Two Belton ISD elementary students named **National Math Stars**

Two Belton ISD elementary students have earned national recognition as National Math Stars, a highly selective program that invests in top-performing math students and their families for 10 years.

Third-grader Aayana Jain of Lakewood Elementary and fourth-grader Rosalinn "Rosie" Canto of Sparta Elementary were among just over 100 students nationwide selected for the honor this year. Both students advanced through a rigorous process that included multiple math assessments and family interviews before being named National Math Stars.

The National Math Stars program, launched in 2021, identifies the nation's highest-achieving secondand third-grade math students. Each selected student and

their family receive up to \$100,000 of support over 10 years - including academic advising, math tutoring, technology and enrichment opportunities — to nurture long-term success in STEM fields.

"This recognition not only affirms the exceptional talent of our students but also highlights the importance of building strong math foundations early," said Dr. Deanna Lovesmith, Belton ISD Director of GT Services. "Math Stars invests in students for the long haul, and the fact that Belton ISD has two students among this year's honorees speaks volumes about the strength of our teachers and the potential of our students."

This was Belton ISD's first year to participate in the program. From the district's initial pool of 167 top

Parker Marietta Parker October 29, 1925 -September 5, 2025

"O love of God, how rich and pure! How measureless and strong! It shall forevermore endure the saints' and angels' song!". The Love of God by F. M. Lehman

Marietta Parker's last breath came quietly in the early hours of Saturday, September 6, 2025, at her Buffalo Creek apartment in Waxahachie, Texas. During the prior weeks, she had gone about her business as usual, calling her grandchildren and greatgrandchildren to sing her annual and highly-anticipated rendition of "Happy Birthday" on the phone. No one's birthday was complete until that call came. A service in celebration of her extraordinary life was held on Wednesday, September 17, 2025, at 11 a.m. in the sanctuary of the First Baptist Church of Belton, 506 N. Main St., Belton, Texas, followed by family welcoming guests. Her longtime friend and cohort. Charlie Robinson, will officiate. A viewing was offered on Tuesday, September 16, 2025, from 5 to 7 p.m. at Dossman Funeral Home, 2525 N. Main St.,

Belton. Willie Marietta Vickrey was born in Wortham, Texas, on October 29, 1925, to Will (Smiley) and Lola Wood Vickrey. On that day, another Wortham newborn could be found, just across the railroad tracks and a mile down the road. His name was Bobby. They

would meet 21 years later. By 1929, the family had moved to Kosse, near her grandparents, where her brother Leroy was born. Soon after, they moved to Mexia, where she attended the Mexia public schools. The Great Depression was in full gear and they were fortunate that her father was always able to find work. When she was 14, her dad built their house on McKinney St., where her parents resided for another 40 years.

Marietta graduated from Mexia High School in May of 1943. In May of 1946, she graduated as Valedictorian of Westminster Junior College in Tehuacana with an Associate of Arts. Soon after graduation, she was spotted selling tickets at the Mexia picture show by a young sailor just home from his wartime service, Bobby Parker. He said it was love at first sight for him. She was not quite that impetuous, but he persevered, and they were married on September 1, 1946.

While Bobby was the head football coach at Mexia High School, their first son, Bobby, Jr., was born in January of 1949. Son Mark followed six years later in January of 1955.

In 1957, the little fam-

ily moved to Brownwood where Bobby was named Dean of Students at Howard Payne College. Marietta completed her education there and received her Bachelor of Science degree in Business in May of 1959. The following Fall, they moved to Waco where Bobby went to work in the administration office at Baylor University. He worked his way into a teaching position in the Baylor Physical Education department. She put her degree to use by teaching typing and bookkeeping at Waco High School. Many a draft-eligible young man was recruited to her typing class with the promise that, if they would let her teach them to type and they were drafted into the Army, they would never see the front lines. Her teaching made it possible for Bobby to work on his doctorate, which she typed, edited, and undoubtedly shared her opinions. She would always speak fondly about their ten years in Waco. They developed many lifelong friendships with people they met at Baylor and Columbus Avenue Baptist Church.

