BCWCID No. 1 celebrates new backup generators for region

Winter Storm Uri occurred four years ago this month, and it is still fresh in many people's minds.

Last Thursday, Bell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, the local water supplier for area cities and Fort Cavazos, celebrated the installation of 16 backup generators to ensure that if power to the local area is affected by a disaster of any type, such as Uri, area cities will still be able to have water pumped

This project equips the Belton Lake Treatment Plant with generators that will ensure continuous operations in the event of a power failure similar to what was experienced during Winter Storm Uri in February 2021.

Local officials, along with community and regional leaders, gathered at BCWCID's facility near Lake Belton to cut the ribbon for the generators.

"This project has been a long time coming, and it was brought to us by Winter Storm Uri," said Ricky Garrett, General Manager of BCWCID No. 1, prior to the ribbon cutting.

"If you're in the water service business, this is actually a historical event. It really is. There's not too many entities like us that can now boast that we can fully back

Construction could start on 1.8 mile MPR pathway this fall



A 1.8-mile shared used pathway project could begin as soon as this fall. It will add safety to F.M. 2483, especially for students who attend Lake Belton High School, High Point Elementary, and North Belton Middle School.

Construction could 8-mile start on a new 1 pathway in the City of Morgan's Point Resort in October of this year, and the \$3.8 million project likely would take about a year to complete, according to City Manager Dennis Baldwin.

Baldwin said the sidewalk will begin at the Morgan's Point Resort city limits on FM 2483 near Lake Belton High School and go along the

to Morgan's Point Road, then north to Sobrante Road.

"City Council has accepted advanced funding through (the Texas Department of Transportation)," he said. "It's federal money that is passing through the state."

The \$3.8 million will come to Morgan's Point Resort through the Transportation Set-Aside funding program. The project qualifies for Transportation Development Cred-(TDCs), signifying

The Belton Police and Fire Department Annual Reports were presented to Council members Tuesday, providing overviews of the two departments' activities during 2024.


Belton Police Chief Larry Berg said police executed 9,776 traffic stops and issued 2,749 traffic citations and 6,939 warnings last year. Eightyeight arrests were made, and 70 percent of all stops resulted in warnings.

Of those 9,776 traffic stops, more than 6,000 drivers were male, 5,518 were white, 2,559 were

Belton sales tax revenue up more than 23% compared to February 2024

The city of Belton will be receiving a larger sales tax check compared to February 2024, according to the monthly sales tax report released by State Comptroller Glenn Hegar.

This month's check for Belton is \$1,047,756.20 which is 23.21 percent more than the \$850,338.74 the city received in February 2024.

city's sales tax revenue is up 12.57 percent compared to 2024.

That is higher than the overall sales tax revenue for cities statewide, which is up 8.74 percent com-pared to last February. Altogether, cities will be receiving a total of \$936.2 million this month. Statewide, sales tax receipts are up 4.7 percent statewide for 2025 compared to 2024.

So far for 2025, the December by businesses that report tax monthly; Octo-ber, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2024 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

Hispanic, 1,538 were black and 161 were Alaskan/Native American/Asian/Pacific Islander. Nearly 500 vehicles were searched during traffic stops, and contraband was found in 258 vehicles.

BPD responded to 1,788 calls regarding automobile accidents in 2024, including 452 non-injury accidents, 155 injury accidents and three fatalities.

The police department operated on a \$7.4 million budget last year. That breaks down to \$677,200 for administration, \$4.1 million for patrol, \$2.4 million for special operations and \$203,420 for code compliance.

According to the report, there were no murders investigated in 2024, but sexual assaults jumped from 15 in 2020 to 42 last year. Auto thefts, robberies, aggravated assaults and residential burglaries all dropped from 2020 numbers.

Council also was presented with the 2024 Belton Fire Department Annual Report during this week's meeting.

According to Assistant Fire Chief Wesley Gilbreath, the department responded to a total of 2,498 incidents, including 21 structure fires, 23 car fires, 41 wildfires, 395 motor vehicle accidents, and 163 alarm activations.

The department provided 990 medical assists, 165 lift assists, and 93 incidents involving hazardous materials. The average fire department response time in 2024

City Council on Tuesday approved zoning changes that will allow a business inside the city limits to operate as a package store.

"Voters passed a new law last year allowing pack-

age stores in the city," Paul Romer, director of communications for the city.

