## Cedar Key Lions Club







### Chipley Falling Waters Lions Club

#### Falling Waters Lions Club Welcomes Florida Diabetes Camp Guest Speakers

The Falling Waters Lions Club welcomed two inspiring guest speakers at its October 27 meeting — Prescott Cowles, Executive Director of the Florida Diabetes Camp, and Tami Stevens, Camp Director.

Together, they shared how the camp continues to change lives for children with Type 1 diabetes across Florida through programs that blend medical care, education, and fun-filled activities.

#### A Legacy of Service and Support

Founded in 1970, the Florida Diabetes Camp was the first overnight residential diabetes camp in Florida. Over the past five decades, it has grown into a statewide network offering six week-long summer camps and multiple family or "bring-a-friend" weekend programs each year.

Each camp is uniquely tailored to specific age groups, allowing children to learn essential diabetes management skills alongside peers facing similar challenges. The camps are fully staffed by volunteers—including doctors, nurses, dietitians, counselors, and mental health professionals—many of whom return year after year.

Financial need is never a barrier, as the organization provides partial and full scholarships to ensure every child who wishes to attend can do so.

#### **Camp Dogwood Acres in Chipley**

Right here in Washington County, Camp Dogwood Acres serves as one of the Foundation's newest camp locations. Attendance has grown rapidly—rising from 16 campers last year to 34 this year. The next session will take place June 9–13, 2026, and is open to children ages 7–12.

Camp Director Tami Stevens shared her deeply personal connection to the program. Diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes in 1997, she attended the camp that same summer and has returned every year since.

"Diabetes camp is the best thing my parents ever did for me," Stevens said. "It showed me I wasn't alone and gave me lifelong friends who understood exactly what I was going through."

#### **Building Confidence, Skills, and Community**

At Camp Dogwood Acres, campers enjoy a traditional camp experience—archery, swimming, arts and crafts, team-building games, and a glow-in-the-dark dance party—while also learning vital self-care practices. Under supervision, children monitor blood sugar, manage insulin, and gain independence in a safe, supportive environment.

Stevens shared one touching story about a camper who arrived newly diagnosed and hesitant to participate.

"By the end of the week," she said, "he told us he wished he'd been diagnosed sooner—just so he could have come to camp earlier."

#### **Community Support Makes It Possible**

The Florida Diabetes Camp receives no government funding. **Each week-long session costs approximately \$30,000 to operate,** covering meals, medical supplies, insurance, and facility rentals. It costs around \$500 per child per week to attend, but thanks to scholarships and community partners like the Lions Clubs of Florida, every child who wants to attend has the opportunity.

The organization also offers opportunities for volunteers of all ages. Teens 15 and older can serve as Counselors-in-Training, while those 19 and older can become full counselors. All training is provided on-site.

"Every year we see lives changed," said Cowles. "These kids leave knowing they're capable, confident, and part of a community that truly understands them."