Marietta, Bobby and Mark moved to Belton. Bobby, Jr., married Kathy Blackburn in September of that year and was attending Baylor University. Bobby (now Dr. Bobby E. Parker, Sr.) had accepted the position of Vice-President at Mary Hardin-Baylor College. Marietta retired from teaching in order to devote herself to Bobby's endeavors. In 1971, Bobby was named President of the college. They served as President and First Lady for the next 20 years. During their tenure, MHB became a coeducational college and advanced to university status. These transitions did not come easily, but the outcomes were rewarding. Through it all, Marietta was Bobby's closest confidante and advisor. She would say that her primary career in life was as First Lady. She would also add that it was a non-paying position. She loved it and the faculty and students loved her. She crocheted an afghan for every faculty member's child when they got married. Entertainment was her forte', whether it was for faculty, students, governors or local and foreign dignitaries, they and their spouses were equally welcomed.

In the summer of 1969,

Mark married Ann Becker in late December of 1977. One week later, Bobby, Jr., and Kathy introduced Bryce into the world and Marietta (now Grammy) found her next new purpose in life- grandmother. By the end of 1983 she had six grandchildren who she adored. Mark and Ann lived in Midland, but that was never too far to

attend a recital, concert or ball game. Bobby, Jr., and Kathy lived in Odessa, Sweetwater, then Graham. Their boys never lacked for Grammy's attention either. She made every effort to bring the grandkids together. Every summer they would get a week at "Camp Grammy." She would keep two or three of the kids at a time to swim, attend Belton's 4 th of July events, or maybe a side trip to New Orleans. Lake houses at Lake Belton and Possum Kingdom were regular meeting spots. To have been able to watch and be a part of her grandchildren's growing up, the graduations and weddings, and to see them all become good moms and dads, husbands and wife, was more than she could have ever expected. She thought her 12 great-grandchildren were amazing and felt blessed that she had lived long enough to know them and for them to know her.

Bobby died on December 16, 1999, after 53 years of marriage. Their life together was a series of adventures. Travel had become a major part of their retirement. By the time of his passing (including UM-HB-related travel), they had visited all 50 states, 30 countries: Israel, Greece, Japan 3 times, to name a few, and experienced 20 cruises. Not bad for a couple of Depression kids from

In her memoir, she stated that her preferred epitaph would say "She loved her Lord, her family and friends with all her heart and soul." To this end, she excelled, just as her Lord, family and friends loved and cherished her. As daughter, wife, mother, mother-in-law, Grammy, sister, aunt, teacher, Sunday School teacher, and First Lady, she gave it all

She was a member of the Alpha Chi, Kappa Delta Pi and Delta Kappa Gamma sororities. She was also a long-time member of the Woman's Wednesday Club of Belton. In 1972 she was recognized as an Honorary Alumna of Mary Hardin-Baylor College. For eleven years she served on the "Absolutely Incredible Kids" luncheon committee for the Bell County Campfire Boys & Girls organization. She held her church membership at the First Baptist Church of Belton for over 55 years.

Marietta was preceded in death by her parents, husband, Bobby, granddaughter Hayley Ann Parker, and brother, Leroy Vickrey.

She is survived by her sons, Dr. Bobby E. Parker, Jr. and wife, Kathy, of Waxahachie, and Mark Parker and wife, Ann, of Dallas; grandchildren: Bryce Parker and wife, Courtney, of Waxahachie, Matthew Parker and wife, Rachel, of Katy, Koye Parker and wife, Brooke, of Waxahachie, Andrew Parker and wife ,Emily, Christian Parker and wife, Lindsey, and Kaitlin Camp-

bell and husband, Brian, all of Dallas; and twelve greatgrandchildren: Griffin Khoury, Chase and Hayes Parker; Riann and Reese Parker, Caroline, Samantha and Madden Parker; Parker and Hayley Campbell; and, Briggs and Boone Parker.



Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election, November 4, 2025

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 59)

SJR 59 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish two special funds in the state treasury to provide a dedicated source of funding for capital projects and equipment purchases related to educational programs offered by the Texas State Technical College (TSTC) System. The proposed amendment requires the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts to manage the funds, including managing any investment activities related to the funds and making the funds available for use by the TSTC System. The proposed amendment authorizes the TSTC System Board of Regents to use amounts distributed by the Comptroller to the available fund to acquire land, construct and equip buildings and other permanent improvements, make major repairs and rehabilitations of buildings or other permanent improvements, acquire capital equipment, acquire library books and materials, make payment of the principal and interest due on any bonds or notes used to finance permanent improvements, or for any other purpose authorized by law. Under the proposed amendment, the TSTC System could not use the appropriated funds to construct, equip, repair, or rehabilitate buildings or other permanent improvements that are to be used for intercollegiate athletics or auxiliary enterprises.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the permanent technical institution infrastructure fund and the available workforce education fund to support the capital needs of educational programs offered by the Texas State Technical College System."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 18)

SJR 18 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the legislature from imposing a tax on the realized or unrealized capital gains of an individual, family, estate, or trust. This prohibition would include a tax on the sale or transfer of a capital asset that is payable by an individual, family, estate, or trust selling or transferring the asset. The proposed amendment would not prohibit the imposition or change in the rate of an ad valorem tax on property; a sales tax on the sale of goods or services; or a use tax on the storage, use, or other consumption in this state of goods or services.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The

constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of a tax on the realized or unrealized capital gains of an individual, family, estate, or trust."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 5)

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to require the denial of bail pending trial for persons accused of certain criminal offenses. The proposed amendment would apply only to a person accused of committing one or more of the following offenses: murder; capital murder; aggravated assault if the person caused serious bodily injury to another, as defined by law, or the person used a firearm, club, knife, or explosive weapon, as those terms are defined by law, during the commission of the assault; aggravated kidnapping; aggravated robbery; aggravated sexual assault; indecency with a child; trafficking of persons; or continuous trafficking of persons. Under the proposed amendment, a person accused of one or more of these offenses must be denied bail pending trial if the attorney representing the state demonstrates by a preponderance of the evidence that the granting of bail is insufficient to reasonably prevent the person's willful nonappearance in court; or the attorney representing the state demonstrates by clear and convincing evidence that the granting of bail is insufficient to reasonably ensure the safety of the community, law enforcement, and the victim of the alleged offense. A judge or magistrate who grants bail to a person accused of one or more of these offenses under the proposed amendment must set bail and impose conditions of release necessary only to reasonably prevent the person's willful nonappearance in court and ensure the safety of the community, law enforcement, and the victim of the alleged offense. The judge or magistrate must also prepare a written order that includes findings of fact and a statement explaining the justification for the grant of bail. The proposed amendment specifies that it may not be construed to limit any right a person has under other law to contest a denial of bail or to contest the amount of bail set by a judge or magistrate or to require any testimonial evidence before a judge or magistrate makes a bail decision with respect to a person to whom the amendment applies. A judge or magistrate who determines whether a preponderance of the evidence or clear and convincing evidence exists under the proposed amendment shall consider the likelihood of the person's willful nonappearance in court; the

nature and circumstances of the alleged

offense; the safety of the community,

law enforcement, and the victim of the alleged offense; and the criminal history of the person. A person is entitled to be represented by counsel at a hearing described by the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the denial of bail under certain circumstances to persons accused of certain offenses punishable as a felony."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 7)

HJR 7 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of the revenue derived from state sales and use taxes to the Texas water fund and to provide for the allocation and use of that revenue. The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to allocate and transfer funds to accounts administered by the Texas Water Development Board. The proposed amendment also allows the legislature to suspend allocations of funds to these accounts during a state of disaster declared under Chapter 418 of the Texas Government Code.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of the revenue derived from state sales and use taxes to the Texas water fund and to provide for the allocation and use of that revenue."