"Our laws are in line with other communities that allow liquor stores - they can't be near schools or churches," he said.

Texas law requires package stores to be at least 300 feet from schools, hospitals and churches.

The 2024 election loosened alcohol restrictions in Belton and allowed businesses such as breweries or liquor stores to open. The proposition passed 381-132.

Council approved zoning changes for a package store on 0.11 acres at 2144 N Main.

The 2144 N Main location is currently used by Walker Furniture and will be the home to Longhorn Li-

According to Romer, if the stores have liquor licenses in place, they can start selling products such as gin, tequila, vodka and whiskey.

Council approved zoning changes for three liquor stores in January.

Mayor David Leigh presented two proclamations to Council on Tuesday evening — one proclaiming Feb. 25 as German Exchange Students Day and the other proclaiming March as Theatre in Schools Month.

University of Mary Hardin-Baylor students and staff, and German exchange students and their professor, were in attendance to receive the proclamation.

Six UMHB students traveled to Germany for a week and lived in German homes and consumed German cuisine. They spent time learning about the German education system. Six students from a German university spent a week deep in Texas culture for the past week.

"We have different backgrounds but we have a lot in common," Leigh said.

Also, members of Belton High School's Theatre Troupe were on hand to receive the Theatre in Schools proclamation.

Leigh said the proclamation highlights the impact theater has on schools and on the community. It teaches problem-solving skills and allows students to get out of their comfort zones. Students thanked the Council for

Council adopted a resolution appointing officers for the May 3 general and special elections.

The general election will select three council members, and the special election will decide if the city's Municipal Court will become a "court of record" by appointing judges for fixed terms.

The City Council appointed Shirley White to serve as Election Day presiding judge and Louise Oldham to serve as alternate presiding judge. White will appoint two election clerks.

Texas law designated the city secretary as early voting clerk, and deputies will be Oldham, Jim Lynch, Michelle Fogle and Lindsay Wagner.

State law also requires the city to appoint an Early Voting Ballot Board to qualify and process ballots by mail, late ballots and provisional ballots. Elizabeth Harper was selected as the EVBB presiding judge and LaJuana West is the alternate presiding EVBB judge.

About \$5,000 in wages was approved for election workers.

The project involved collaboration with entities like Atmos and Oncor, and included the purchase of transformers, 11,000 feet of natural gas lines and sixteen 625 kW generators capable of producing up to 10 megawatts of power, Garrett said.

He acknowledged Keith Sledd with the Heart of Texas Defense Alliance (HOTDA) and Killeen officials present on Thursday.

"HOTDA and the City of Killeen were absolutely critical to get DEAAG funding for military preparedness," he added.

Likewise, Garrett acknowledged Keith Graf, with the office of Governor Greg Abbott and the Executive Director of the Texas Military Preparedness Commission, as well as Cory Honl with Generac, the manufac-

The project was supported by the cities of Belton, Copperas Cove, Gatesville, Harker Heights, Killeen, Lampasas, & Temple; Bell County, Coryell County, and Lampasas County; Fort Hood, WCID#1, and HOTDA.

The cost of the total project was \$15,997,700, of which the DEAAG grant covered \$5 million, with BC-WCID issuing bonds in 2022 to cover the remainder.

The Cities of Belton, Copperas Cove, Killeen, and Harker Heights, as well as 439 Water Supply Corporation and WCID No. 3 are covering portions of the bond issued by BCWCID.

In addition to these cities, Fort Cavazos likewise obtains its water from BCWCID and will be covering part of the funds. The agreements between the cities and BCWCID were signed back in 2022.

Altogether, the City of Belton is contributing approximately \$2 million toward the project, or approximately 13 percent of the debt being taken out by BCW-CID. This will cost the city about \$120,000 annually as part of its debt service, according to documents prepared in 2022 by the city. Killeen's percentage is 43 percent, Harker Heights is 18 percent, Copperas Cove 18 percent, BCWCID No. 3 is 2.7 percent, and 439 Water Supply Corporation is 4.05 percent.

In December 2024 it was announced that the City of Copperas Cove will likewise be receiving a DEAAG grant in the amount of \$5 million for their Fort Cavazos - Energy Resilience Storage System project. This project was the top ranked project out of 6 to receive funding, and of 11 that were submitted.

