Rosa Hernandez, independent businesswoman, proud East Bell County native is branching out from the Area Agency on Aging while continuing to help the community with her expertise in the healthcare system, estate planning, and funeral preplanning as an independent contractor with her business RLH.

"I work on what I do best; I help people navigate resources and options. My company helps families navigate and even explain in layman's terms their doctor's appointments," said Hernandez.

"I learned how to navigate the healthcare system. It's difficult handling insurance, especially now that we have open enrollment. People don't know if they should change plans. I'm getting so many calls asking 'what should I do?' I can tell them exactly how to take care of that. The other thing is it's very important to understand health plans because some

providers don't accept the health plans that you get over the phone and our seniors are the ones that are penalized. I would rather them ask than be sorry. It's so important to understand how it all works," said Hernandez.

When discussing funeral preplanning, Hernandez says, "It's a gift that parents can leave for their families after death. When it has all been taken care of by preplanning, then the family can just focus on the grief and mourn the loss. They just make some last-minute changes like picking out the coffin, picking out whether it's a direct burial, cremation, traditional burial, or just to gravesite with a memorial service. Funeral preplanning is something that will give them peace," said Hernandez.

"We can incorporate it with our estate planning. When we're taking care of all our other business, we can take care of this and we have time to pay it out, which is the beauty of it. The other thing with the pre-need is not only does the money follow you, if you are on a Medicaid spin down with a pre-revocable policy, which is what I do, you will not be penalized as Medicaid income so this does not count as income so you can actually pay for your funeral plan, and pay for your plot, pay for everything, and it is not counted as income, but the policy is an insurance policy. We are insured by the FDIC, and so we have that security that the money is protected. I want people to know that they're not alone in making decisions and that there is someone who understands both sides of the business," adds Hernandez.

Her funeral home plan and service area cover the state of Texas. Even though she works her plan through Crotty Funeral Home, the plan and money follow the insured. Meaning, if they get it locally, and then leave the area, or the state, the policy will cover the prepaid options chosen in the plan. The reason that she is doing pre-policies is because she saw with Covid that a lot of younger people were affected with residual conditions, they end up passing away early, and they had no money for funerals.

Hernandez has been doing this since the 70s. She retired recently, so is focusing more on giving back to the community with the things she's learned with her 44 years of career experience. She works with estate planners, attorneys, nurses, and skilled nursing facilities. Her circle of network is huge so she can connect people with the right resources where they will be able to get good information so that they can make informed decisions.

"I'm having some upcoming seminars. I

will have one on November 13th at 5:30 pm at Rosewood Assisted Living located at 5700 East Central Texas Expressway in Killeen for Financial Planning and more. Then on December 11th at 10:00 am I will be at Central Texas Council of Governments located at 2180 North Main Street in Belton. I am bilingual, so I can help people that speak only Spanish," said Hernandez.

She was raised in East Bell County on the Martinez farm which is now 83 years old. Her grandpa bought it in 1936. They have five generations that have worked at the farm, which is her grandfather, father, brother, his son and now his grandson.

"This is my community. This is where I was born and raised. My goal through RLH is to educate people while helping them save money when it comes to making decisions about Medicare, Medicaid, and insurance policies and their impact in the area they live.

Hernandez says that her goal at RLH is to not only help people make informed decisions about their health insurance policies, but to also help them connect with the right resources for endof-life planning. Understanding that prepaid funeral plans are not just a gift to your children, but is a cost savings to you as well, because it locks in today's prices, which is an additional gift," said Hernandez. RLH also uses a resource which can help people compare prices of their electricity, phone, internet and healthcare and offer cost savings, a benefit for those on a fixed in-

"I"m kind of a marketer," she said. "My focus is on education — I educate case managers and health-care partners. I also help manage social media for our nursing centers."





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Mobi Dog and its owner are rebounding from a bout of mold poisoning

Brandi Nicole Reese has found great success in the dog grooming and pet supply business. But just over five years ago a mold infestation nearly cost the owner of Mobi Dog Luxury Pet Salon, Barkery & Boutique her businesses and her life.

Brandi went into the dog grooming business in 2008 in Copperas Cove, but she didn't start Mobi Dog until after she moved to Chicago just a few years later.

