which has been evolving since August 2017, responding to the promptings of the Holy Spirit and listening to the voices of Catholic Christians calling for inspiration, guidance, and opportunities for dialogue, even during the Covid Pandemic.

Since this beginning, the group has hosted events concerned with the future of our church and the future of our world.

We have been fortunate to have had inspirational companions from the start of our Journey of Discernment in May 2020 right up to our recent Lenten Journey 2023



began with a question from Core Group member Rosa Murray, introducing our first session. What exactly do we mean by the Common Good? She invited us to reflect on this in the context of our discipleship. She reminded us of Pope Francis' focus on the significance of the Gospel of the Transfiguration of Jesus to his Apostles, who did not understand him; and also how this event challenges us to authentically follow him in Word and Deed. We were invited to "ascend a high mountain in the company of Jesus and to live a particular experience of discipline as God's holy people." The first path would enable us to listen to Jesus during this time of grace, both through the scriptures and through our sisters and brothers, especially in the faces and stories of those who are in need. The second path challenges us to rise and not to be afraid, resisting the temptation to cling to religiosity.

DISCERNMENT DURING THE PANDEMIC

In April 2020 as Scotland experienced the first COVID-19 lockdown the **Core Group of the SLN began reflecting on the Future of the Church** After a Time of Pandemic and how that related to our vision and mission.

Reflecting on Pope Francis' leadership we saw clearly the centrality of discernment in his life, and in his papacy, and his hope for a discerning Church.

The question was: how during this time of Pandemic could we come together and pray, dialogue and discern new ways of being Church?

Through prayer and discernment, we felt prompted to embark on an online Journey of Discernment. A journey that would seek to enable us to become a discerning community - a community that engaged in a process of mutual

REFLECTING ON THE SIGNS OF THE TIMES

Reflecting on the feedback from all who had journeyed with us we felt prompted to continue this process of prayer, dialogue and discernment on the 'signs of the times' with the aim of discerning how the Spirit was prompting us to respond individually and as community.

This led us to address a range of issues that had emerged during the course of our sessions or were issues that we as followers of Jesus had to address. Some of the issues were internal Church issues - power and authority, governance, ministry etc and others related to how we as followers of Jesus respond to the cry of the poor and the cry of the earth

I am encouraged to be the church I would like to see. We are the church and we can take responsibility for our own faith formation, and for our own spiritual growth and nourishment. Where two or three are gathered in Jesus' name we are promised he will be there. In the SLN his presence for me is certainly felt."