Proposition Number 5 (HJR 99)

HJR 99 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt animal feed held by the owner for retail sale from ad valorem taxation. The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to provide additional eligibility requirements for the exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property consisting of animal feed held by the owner of the property for sale at retail."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 4)

HJR 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the legislature from enacting a law that imposes an occupation tax on a registered securities market operator or a tax on a securities transaction conducted by a registered

securities market operator. The proposed amendment would not prohibit the imposition of a general business tax measured by business activity, a tax on the production of minerals, a tax on insurance premiums, a sales and use tax on tangible personal property or services, or a fee based on the cost of processing or creating documents. The proposed amendment would also not prohibit a change in the rate of a tax in existence on January 1, 2026.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the legislature from enacting a law imposing an occupation tax on certain entities that enter into transactions conveying securities or imposing a tax on certain securities transactions."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 133)

HJR 133 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to give surviving spouses of United States armed services veterans a property tax exemption on their residence homestead. The proposed amendment would exempt all or part of the property tax on the spouse's residence homestead if the veteran died from a condition or disease presumed under federal law to be service-related. The exemption would apply only to a surviving spouse who has not remarried since the veteran's death. The proposed amendment appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a veteran who died as a result of a condition or disease that is presumed under federal law to have been service-connected."

Proposition Number 8 (HJR 2)

HJR 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the legislature from imposing a state tax on a deceased individual's estate because of the individual's death, including an estate, inheritance, or death tax. The proposed amendment would prohibit the legislature from imposing a state tax on the transfer of an estate, inheritance, legacy, succession, or gift from an individual, family, estate, or trust, including generation-skipping transfers, if the tax was not in effect on January 1, 2025. The proposed amendment would also prohibit the legislature from

increasing the tax rate or expanding the applicability to new parties of a transfer tax that was in effect on January 1, 2025. The proposed amendment would not prohibit the imposition or change in the rate or applicability of a general business tax measured by business activity; a tax on the production of minerals; a tax on the issuance of title insurance; a tax in existence on January 1, 2016; a tax on the transfer of a motor vehicle by gift; or an ad valorem tax on property.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit the legislature from imposing death taxes applicable to a decedent's property or the transfer of an estate, inheritance, legacy, succession, or gift."

Proposition Number 9 (HJR 1)

HJR 1 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the amount of tangible personal property held or used for the production of income that the legislature could exempt from property taxes to \$125,000 rather than the minimum amount sufficient to recover the costs of property tax administration.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation a portion of the market value of tangible personal property a person owns that is held or used for the production of income."

Proposition Number 10 (SJR 84)

SJR 84 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to create a temporary property tax exemption for the appraised value of an improvement to a person's residence homestead that is completely destroyed by a fire. The proposed amendment authorizes the legislature to prescribe the duration of the exemption and to establish additional eligibility requirements for the exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of the appraised value of an improvement to a residence homestead that is completely

destroyed by a fire."

Proposition Number 11 (SJR 85)

SJR 85 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to increase the amount of the exemption from property taxation by a school district of the market value of the residence homestead of a person who is 65 years of age or older or a person who is disabled from \$10,000 to \$60,000.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase the amount of the exemption from ad valorem taxation by a school district of the market value of the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled."

Proposition Number 12 (SJR 27)

SJR 27 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership and procedures of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct (SCJC). The proposed amendment would: (1) change the membership of the SCJC so that it is composed of six judges appointed by the Texas Supreme Court and seven citizens appointed by the Governor who are at least 35 years old, with both groups of appointees requiring the consent of the Texas Senate to be confirmed; (2) restrict the SCJC's power to issue a private reprimand (or impose a requirement that the person obtain additional training or education) to a person who has not previously been issued a private reprimand and in response to a complaint that does not allege criminal behavior; (3) require the SCJC to find that a person engaged in willful or persistent conduct that is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of a judge's duties, or determine that there is other good cause, before issuing a public admonition or punishment; (4) expand the SCJC's power to order suspension without pay as punishment; (5) give the chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court the power to select the appellatecourt justices to serve on a tribunal to review the SCJC's recommendation for the removal or retirement of a person from office, without any requirement that each court of appeals designate one of its members for consideration by the chief justice; and (6) direct the Texas Supreme Court and Governor to appoint SCJC members to initial terms of two, four, and six years starting on January

1, 2026, with the succeeding terms to be

six years, so that upon completion of the initial terms, the SCJC will be composed of members serving staggered six-year terms.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment regarding the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, the membership of the tribunal to review the commission's recommendations, and the authority of the commission, the tribunal, and the Texas Supreme Court to more effectively sanction judges and justices for judicial misconduct."