"I had a grooming trailer and was a mobile groomer," she said. "But my family decided to move back to Texas, and we settled into Belton in 2012. I opened my first Mobi Dog store the next year at a small location on Greenbriar. We quickly outgrew the space and moved into a cute house on Main Street."

Brandi parked her mobile trailer out in front of the pink house, and it became a Belton icon. But, just six months after moving into the new location, she became ill.

"It was a mystery," she remembers. "I started having severe migraine headaches, and I was diagnosed with fibromyalgia. My immune system became very weak, and I lost a ton of weight."

A Fort Worth physician eventually was able to pinpoint the cause of her ailments — inflammation in the brain from toxic mold. Eventually, at her own expense, the house was tested and proved to be positive for mold infestation.

"What they found in the business was

exactly what the doctors found in my body," she said. "I informed my landlord, but the situation was never repaired. I stayed another 10 months while he promised to get rid of the mold, but my husband finally shut down the business when I couldn't physically get to work."

Brandi said several of her employees also started having symptoms of mold poisoning.

"My doctor told me if I didn't get out of that building, I would die," she said this week. "It was the hardest time in my life — I had three teenagers, and I had a business, but I just couldn't do it. I had to take vitamins and supplements to boost my immune system, and I changed my diet and lifestyle."

"It had to remove myself from that environment, and it was no quick fix," she added. "It took the same amount of time for me to heal as I had been in the building. I'm just now starting to get back to where I was. I've regained some weight, and people didn't recognize me at first."

Brandi said her plan was to stay in Belton and continue to serve the pets and customers who had become regulars.

"I didn't want to lose the business I had worked so hard to create. I got attached to the dogs I served like they were my own."

"I was too sick to look for a new location, but my husband helped," she said. "Unfortunately, we couldn't find anything suitable for a pet-grooming business and in our price range. It was a tough time to be in business because of the post-pandemic economy."



Reese found a suitable location, but it was a few miles to the northeast in Temple. The new location for Mobi Dog Luxury Pet Salon, Barkery & Boutique, located at 4311 S 31st, opened about six months after the Belton shop closed.

"I was hoping my customers would make the short drive to the new store," she said. "Some did, and they helped me while I rebuilt the businesses. They are the ones who kept the business alive."

While some of her Belton clients have stuck with Mobi Dog, Brandi and staff have built a new clientele at the Temple location. In addition to grooming and bathing dogs, the business also has a large selection of pet supplies, apparel and food. Brandi also operates a barkery that provides Pup Tarts and other doggie delicacies to Central Texas canines.

Brandi is now well on her way to recovery, although she likely will suffer from the problems associated with mold disease.

"I want to bring awareness to mold illness," she said. "A lot of people don't take mold or water damage seriously. It can really make you severely ill. Now that I understand it and I've been through it, I know the signs and what to look for before entering an older building."

"I bet there are a lot of people who are sick with mysterious illnesses, and they don't know why. Many hospitals don't know much about it — I found answers with very expensive specialists."

"I'm grateful that I was able to find out what was making me so sick, but I wish I had

found answers sooner," she said. "Hospitals kept treating the symptoms but not fixing the root of the problem. Come to find out, it was simply from going to work every day."

Today, Brandi continues to rebuild her life and her business, but she also takes time to help others.

Following recent hurricanes on the East Coast, Brandi and her parents teamed up to provide North Carolina shelters and dog-grooming businesses with much needed help.

"My folks live up there, and they told me about storm-related problems the Foothills Humane Society was facing," she said. "I decided to get donations and ship supplies to my parents, and they get the needed items to shelters and Foothills."

Within a week, Brandi and her customers, as well as the Temple and Belton communities, filled a 16-foot Penske trailer with donated pet supplies and a local moving company volunteered to take the truck to North Carolina.

Mobi Dog also is about to get back to its mobile roots. The original trailer was damaged in Temple's May 22 tornado, but Brandi located a new trailer in Fort Worth.

"My old trailer, Myrtle, is gone, but we have replaced her with Geraldine. I'm converting it to a mobile store, and soon we will be hitting local markets and pop-ups.

"People will be able to shop inside for pet supplies and dog treats," she said with a grin. "I won't have mobile grooming, but it will be a mobile boutique.
