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


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NEXT SUNDAY READINGS:

2026 RED MASS: Every year, the church prays to the Holy Spirit for wisdom and guidance for public servants in what is known as the Red Mass. The liturgy, a tradition in the islands for decades, is timed to precede the opening of the state Legislature, which occurs in January.

The Diocese of Honolulu invites all to attend the 2026 Red Mass, scheduled for **9 a.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 14, at the Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa**. Bishop Larry Silva will celebrate the Mass; the keynote speaker is Connie Mitchell, executive director of the Institute for Human Services.

Mitchell's topic is "Radical Justice in Tumultuous Times." Her talk will explore how each generation presents unique challenges to people of faith as they strive to heed God's call to "do justice, while loving mercy and walking humbly with God" (Micah 6:8).

Parking at the co-cathedral is free. For special accommodations for persons with disabilities, call (808) 585-3347. Those who are unable to attend in person can watch a livestream of the Red Mass at honolulucathedral.org/redmass.

This Sunday we celebrate **the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord**. With this feast the Church brings the Christmas Season to close and turns our gaze to the inauguration of the public ministry of Jesus Christ.

On **Feast of the Baptism of the Lord**, we will renew our own baptismal promises and by doing so we again remind ourselves of who we are, we have been reborn in Spirit as the children of God cleansed from the Original sin and received abundance of God’s sanctifying grace.

We recall we are **coheirs** to God’s Kingdom and that by living out our **Baptismal promises** we truly witness to the world who we are and one day hope to attain the eternal happiness that awaits the faithful!

Baptism is not just a moment or event from our past but a call – vocation and promised made that shaped our identity and our mission. We are to carry out our mission faithfully today as disciples of Jesus Christ!

Scripture Reflections

Old Testament: Isaiah 42: 1-4. 6-7

Background Context: The reading taken from the book of prophet Isaiah is known as the first servant song. It was written during a difficult time for the people of Israel when many were living in exile and lost hope (**the Temple was destroyed in 587 BC**). The Israelites were longing for freedom, justice and God’s closeness. Through prophet Isaiah God promised a **Servant** who will bring justice, healing and light, not through force but through gentleness and faithfulness.

The **Servant** is described as one chosen and upheld by God, filled with God’s Spirit. The **Servant** does not shout or crush the weak. Instead, he cares for “**the bruised reed he shall not break, and a smoldering wick he shall not quench...**” **Isaiah 42:3.**

This imagery evokes the fragile and broken condition of Israel and yet God tells us that His way is not harsh or violent. The **Servant** is also given a clear mission; to be a light to the nations, open the blind eyes, and to free people trapped in darkness.

Application to Life: Prophet Isiah's words showed first that God's saving plan is not the rejection of those who are weak, vulnerable or spiritually battered. We can take comfort for we are "**the bruised reed or smoldering wick...God will not quench**", that we are not crushed or cast aside.

Even in our dimly or faintly burning faith, we can have hope. For whom among us have not been physically or emotionally wounded, spiritually weary or fragile from life's hardships, but still exist and are not entirely broken?

The **Servant** (Jesus Christ) offers tender care, not harsh judgement, to the vulnerable and often marginalized. Most of all that the **Servant** (Jesus Christ) is not only for Israel, but for all people, as Isiah stated further; "**the coastlands will wait for his teaching.**" **Isaiah 42: 4.** That is other nations, that all of us, like Israel, the Gentiles also can wait for God in hope.

How amazing are those words spoken by prophet Isiah over 500 years (**587 BC**) before the birth of Jesus Christ. We are truly reminded that God embraces all men and women and we are all called to salvation by God.

We are reminded that God desires our freedom not just from our physical chains, but from our fear, sin, injustice, and despair.

As Christians, we clearly recognize that this passage from prophet Isiah points strongly to Jesus Christ.

Jesus' life, ministry, and by His baptism revealed Jesus as **the Servant** prophet Isiah spoke prophetically long ago and it is He who brings God's gentle yet powerful justice into the world.

