

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: Today we hear Jesus compare the kingdom of heaven to ten young women who are responsible for going out to meet the bridegroom when he comes. He is delayed and the lamps of five begin to go out. Desperate for more oil, they leave to buy more just as the bridegroom approaches. Returning with lamps well lit, they discover it's too late. They did not consider that they might have been welcome, even with lamps that were sputtering out. They missed their chance to meet the Lord because they judged themselves unworthy. The fact is, no matter how well-prepared we are, we are all unworthy. The fact is, no matter how well-prepared we are, we are all unworthy. Perhaps those five should have stayed and pleaded for the Lord's mercy. We have seen the Lord have mercy on those who ask for it. So even as we try to always be prepared, let us take consolation in the words Paul uses to reassure those who begin to lose hope due to the delay in the Lord's coming: "[do] not grieve like the rest . . . the dead in Christ will rise" (1 Thessalonians 4:13, 16).

IGLESIA DE SANTA CRUZ NOVEMBER 13 - 19, 2023

Our teaching in RCIA on Wednesday has to do with **Social Justice.** What is our responsibility as Catholic Christians to seek justice for our families, our communities, our country? The Gospel parable for Matthew 25:14-30 is about a man leaving his property for his servants to take care of. He trusts them to do well for him.

This is the reality of what God has called us to do. He has left us to take care of the earth wisely. He has provided such abundance in so many places from that which the earth produces. We still see examples of local people farming their land, growing crops to freeze and can for the winter, raising cattle, sheep, goats, turkeys and chickens to use for meat for their families, growing alfalfa for the animals they raise. God has created the land so that *life* can be sustained on it. Yet, at times, we see that we don't always use God's gifts wisely.

We know that part of our responsibility in caring for the land is learning about all those who suffer because of unequal distribution of wealth or because of droughts, flooding, illegal taking of land by corporations (for mining, for lumber, for oil . . .), hunting animals that are extinct or in danger of becoming extinct.

Of all the resources we have, water and the land have given us so much. Yet, we have wasted water, polluted our rivers and oceans, eroded our land, overcut our trees (especially in the Amazon valley), strip mined and strip cleared lands left with poisonous waste. Our air has become smog filled, especially in the larger cities of the world. Plants which once graced our earth cannot be grown anymore. Large homebuilders have cleared land in flood plains to build homes to sell to people who don't realize that when the floods come, as they did in Houston in September, their homes are destroyed.

"Men and women bear a unique responsibility under God to safeguard the created world and by their creative labor even to enhance it. Safeguarding creation requires us to live responsibly within it, rather than manage creation as though we are outside it. The human family is charged with preserving the beauty, diversity and integrity of nature as well as foster its productivity." (U.S. Bishops, Renewing the Earth)

How do we use the gifts God has given us? In our school or work, do we use our ability to act, to work hard, to work ethically and to be good examples? In our Parish, do we follow our baptismal call to pray as a community each Sunday and Holy Day and do we joyfully celebrate and **participate** in the Mass? In creation, do we use our ability to fix things that are broken and do we respect and take care of nature? Are we "global warming deniers" and refuse to see the toll our actions are taking on our planet? How do we try to help those suffering for lack of food and shelter?

There is so much we can do to practice Social Justice. We just need to look beyond our own needs and reach out to others.

HOW DO YOU PRAY FOR THE DEPARTED SOUL? Throughout the year, we can have Masses said for the souls in Purgatory, include them in our daily prayers and Rosary intentions, and pray for them when we're near a cemetery. Mother Angelica said, "Every time you pass a cemetery, it's time for a little prayer: 'Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord.' It's just common sense that you help some of them get out of Purgatory."

Venerable Fulton Sheen said, "As we enter Heaven, we will see them, so many of them, coming towards us and thanking us. We will ask who they are, and they will say 'a poor soul you prayed for in Purgatory.''

WHAT ARE OTHER WAYS TO PRAY FOR THE HOLY SOULS IN PURGATORY? Every indulgenced work is specified by the Church as capable of obtaining either a Plenary Indulgence or a Partial Indulgence, that is, the full or partial remission of the temporal punishment of sin.

WHAT IS A "HOLY SOUL" IN PURGATORY? A Holy Soul is someone who is now in Purgatory. They are also referred to as Poor Souls. The use of "Holy" emphasizes the state of justice in which they died; the use of "Poor" their need for our prayers, given the purification they are undergoing.

HOW LONG DOES YOUR SOUL STAY IN PURGATORY? The degree of imperfection in each soul which needs purifying is really known only to God. It can also be mitigated by Masses, prayers, indulgences, etc., as described earlier. This means that although relatively speaking different souls will require different degrees of purification that will determine their "time" in purgatory, we cannot know how "long" that will be.

Complicating this is the fact that while the extent of purification might be compared with time, time is at best an analogy for our benefit. Purgatory is not in space and time, and therefore, while it fits our experience to speak of it that way, it doesn't fit the reality. Thus, St. Thomas Aquinas speaks of the condition of the angels, the saints and the poor souls as being aveternity (a condition between time and eternity). This term expresses that unlike God who is always changeless (eternal), some things in the saints and angels do change (they grow in knowledge of God, for example). The saints and angels, therefore, experience both realities, God and their creaturehood.
