The Healing Power of Jesus is our teaching in RCIA this Wednesday. We, the community of centering, and members of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church, have been called to bring healing to those we can. Our world is experiencing so much suffering, and we, through prayer, can discern how we can go about offering healing. We can be open to service:

Volunteering in our soup kitchen

Volunteering in our schools to help children read and understand math

Volunteering in a battered woman's or a homeless shelter

Helping our elderly neighbors in their most urgent needs

Volunteering in hospitals and in nursing homes, visits to the elderly

Volunteering in our church's teaching ministry with youth and adults

Jesus healed Peter's mother-in-law and so many more who were brought to him. After preaching the Good News to the people, Jesus would go off by himself to pray so that he could be renewed. The apostles and others followed him because there were so many needs and they wanted Jesus to continue healing more people. This, too is our experience. So many people need our help. and so we fill our time with prayer and trying to find ways and time to help those who need us.

To be able to heal and to offer Jesus' peace to others, we need to have prayer in our lives. We need quiet moments away from the crowds to figure out who we are and what we are called to do for Jesus. We need to set time aside to turn to God and so seek Jesus' presence, to renew ourselves and to grow in our friendship with him.

John Henry Newman wrote this prayer:

God has created me to do him some definite service;

He has committed some work to me which he has not committed to another.

I have my mission . . . I am a link in a chain, a band of connection between persons.

He has not created me for nought. I shall do good. I shall do his work.

If I am in sickness, my sickness may serve him; in perplexity, by perplexity may serve him;

If I am in sorrow, my sorrow may serve him. He does nothing in vain, He knows what he is about. Amen

The Catholic Church challenges us to hunger and thirst for what is right so that, like God, we might fill the hungry with good things. (Darring)

'The Catholic Church continues Jesus' healing ministry through the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick among those who suffer and who face death. FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME — Mark wastes no time in his Gospel getting to what Jesus said and did. From the beginning of his ministry Jesus "talked the talk" and "walked the walk," both proclaiming and demonstrating God's power,. Today Mark tells us that when Jesus taught in the synagogue he astonished the congregation because he spoke with such authority. After all, he spoke as God's Son. Then before he left, he responded to a man with an unclean spirit by driving out the demon that possessed him, amazing the people all the more. They likely recalled that Moses had said that God would raise a prophet, a Messiah, from among their kin. Surely this was him. So they told their families, their friends, and their neighbors, and before long "his fame spread everywhere throughout the whole region of Galilee" (Mark 1:28). Perhaps some of them also recalled Jesus' first words when he came to Galilee: "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand" (1:15). Of course Jesus was able to fulfill both the talk and the walk, for in him the kingdom of God was at hand. Since Jesus promised that he would be with us always, let us accept the challenge to talk the talk and walk the walk as well.

How do you exercise the power you have to bring the Lord's care and healing to others?



QUESTIONS ABOUT VEILING AT MASS

Why do Catholic woman wear chapel veils at Mass? The veil is meant to be an external sign of a woman's interior desire to humble herself before God, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. As women, we are symbols of the Church—the Bride of Christ—and, as a priest once said, "the veil is meant to be a visible reminder of the perfect submission of the Church to the loving rule of Christ." "The veil is a visual sermon . . . a public proclamation before the Lord that He IS the Lord and that we love Him and that we are ready to obey him. It's a totally counter-cultural statement proclaiming obedience in the midst of a culture that is totally permeated with this article of 'I will not serve'" The veil is also a sign of the great dignity inherent to a woman, who has the potential to receive life within herself . . . both human life and the supernatural life of God. This is an important message the world needs to hear, now more than ever!

When should I wear my chapel veil? Wear your veil anytime you are in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, whether in a Catholic church for Mass or simply passing through.

Do I have to wear a lace mantilla? What about hats and other types of head coverings? When we say "veil," we simply mean "covering" of any kind. Although many women choose lace mantillas because of their femininity, more important than the type of veil we use is the need for a **proper interior** disposition. Similar to a religious habit, your veil is a public proclamation of your desire to submit to the will of God for your life, and of your commitment to answering the universal call to holiness and continual conversion. Keep these things in mind when you wear a veil in the presence of God.
