CELEBRATING 50 YEARS WITH GFS IN KOREA

What a joy it was to spent time in Korea joining in their 50th celebrations and attending the inauguration of a new branch.

Thank you Korean GFS for your welcome, your hospitality and friendship and for making this such an enjoyable visit.

Asako Yonamine, the National President of Japan and I flew from Sendai in Northern Japan to Seoul and arrived on the Friday afternoon. We were met by Ruth and Joanna and taken to the beautiful convent of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, next to the Cathedral, that we all knew so well when we attended World Council in 2008. We were made so welcome and were so comfortable. The Archbishop of Korea, The Rt Revd Paul Kim and his General Secretary, Father Stephen Sikyung Yoo (who is also the GFS Chaplain) hosted a dinner for the GFS Executive, Asako and I. Such an interesting dinner and conversation and it was followed by a walk around the city environments, including the nearby Deoksu Palace.

The next morning was the celebratory Eucharist for the 50 years of GFS. It was so uplifting, with inspiring music. The beauty of Anglican liturgy is that we can be present at the Eucharist in so many different countries, where we may not understand the language but where we feel quite at home as we follow the familiar path of the liturgy. It was no different in Seoul Cathedral. Sarah Lee. A GFS member and well known Korean Soprano sang the Ave Maria during the administration of the sacrament. So beautiful!

It was so special to have the first President of GFS Korea present, Mrs Yang-shik Kim and her retired husband, Bishop Kim. Flowers were presented to them and the grateful thanks of GFS for their dedication to the growth of GFS in Korea. Our beloved Ruth (Choi) was also presented with a gift to commemorate her long, fruitful and faithful service to GFS.

And of course there was a party. We adjourned to a nearby Hall within the Cathedral complex for lunch and a GFS concert. What fun as some very talented people entertained us. And as well as Sara Lee, Asako also sang. She is a well-known Japanese Soprano and studied in the UK for many years.

Mrs Kim cut the cake. I spoke with the assistance of Joanna as Interpreter. There were lovely Korean crafts on display and a wonderful display of items from World Councils going back many years. They brought back many memories to me. Anna and Hannah, GFS members, had been up most of the night finishing off the posters of photos and greetings for the display.

So ended the party and what a great celebration of 50 years of GFS. I was proud to be part of it.

Anna and Hannah took Asako and I walking, through traditional Korean areas and to a Restaurant run by Monks and serving exciting dishes.

Sunday saw us travelling in a number of cars to St Aidan's a parish church on Gangwha Island. Catherine travelled in our car. She was the Miss C Oh (from World Minutes) who spoke so eloquently at the 1965 World Council to ask for support to begin GFS in Korea. She is a wise, beautiful person and we were able to talk about so many different subjects on our trip. On this day a new branch of GFS was being inaugurated and it was my pleasure to witness this occasion. It was harvest time and being a farming area crops were growing right up to the church fence. A number of farmers presented grapes and sweet potatoes at the Eucharist as an offering of their first harvest. And GFS members presented the proceeds from their annual bazaar to St Andrew's Church, nearby. Those who attended the 2008 Council will remember it well, such a historic and peaceful place. On our way back to Seoul we visited Jeondeungsa temple at the top of a very steep hill but with wonderful views from the top and with

In March 2015, I represented the Episcopal Church of the United States at the United Nations Commission of the Status of Women Conference in New York City. I made a commitment that I was going to make a difference in some small way. I stated:

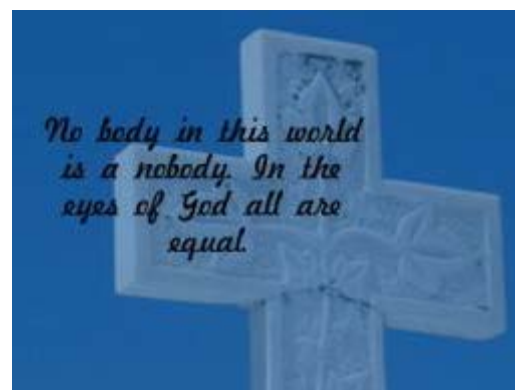
Now is the time for a call to action. We clearly have a long way to go, but we must raise awareness and the urgency of our task. The atrocities of human trafficking, gender inequality and all forms of violence against women and girls are unacceptable. Together we must find a solution and bring about change.