This project will install a Battery Energy Storage System for West Fort Cavazos providing energy resiliency as well as cost savings.

Sledd said on Thursday that after this system is installed on West Fort Cavazos, there will be a similar ceremony to the one held last week.



School. It will enable these students to conveniently walk or bike to school, ensuring their safety.

Additionally, this project will provide residents of Morgan's Point Resort with a secure means of accessing the Crossroads Recreational Complex on

Prairie View Road.

A survey conducted by the city in May 2023 revealed that 89.7 percent of respondents expressed support for the shared-use pathway project, citing concerns for student safety, as well as the anticipated health benefits and improved

community accessibility and walkabil-

Details of the pathway, such as landscaping and exact placement, will be determined in the upcoming design phase of the project.

"Right now, the pathway would

be 10-feet wide," Baldwin said. "That could change by the time the design phase is complete."

Currently, there are no walkways along the heavily traveled route, making the roadway dangerous for those traveling by bike or foot.



Local arrests among U.S. Attorney's Office more than 900 immigration cases filed in Western District of Texas

Acting United States Attorney Margaret Leachman announced on Tuesday that federal prosecutors in the Western District of Texas have filed more than 900 immigration and immigration-related criminal cases since Jan. 20.

Among those cases is one of local interest.

Guatemalan nationals Anderson Morales-Calderon and Ever Morales-Calderon were arrested on Jan. 24 in Waco on criminal charges related to their alleged aiding and abetting the possession of a firearm as undocumented noncitizens.

Troy Police Department and Lorena Police Department officers were responding to a road rage

complaint called into 911.

The 911 caller alleged that an individual pointed a rifle at a semi-truck on IH-35. During the traffic stop, officers observed two air rifles and one .22 caliber rifle in plain view in the back seat and on the back floorboard of the vehicle.

Further investigation revealed that both Anderson and Ever Morales-Calderon were unlawfully present in the United States. If convicted, they each face up to 10 years in federal prison.

Other cases of interest include the arrest of Juan Ramon Hernandez-Limon in San Antonio, who had been previously convicted on April 28, 2021 for illegal re-entry into the United States and alien in possession of a firearm, and a second time on Feb. 8, 2024 for illegal re-entry. Hernandez-Limon repeatedly attempted to evade arrest during an ICE ERO op-

eration on Jan. 26, 2025, and was eventually taken into custody. He faces up to 20 years in federal prison, if convicted.

front passenger window. Olvera-Moreno admitted to law enforcement that he knew that he was illegally and unlawfully in

Honduran national Melvin Armando Funes-Canales was transferred to federal custody after he was located in the Williamson County jail, where he had been detained for alleged possession of a controlled substance. An investigation revealed Funes-Canales had been previously removed from the U.S. to Honduras on or about Oct. 9, 2020, and had also been deported on five other occasions. Additionally, Funes-Canales was previously convicted of burglary, grand theft and illegal re-entry. He now faces up to 10 years in federal prison for illegal re-entry, if convicted.

Four individuals illegally present in the U.S. were arrested in El Paso and face up to 10 years in federal prison each for criminal charges related to their alleged involvement in a human smuggling conspiracy. Yair Alejandro Aguilar-Flores, Angel Eduardo Carrillo-Carrillo, Jorge Alfredo Lopez-Acevedo, and Jesus David Reyes-Villagran allegedly conspired to harbor 12 illegal aliens

in two El Paso hotels. A Mexican national was indicted by a federal grand jury in Austin for one count of possession of a firearm by illegal alien. Marcelo Olvera-Moreno was stopped while driving in Hutto, Jan. 24. A Williamson Country Sheriff's Office deputy conducted the traffic stop after allegedly observing the passenger in Olvera-Moreno's vehicle fire a handgun from the

front passenger window. Olvera-Moreno admitted to law enforcement that he knew that he was illegally and unlawfully in the U.S. and that he had purchased the pistol at a flea market approximately three months prior. If convicted, he faces up to 15 years in federal prison.

"Because the Western District of Texas shares 660 miles of common border with Mexico and is home to three of Texas' largest cities and an estimated 7.6 million people, prosecuting immigration and border-related crimes has long been and remains a priority within this district," said Leachman. "With the valuable investigative and enforcement efforts of our federal, state, and local law enforcement partners, this U.S. Attorney's Office is committed to prosecuting immigration-related crimes in the interest of the nation and our citi-

zens."

