## CAMPFIRE CONVERSATION HOW IT CAN STRENGTHEN YOUR BROTHERHOOD MINISTRY

It's summer—time to change things up, get out of your usual meeting place, and take your conversation and ministry to the campfire. So, how can the simplicity of a campfire help strengthen your Brotherhood Chapter or men's ministry?

There's nothing like a relaxing campfire, especially at night, to set the stage for a real sense of community and intimacy—the kind that can deepen knowledge of one another, of God, and of your connection with nature, and of all that can contribute to spiritual growth. Here are some things to try around the campfire this summer.

- 1. You can invite newcomers and introduce them to your group. Men may be more inclined to accept an invitation to a casual campfire gathering—especially if it involves campfire food and drink— than to what feels like a more formal gathering in a church meeting room.
- 2. You can connect with youth, strengthening their knowledge about who you are and what you do and their comfort with growing into your parish Brotherhood ministry.
- 3. You can share personal faith journey stories in a relaxed setting. Hint: have a couple of your long-time members ready with their own stories as a way of setting a comfortable tone for others to share.
- **4. You can listen to the silence of nature,** reflecting and praying individually and then offering intercessions with the whole group.
- 5. You can share life challenges and seek input and prayer from your Brothers. Again—if you can prime the pump with one or two ready to share about their own challenges, it will feel easier for others to share.
- **6. You can sing,** even encouraging your Brothers that have them to bring musical instruments to add to the fun.
- 7. You can offer a Bible study grounded in Biblical symbolism around fire. A Biblical concordance can point you to lots of stories and verses your group can explore together.
- 8. You can end your campfire with a simple service such as Evening Prayer or Compline. Just ask everyone to bring along a Prayer Book, hard copy or digital, to guide your worship.

- 9. You can begin to explore now what you want your Brotherhood Chapter to do in the 2025-2026 church year. What ministry projects would you like to try or repeat from the past church year? What went well during the church season just concluding? What didn't go as well? What are your goals as you go forward? It isn't too soon to reflect and begin your planning process.
- 10. You can do some team strengthening with some simple, fun, teambuilding exercises or games you can easily search out on the internet. This can even be as simple as posing a question and asking each person to answer it. What is your favorite food? What has been your favorite place to visit so far? How about a favorite book, movie, or hobby? The possibilities are endless and all of this will help to build relationships among your ministry group.

As you consider an evening campfire for your group, don't forget to eliminate barriers to



participation.
For example, is someone uncomfortable driving at night? Offer to pick them up and get them safely home. Does someone have eldercare or child care responsibilities that would

interfere with them coming? Come forward with an offer of respite care, using your spouses or others in your parish to help. Does someone have mobility issues or a fear of falling on rough terrain? Work to make your setting as safe and comfortable as possible, even including chairs that are easy to get in and out of and bathroom facilities nearby. Are some of your members on a restrictive diet? Make it known that you will have some foods on hand to accommodate different dietary needs. Anticipate the needs of your group members and communicate that you have thought of everything. You'll be glad you did!





## Spotlight BROTLIBBIA BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW

Most Brothers know that the Brotherhood's Discipline of Service identifies seven focus ministries (brothersandrew.net/service). Scouting and Youth is one of them. The Brotherhood Scouting Committee puts our Scouting and Youth ministry into action.

Many Brothers were Scouts when they were young. If they're like most of us, the memories from their time in Scouting are some of the fondest from that time. The Brotherhood's Scouting committee aims to help ensure that today's youth, particularly Episcopal young people and young people in Scout units chartered to Episcopal congregations, have those same kinds of memories.

What are some of the things that the Scouting Committee does to help today's youth have positive experiences?

National Jamborees: Every four years Scouting hosts a National Jamboree at the Summit Bechtel Reserve in Central West Virginia. A major focus of the Scouting Committee is to ensure there is an Episcopal presence at each National Jamboree. Some of the things we do include:

- Staff an Episcopal Display in the Faith and Beliefs area of the Jamboree. This display exposes Scouts attending the Jamboree to the Episcopal Church and Episcopal beliefs. At the last Jamboree, visitors to the display were given a kit to make Anglican Prayer Beads after completing an activity related to Anglican saints.
- Ensure there is an **Episcopal** Eucharist at the **Jamboree.** The celebrant of this Eucharist has been the Bishop of West Virginia for the last four Jamborees. Typically, about 400 Scouts attend this Eucharist.