This reading from prophet Isiah speaks to us personally too for through our own baptism, we share in Jesus Christ's mission - vocation. We are called to be **servant just like Jesus Christ**, not loud or demanding, but like the **Servant** (Jesus) gentle, faithful and compassionate.

In a world full of noise, conflict, and injustice, God calls us to be His **servants** who heal rather than harm, who lift others rather than crush them, extend forgiveness instead of bitterness. God does not ask us to be loud or perfect but, but to be **faithful servants** who bring hope where it is most needed, in our own families, church community, society, state, nation and the world. Wherever we are sent, that is where we are to be as husband, wife, single, young or old, like **the Servant, Jesus Christ.**

New Testament: Acts 10: 34-38

Background Context: The 2nd reading taken from the Acts of the Apostles records a turning point in the early church. Peter is speaking in the house of Cornelius, a Roman centurion and a Gentile. Until this moment many Jewish Christians believed that God's promises were meant mainly for their own people.

Through this encounter, Peter comes to a new and powerful understanding, "**God shows no partiality.**" God does not favor one race culture, or nation over another. Anyone who fears God and does what is right is welcome by Him. Peter then summarizes the heart of the Gospel. He speaks about Jesus of Nazareth, anointed by God with the Holy Spirit and power.

This connects closely with Jesus' baptism. When the Spirit came upon Him, and His public mission began. From that moment, Jesus went about doing good, healing the sick, restoring the broken, and freeing those oppressed by evil. His actions revealed that God's love in a visible way.

Application to Life: This passage reminds us that faith is not only about beliefs but about how God's love reaches people through actions. Jesus did not stay distant or selective. He crossed boundaries, spoke to outsiders, touched the untouchables, and welcomed those who were excluded. His life shows that God's kingdom is open to us all.

For us today, this message is both comforting and challenging. It comforts us because it assures us that God accepts us as we are, regardless of our background or status. At the same time, it challenges us to reflect God's impartial love. We are called to move beyond prejudice, division and narrow thinking.

Like Jesus, we are invited to go about doing good. In our own daily lives, through kindness, honesty, compassion and service. Our baptism calls us to be signs of God's inclusive love, bringing healing and hope to a world that still longs for justice, peace and unity.

Gospel: Matthew 3: 13-17

Background Context: A child asked an old priest during a baptismal ceremony, what changes after the water is poured. The old priest replied, "**Nothing you can see immediately, but everything that truly matters.**" That simple answer captures the deep meaning of baptism that today's gospel taken from Matthew invites us to reflect on. **The baptism of Jesus is not about repentance from sin, it is about identity, mission, and belonging.** By choosing to be baptized, Jesus steps fully into human life. Jesus does not remain distant or separate but enters the same waters as everyone else.

Baptism becomes a sign of solidarity, God choosing to stand with humanity, especially with those who feel broken, guilty, or unworthy. At the heart of baptism is identity when the voice from heaven declared Jesus as the beloved Son. **It revealed a truth that applies to all who are baptized.**

Application to Life: **Baptism tells us** who we are before it tells us what we must do. We are not defined first by our successes, failures, or social roles, but by God's love. In a world that measures worth by performance and approval, **baptism reminds us** that we are already accepted and loved.

Baptism is also about God's presence. The descent or the Spirit shows that **baptism is not just a symbolic washing, but an encounter with God who dwells within us.** The Spirit empowers us, guides, and strengthens us for life's challenges. We are never sent alone; God walks with us.

At the same time, **baptism is a calling.** Just as Jesus emerges from the waters, ready to serve, heal, and proclaim God's kingdom, our **baptism commits us to live differently.** It calls us to choose justice over indifference, compassion over judgement, and service over selfishness. **Baptism is not a private event;** it is a public commitment to reflect Jesus Christ in the world.

Finally, **baptism gives us hope.** Even when we fail, even when life become uneasy, **baptism assures us that God does not withdraw His love.** The waters remind us that God continues to cleanse, renew, and call us again.

The **Baptism of the Lord** invites us to remember **our own baptism**, not as a past ritual, but as a living reality that shapes who we are and how we live each day. We are baptized not for comfort, but for service, chosen by God to be light and hope in the lives of others.