Proposition Number 13 (SJR 2)

SJR 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to increase the mandatory homestead exemption from property taxation for general elementary and secondary public school purposes from \$100,000 to \$140,000 of the market value of the residence.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to increase the amount of the exemption of residence homesteads from ad valorem taxation by a school district from \$100,000 to \$140,000."

Proposition Number 14 (SJR 3)

SJR 3 proposes a constitutional amendment to require the legislature to establish a new state agency, the Dementia Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (DPRIT). The proposed amendment would create the Dementia Prevention and Research Fund to be administered by DPRIT. Under the proposed amendment, DPRIT would be responsible for awarding financial grants for research on and the prevention and treatment of dementia, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, and related disorders. The proposed amendment would also authorize the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts to transfer \$3 billion from the state general revenue fund to the Dementia Prevention and Research Fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the establishment of the Dementia Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, establishing the Dementia Prevention and Research Fund to provide money for research on and

prevention and treatment of dementia, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, and related disorders in this state, and transferring to that fund \$3 billion from state general revenue."

Proposition Number 15 (SJR 34)

SJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to affirm that a parent has the responsibility to nurture and protect the parent's child and the corresponding fundamental right to exercise care, custody, and control of the parent's child, including the right to make decisions concerning the child's upbringing.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment affirming that parents are the primary decision makers for their children."

Proposition Number 16 (SJR 37)

SJR 37 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that only United States citizens are allowed to vote in Texas elections.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying that a voter must be a United States citizen."

Proposition Number 17 (HJR 34)

HJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from property taxation, in counties that border the United Mexican States, the portion of a real property's assessed value that arose from the installation or construction of border security infrastructure and related improvements. The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to define "border security infrastructure" and prescribe additional eligibility requirements for the exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of the amount of the market value of real property located in a county that borders the United Mexican States that arises from the installation or construction on the property of border security infrastructure and related improvements."





September 10th was a hard day.

On September 10th, I learned of a young woman who was stabbed on a train two weeks ago. She bled out and died on that train, and not a single person tried to help her.

On September 10th, I learned of another school shooting.

And on September 10th, a young man, a husband and father who had dedicated his life to the peaceful exchange of ideas because he believed communication brings understanding and peace, was assassinated.

What kind of world is this? What kind of country have we created?

September 10th was a hard day. And today, I am so sad.

I'm in mourning—along with so many of you—for the loss of what we once had. Or at least for what we thought

Charlie Kirk's assassination seems, in my mind, a repeat of what happened to Martin Luther King, Jr. These were peaceful men who communicated love, yet challenged the status quo. Young husbands and fathers who dedicated their lives to sharing a message of faith and hope to a world that needed it so desperately.

When King was killed, many mourned. Others said, "Good riddance," simply because they didn't like his message.

I've watched the same opposing sentiments poured out on social media regarding Charlie Kirk.

We live in such a broken world. And there's nothing I can do. Is there?

I've asked myself what I can bring to our culture's table to make things

better... but no matter what, somebody won't like my contribution. My beliefs. My ideas. My faith.

From where I stand, it seems those who shout the loudest for diversity and inclusion are often the ones who don't really want that. They only want people to agree with them. That's not diversity *or* inclusion.

I was glad to hear condemnation from both sides of the political aisle over this senseless murder of a man just beginning his journey. A young wife was robbed of her husband. A three-year-old and one-year-old will never know their father. And the world will never see the contributions Charlie Kirk might have made to our society. All because he talked about things that made some people uncomfortable, but that needed to be

When a young woman asked Kirk what he'd advise about taking drugs for gender transition, he didn't immediately respond. He asked her to share her story. Then he cautioned her against adding any kind of chemicals to her body to change who she was, because that would lead her down a path of more drugs and more surgeries and more chemicals and more efforts that would never truly achieve the results she sought. He encouraged her to find peace with her identity, just as she

When a minor asked how she should respond to her divorced parents, who had extremely different political views and who each pulled her to believe like them, he told her to honor and respect them. He encouraged her to maintain a strong relationship with each of them and not

to choose her beliefs—political or otherwise—to please another person. And since she was not yet of voting age, he encouraged her to focus on developing her faith and exploring her beliefs slowly and with care.

