls of their deceased relatives for a brief reunion that includes food, drink and celebration. It is a blend of Mesoamerican ritual, Spanish culture and Catholic religion. The gates of heaven open on October 31st to allow children to return for 24 hours; adults return on November 2nd, All Soul's Day. Mexicans see a cyclical view of the universe, death being an integral part of life. The souls return to feast, drink, dance and play music with their loved ones. The living treat them as honored guests, visiting graves or setting up of rendas (altars) in their homes.

Many symbols are used to welcome the deceased. Ofrenda often have 3 levels, representing heaven, earth and the underworld. The 4 four elements are included: water, wind earth and fire. Water is left in a pitcher to quench the thirst of the deceased. Papel picado, paper banners, represent the wind. Earth is represented by food, especially Pan de Muerto, Bread of the Dead. Fire is represented by candles, which help the deceased find their way.

Sugar skulls with the deceased's name on its forehead are placed on the *ofrendas*. These are colorful, friendly skulls, not like Halloween skulls. Bread of the Dead is a sweet roll topped with sugar and bone-shaped bread; they can be dunked in coffee or hot chocolate. Fruit, meats and other foods are also served. Cempazuchitl or marigolds, are orange flowers that grow in Mexico in the fall, and are used to decorate graves, and placed on paths to the ofrendas to guide the spirits to the altar, due to their potent smell. Copal incense is burned, symbolizing transformation from the natural world to the spirit world and taking prayers to heaven. Calaca, skeletons, symbolize death personified. La Catrina, a woman skeleton, is decorated in fancy clothes and a big hat with feathers, is the most famous. Monarch butterflies which overwinter in the mountains of Mexico are believed to hold the spirits of the dead, returning the dead to earth to visit their relatives.
