

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD

CHRISTMAS (Vigil Mass): Over the last week we may have invoked the O Antiphons, seven titles of the child whose birth we celebrate today, each describing an important attribute: Wisdom, Lord, Root of Jesse, Key of David, Dayspring, King, Emmanuel. That final antiphon is one of the two names for Mary's infant son we hear at the end of this evening's Gospel. Emmanuel comes from Isaiah, and as Matthew helpfully points out, it means "God is with us" (1:23). The passage from Isaiah that we hear first, however, is from a much later era, when the prophet rhapsodizes after he and the Israelites finally return home after years in exile. Once more does God delight and rejoice in the now-victorious Chosen People. They have been saved. This brings us to the second name Matthew mentions, the name by which we know him best: Jesus. This name, which comes from the angel who visits Joseph, means "Jehovah (God) is salvation." In Jesus, whose birth we



celebrate this evening, God remains with us and saves us, enabling us to be with the Lord now and forever, in this life and the next. For this Christmas gift beyond compare, we give praise and thanks to God.

IGLESIA DE SANTA CRUZ DECEMBER 18 - 24, 2023

The Theme of the 3rd Sunday of Advent is "HOPE... our LIVES as PROPHETIC MESSENGERS to OTHERS." We continue to grow in understanding and practice of the Advent period of time given to OTHERS." We continue to grow in understanding and processes and the us through the Church to prepare the way of the Lord . . . then at Christmas, we will arrive ready to celebrate our Savior's birth. Praying and waiting during Advent allows us to welcome Jesus into our hearts and to strengthen our faith in him.

We need prophets to teach us to "watch" and "listen." Often we are prophets for each other. Belonging to the Church makes us a community of believers. Within that community are prophets who help us discover God's presence and his will in our lives. When we are faithful to the presence of God in Scripture, we become prophets for each other.

John the Baptist knew and taught that the Lord's coming . . . the 1st Advent . . . would bring justice and peace . . . "Make ready the way . . . welcome him eagerly . . . " Roll out the carpet because with his coming we receive wholeness, forgiveness and power. St. Paul, a Jewish apostle, reminds us to "Rejoice, give constant thanks, don't give up hope." Paul was convinced that the coming of Jesus would bring peace and perfection in holiness and wholeness of spirit and body and mind.

Isaiah teaches of being sent "... to bring glad tidings to the lowly, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners." In Luke 1, we read Mary's song: "The hungry he has given every good thing, while the rich he has sent empty away."

We are waiting for our salvation . . . we are waiting for Jesus' second coming. The salvation we wait for with joy will free each one of us as well as the community of believers, but the focus of this salvation will be the poor and the lowly, not the rich and the powerful. Jesus comes so that our lives may no longer be scarred with poverty and oppression. He comes to give us hope for our spirits, souls and bodies.

"Jesus is here among us right now, but it takes faith to see him. He is in the people we meet every day—our family, our neighbors, our friends. He is the stranger who needs our welcome, the poor who need our kindness and understanding, the hungry who need a share of our food, the homeless who need shelter, the lonely who need our companionship, the sick and the dying, the outcasts who need our help in finding self-respect. If we don't recognize Jesus in these people, we aren't worthy to call ourselves his followers." (P. Fischer)

Pray with your family around the Advent wreath. If you don't have an Advent meditation book, read the story of the Nativity in the Bible, the story of St. Nicholas (it is December 6), the Church's teaching on the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (December 8, holy day), the Feast of St. Juan Diego, Our Lady of Guadalupe, St. Lucy (December 13). Then with a Jesse Tree (a simple tree branch in a pot of sand) put up close to the wreath, start telling the story of our salvation, beginning with Creation, the story of Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob all the way to when Mary said "Yes" to the angel which led to our Savior's birth, and make and hang a symbol for each of these stories. Have your own Family Posadas beginning on the 16th and ending on Christmas Eve. So many ways to prepare for Christmas!

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT: Rejoice! From the entrance antiphon ("Rejoice in the Lord always" [Philippians 4:4] to the first reading ("I rejoice heartily in the Lord" [Isaiah 61:10]), from the psalm ("My soul rejoices in my God"[61:10b]) to the second reading ("Rejoice always" [1 Thessalonians 5:16]), we hear this word again and again on this Gaudete Sunday. But why does Paul add the word *always?* Who can be joyful al- THIRD SUNDAY ways? Many of us may not be joyful right now. We may be mourning the death of a loved one, or anxious about Advent the health of a family member, or disappointed about the raise we didn't get, or struggling with all that we need to

do this week to be ready for Christmas. How can we rejoice when our life is not joyful? John the Baptist points to the answer; it's the one he testified to, who now has come, God's greatest gift: Jesus Christ, In Christ, we can always find joy. For he came to share in our losses, our anxieties, our disappointments, and our struggles and, in so doing, revealed the kingdom of God, where we receive the glad tidings, the healing, the liberty, the justice, the consolation, and the salvation that Isaiah proclaimed. After all, Jesus himself testified that he fulfilled this passage.

What difficulty is hindering your joy? Can you see Christ bring you joy in its midst?



OUESTIONS ABOUT VEILING AT MASS

Why do Catholic woman wear chapel veils at Mass? The veil is meant to be an external sign of a woman's interior desire to humble herself before God, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. As women, we are symbols of the Church—the Bride of Christ—and, as a priest once said, "the veil is meant to be a visible reminder of the perfect submission of the Church to the loving rule of Christ." "The veil is a visual sermon . . . a public proclamation before the Lord that He IS the Lord and that we love Him and that we are ready to obey him. It's a totally counter-cultural statement proclaiming obedience in the midst of a culture that is totally permeated with this article of 'I will not serve'" The veil is also a sign of the great dignity inherent to a woman, who has the potential to receive life within herself . . . both human life and the supernatural life of God. This is an important message the world needs to hear, now more than ever!

When should I wear my chapel veil? Wear your veil anytime you are in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, whether in a Catholic church for Mass or simply passing through.

Do I have to wear a lace mantilla? What about hats and other types of head coverings? When we say "veil," we simply mean "covering" of any kind. Although many women choose lace mantillas because of their femininity, more important than the type of veil we use is the need for a proper interior disposition. Similar to a religious habit, your veil is a public proclamation of your desire to submit to the will of God for your life, and of your commitment to answering the universal call to holiness and continual conversion. Keep these things in mind when you wear a veil in the presence of God.