He didn't tell her what to believe. He told her to love her parents.

This is the man who was publicly assassinated, the actual moment of his death shared across social media like it was some kind of twisted entertainment.

We must do better.

We must be better.

There was a song on Christian radio in the 1980s titled, "What Can I Do?" It went like this:

What can I do to bring them home to You?

What can I do to help them on their way?

There is no time to waste, there is so much at stake.

What can I do?

The last line of the song? Just love

"Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails." I Corinthians 13:7-8

City of Morgan's Point Resort discusses budget and tax rates for 2025-26, special sessions upcoming

Morgan's Point Resort City Council held their regular session on September 9 at 6 p.m. at the MPR event center located at 60 Morgan's Point Boulevard. The workshop was held prior at 4 p.m.

The agenda items included community input on the fiscal year 2025 thru 2026 proposed budget. The budget is posted on the City website. Citizen Donna Hartman thanked the staff and Council for their work on the budget. She asked to keep the tax rate the same as last year. She suggested not to implement the fee on the water bill, but to implement user fees instead that are more equitable like the marina, bin, or quarterly cleanup fee for people that use them so those that do not use them do not have the burden to pay especially seniors, low, and fixed income. She also mentioned looking at the park and contingency funds. She pointed out using the road fund for the brush was successful.

FEMA funds are pend-

ing. Also, the vegetative debris cleanup has been paid. Other funds for the bad roof and damages are pending. Exact amounts are unknown at this time so they cannot be considered.

The agenda also considered the minutes of the regular session held on August 12.

The agenda included updates from the Financial Director, Mary Tolman. Tolman gave a PowerPoint presentation on the budget and gave summaries of accounts. For the 2023 to 2024 audit, all requested documents have been collected and will be put into a shared document for the auditors. All documents for the 2022 to 2023 audit were pulled from storage, it was very time consuming, the biggest obstacle; however, the auditors have all documents requested. The bank reconciliation for 2023 to 2024 have been completed. Tolman thanked her staff, team, and even the fire department staff. There may be a luncheon to celebrate their work. Tolman stated that the City staff cares about the City. She looks forward to upcoming audits.

The agenda also included updates from the City Manager Dennis Baldwin. He stated that KPA civil engineering out of Temple recommended critical infrastructural assessment for the Council to review. They will look at the elevated storage tank that had a leak repaired. The park committee are ready to see change and happy that the Council is moving forward with upcoming park projects. Public Works will do the landscaping. Funding is set aside for the water permits for the aquifer. Audit engagement letters have been approved, and funding is set aside for the two audits.

Special sessions will be held September 15 and September 23 for budget workshops and discussions like the new tax rate. Other upcoming events for the City of Morgan's Point Resort include MPR COPS at Garrett and Mic Hill Event Center on September 18 at 7 p.m.to 9 p.m.

If history is any indication, it is the Tigers' turn to win. Since 2021, Belton and San Angelo Central have played each other every season, taking turns making the 200-mile trek for the nondistrict encounter.

Unfortunately for the road teams, the drives home have not been celebratory.

Three years ago, the host Bobcats earned a 35-12 victory before suffering a 41-38 defeat at Belton one year later, and last season, the trend continued with Belton falling 33-8 inside San Angelo Stadium.

The rivalry continues Friday, when the Tigers welcome Central back to town with the intention of once again spoiling the Bobcats' lengthy road trip.

First, however, they must rebound from last week's loss

On the first play of the second quarter, a botched snap on a punt attempt led to a dropped ball, and Sam Arnett

scooped it up and returned the fumble six yards for a score, suddenly propelling East View ahead 14-10.

The Patriots padded the cushion as time expired in the half thanks in part to Jason Mehollin's interception that helped set up a successful 35-yard field goal from Cavan Jenna Benedick. Mad-Gonzalez, and the Tigers could not recover, finishing with their fewest points in a game this season.