These cases were referred or supported by federal law enforcement partners, including Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Enforcement and Removal Operations (ICE ERO), U.S. Border Patrol, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the U.S. Marshals Service (USMS), and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), with the support and assistance of state and local law enforcement partners.

Along with enhanced interdiction efforts at the border, federal law enforcement has been also prioritizing immigration

enforcement operations and prosecutions of aliens unlawfully in the interior of the country and also those otherwise engaged in criminal activity in the U.S., including those who commit drug and firearms crimes, who have serious criminal records, who have active warrants for their arrest, or who have outstanding final orders of removal from the U.S., issued by an immigration in the country of the country of

judge.

Federal authorities have also been prioritizing investigations and prosecutions against drug, firearm, and human smugglers and those who endanger and threaten the safety of our communities and the law enforcement officers who protect

us all.

Indictments and criminal complaints are allegations and all defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law

BISD turns in historic performance at state meet

teams made a strong statement at the UIL-5A State Championship, with the Lake Belton Broncos and the Belton Tigers delivering historic performances. With many state qual-

ifiers from both programs and multiple school records broken, the weekend marked a significant milestone for Belton ISD swimming. The Lake Belton

Broncos continued raising the bar for their program, sending their largest swimmers to the state meet.

Five Broncos earned their spot in the competition: Elizabeth Simeroth (Jr.), Gwen Clark (Fr.), Christine Kim (Jr.), Brooke Phillips (Sr.), and David Stewart (Jr.).

Christine Kim delivered a standout performance, becoming the first Bronco swimmer to place in the top eight in the

state. She finished fourth in the 50-yard freestyle and sixth in the 100-yard freestyle, demonstrating her speed at the highest level. During prelims, Kim shattered her school record in the 50 freestyle with a time of 23.57 seconds, further cementing her status as one of the top sprinters in school history.

The girls' 400-yard freestyle relay team, composed of Simeroth, Clark, Kim, and Phillips, finished 19th overall, representing Lake Belton on the state stage in the relay competition for the first time.

On the boys' side, David Stewart put up an intense fight in his events, placing 23rd in the 200yard freestyle and 20th in the 100-yard freestyle.

The girls' team wrapped up the meet with a 22nd-place finish among 50 point-scoring teams.

The Belton Tigers also left their mark on the state meet, sending

a record five swimmers to compete: Olivia Brillhart, Mackenzie Gingerich, Liliana Nelson, Addison Richardson, and Ema Whitzel. The Tigers reached new heights by qualifying two girls' relay teams for state competition, another first in program history.

Liliana Nelson made headlines by breaking the school record in the 200yard freestyle, posting a time of 1:55.44 during prelims. She followed up that performance by finishing 15th in the event during finals, proving her ability to compete among the best in Texas. She also placed 13th in the 500yard freestyle, adding to the Tigers' point total.

In the boys' 500-yard freestyle, Addison Richardson became the first swimmer in Belton boys' history to secure a top-10 finish at the 5A state meet. He placed ninth overall with a time of 4:48.05.





Anglers remaining on the upper ends of the main lake on the Leon River or Cowhouse Creek arms, flatline trolling will be improving. Troll multiple baits that dive to different depths. then change over once fish show a preference. Fish in deeper. clearer water will remain interested in the 5/8 ounce and 3/4 ounce white Bladed Hazy Eye Slab worked with a very slow, steady upward motion where fish are seen concentrated on bottom via sonar. Report by Bob Maindelle, Holding the Line Guide Service. Catfish are fair. With cold water temperatures anglers should search for blue catfish in deeper river channels and around steep ledges in 30-45 feet of water. Larger cut baits have been effective for trophy size fish. Eater fish under 10 pounds are still active and slow drifting with small cut shad along sand flats will produce. 

Vexed By Hex Keys

For those who aren't familiar with their local hardware store, a hex key or Allen wrench is a specific type of tool. Each such item is a long, hexagonal or six-sided cylinder that is bent 90 degrees near one end. They're used like a screwdriver, in that certain types of screws, bolts, and other hardware have slots in the end for a hex key. If you've ever purchased flat-pack "assemble it yourself at home" – type furniture, you might have gotten a hex key in the packaging to help you assemble everything.