 Recruit Episcopal Chaplains to serve during the Jamboree.

Duty to God: Help Episcopal Scouts fulfill their Duty to God. The Committee developed and received approval from Scouting America for Episcopal-focused youth religious awards. We're sure many Brothers remember earning their God and Country award when they were Scouts.

What can an individual Brother or a Chapter do to support this ministry? Here's a few ideas:

- Become a Merit Badge Counselor: A Merit Badge Counselor is a person who enthusiastically shares their expertise with Scouts in one of about 140 areas. All of us have areas where we're an expert. By volunteering to be a Merit Badge Counselor, you can introduce a Scout to your area of expertise and expand that Scout's skills, perhaps even introducing them to a skill that will develop into a lifelong career or hobby.
- Become a Mentor for one or the Youth Religious Awards: As a Religious Award Mentor you will work with one or more Scouts and your Rector/Priest-in Charge to help the Scout(s) fulfill their Duty to God and deepen their faith. This role is an excellent fit with the Brotherhood's Disciplines of Prayer, Study and Service.
- Help out with a local Scout Unit: There are several roles where an individual Brother can serve. They include:
  - •Serve as a Charter Organization Representative (COR). In a Scouting America unit, the COR role serves as a liaison between the unit and the organization chartering the unit. If your congregation charters a Scout Unit, the COR may be a member of the congregation. However, in many units, the person serving in the COR role isn't a member of the congregation so communication isn't as good as it could be. A Brother, particularly one with Scouting experience, taking on the COR role will result an improved relationship between the congregation and the unit because that kind of a COR understands how both organizations work.
  - •Serve as a member of the Unit Committee. The Unit Committee is the "back office" for the Scout unit. The Committee ensures that the unit has the wherewithal to deliver the Scouting program to the youth members. Roles, such as Treasurer or Advancement Coordinator, might be a good match for an individual Brother's skills.
  - Serve as a Youth Contact Leader. A Brother who relates well to youth may choose to serve as a

## REFLECTIONS ON LISTENING AND LEARNING TO GROW THE BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW

Let me share some observations of what has been taking place in the field. One of the reasons I joined the Brotherhood was fellowship—meeting other men who were like-minded. Jesus Christ is at my core.

In my story my dad was in the newspaper business. Unfortunately, Brother Charles Butcher

had a dream of running his own shop. We didn't know it at the time but he had PTSD from World War II. His B-17 was shot down twice with him landing in the English Channel. He was the lone survivor each splash down. Obvious question: "Lord why me and not the other guys?" For you, fellow combat veterans, I know you have asked that question, "Why?"

Dad had ants in his pants. He was careful about making friends due to the losses he

suffered in combat. By the time I graduated from high school we had moved six times. It was a challenge to make any long-term friends knowing that another move might be around the corner. My SF-86 Questionnaire for a National Security Position update stipulated 49 different locations when I settled at Scott Air Force Base, IL, in 1994. There were five more moves before we planted roots in Louisville, KY. My next relocation will be to the columbarium, St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Anchorage, KY.

I joined the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in January 2000. For the first time in my life I started making long-term friends. These relationships are a very humbling gift from the Holy Father. COVID-19 was awful. Our national trusted news sources made it even worse as we are finding out now. Fear griped the nation. People felt safe in their local church. To this day, many are afraid to leave their local safe zones. Isolation and loneliness prevails.

It is obvious we must accelerate interaction between Brothers, Chapters, and within Assemblies. We are also encountering voids in leadership positions. Why? It is time, my Brothers, for us to lead others into relationship building activities once again. We would like you to consider

visiting nearby Chapters to listen to their needs, wants, and their future aspirations. We have a disconnect between our service center and the local Chapter. We are here to serve where we are needed most. Zoom calls are most effective after we have met people face-to-face in their own back yard or around the kitchen table. Previously, we

dispatched marketing tools to each Board of Director Brother to show our colors.

Our next step, like Jesus, could be going out two-by-two to listen to men in the pews. Let's set an

example by creating prayer partners. Lastly, we are asking you to take turns leading the Brotherhood weekly noonday prayer sessions.

These activities will better equip you with the listening and learning sessions we need to be having at the Chapter level.


