Through the powerful and sobering story of BC Eddy's final alarm, this course aims to increase awareness among responders about the hidden risks these trailers pose. Participants will gain critical insight into early identification, unique safety challenges, and essential initial response strategies—key

	Before the Burnout: Coaching for Resilience and Readiness - Freddie D. Broome Most firefighters don't seek counseling or chaplain services when the weight of the job becomes overwhelming. Instead, they often carry the burden silently—until stress surfaces in unexpected and harmful ways. This class introduces professional coaching as a proactive, confidential, and judgment-free alternative to support mental wellness. Grounded in real fire service experience, coaching meets firefighters where they are—helping them decompress, build emotional resilience, and grow personally and professionally. Through practical tools and real-life scenarios, participants will explore how coaching can be a step toward sustainable well-being before burnout becomes a reality.
	New Hazmat Team Leaders - Basic Needs for Your Tool Box - Robert Mercer This course will review multiple means of attaining training, resources, and funding for hazardous materials response teams and will be focused towards new leaders or smaller response teams with funding constraints.

2:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m.	Detailed Leadership, Aggressive Tactics - Micah Rains Intentional leadership is the foundation for success within an organization, on the fire ground, or when building relationships. From the bay floor to the battalion car, leadership will rise or fall based on investment in the little details. This class takes an in-depth look at what it means to be detailed with your people, and your profession. It will look at how good leadership can translate into aggressive tactics on the fire ground. Qualities of a good leader, how to deal with your people, and supporting the mission of the fire service are topics that will be discussed. To win on the fire ground we must be able to lead in the firehouse. The Mistake We Make While Trying to Learn From Our Mistakes - William Voorhies All incidents, regardless of their size or impact, challenge public safety professionals - from field level responders up to incident managers - to build on previous experience and learn how to improve future responses. So, why aren't we better at it? This class explores how most responders often begin that process with an incorrect - though very human - mindset that can limit learning. It teaches students to properly orient their analysis of the myriad decisions that make up any emergency response. It then provides the student with a five-point system for after action review designed to identify opportunities to improve decision-making relevant to performance and response in the future; a system which can be easily employed for small, short operational period events up to crisis-level large-scale events.