What can we do now? We must pray and continue to pray. As Christians, we believe that all humanity is created in God's image; that women and girls are created equal before God. Our scriptures, the way of Jesus Christ and our Baptismal Covenant call us to "seek and serve Christ in all persons", regardless of gender. As an Episcopalian, I, as well as, the Episcopal Church affirm that God's world was meant to be one of abundance for all people, with fundamental rights and dignity for all women and girls. As a member of The Girls' Friendly Society, we are part of something much bigger than just your branch or your Diocese. Our GFS "network" stretches across your state, throughout the nation and to more than 24 countries worldwide. Imagine if we were to unite in purpose – to join to empower girls and women, to make a difference in the world, to educate and inspire others to act. Together, we are a powerful force! We can achieve this mission but we must create strong partnerships at all levels – local, national, regional and global – vowing to create a world where gender equality is never in question and discrimination and violence against women and girls is a thing of the past.

As Christian Women let us begin to think how we can make a difference in our girls and women lives whom are suffering by the hands of others.

I would like GFS to join me in the 16 days of activism with a daily prayer, which I will send via email. Mother's Union and The Episcopal Church Women (USA) will also participation in 16 day of prayers.

Our Proud History being recorded!

Hello to you all!



I am conducting research into the organization and activities of the Girls' Friendly Society in Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada, during the period 1883-1980. Newfoundland and Labrador is the 10th province of Canada and lies on the Far East coast of the country. It is made up of an island and a portion of the mainland of Canada. From 1883 to the first half of the twentieth century, the Girl's Friendly Society was active in dozens of small rural and urban communities here. Not all branches began at the same time, nor did they all last for many years, but the Bonavista GFS is still in existence today, the last

remaining site of GFS in Newfoundland and Labrador and perhaps Canada. Little research or writing on the GFS in Newfoundland & Labrador or Canada has been undertaken, so a tremendous gap exists in our knowledge of the early organization in particular. My research is focusing exclusively on Newfoundland & Labrador (at least for now), using records from the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist GFS in St. John's (1883-1970s roughly), records and interviews with those still active in the Bonavista GFS (1894-), C of E/Anglican church records and periodicals of the day, and hopefully, GFS records in London England.



The project has several goals: to document the existence, longevity, and location of GFS branches in Newfoundland and Labrador; to record the activities and practices over time of one or more GFS branches; to record experiences and stories of GFS Members; to understand more about the construction of class and gender relations in and through the work of the GFS. It is a wonderful project, allowing me to make the acquaintance of fabulous, active and community minded women. If any of you have information on the Newfoundland GFS I'd love to hear from you!

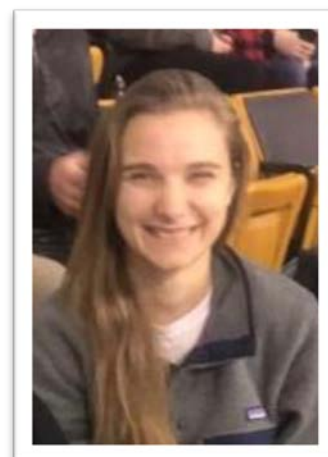

Pink Pearls

History in the making - "Pink Pearls", a junior group was inaugurated on October 31. Here are some of the "Pearls", happy together after a particularly energetic balloon game. The name of the group was chosen after much thought. Pink is for girls and a pearl is pure, precious and has a luminous glow which is in keeping with our vision of making each girl realize her worth, uphold the purity of life and glow or shine for Jesus. The motto is : Reflecting THE Light. Jesus said : "I am the Light of the World" – John 8 : 12 and just as a pearl reflects the light, our Pearls are expected to reflect the Light of Jesus. There are 3 categories of Pearls – Natural (original), Cultured (man made/ "polluted" by sin), and Imitation. This would make each Pearl think about who she is. Pearls come in 8 different shapes – like all of us who are different to one another, not only physically but have different abilities, different talents that we must offer to God.



The Pearl is mentioned in the Bible - Some instances: In Matthew, the Pearl of great price or a very valuable pearl is compared to the Kingdom of God or Heaven.

In Revelations, the Gates to Heaven are referred to as the Pearly Gates and each of the 12 gates is made of one pearl each.

Visit of GFS youth leaders

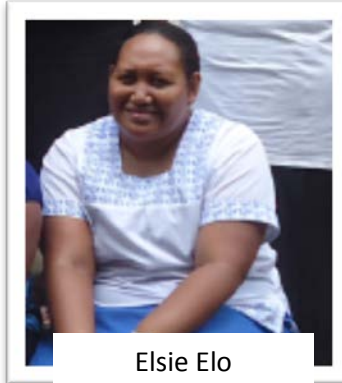
GFS MELANASIA (INCLUDES THE SOLOMON ISLANDS)

Val Gribble reports: Following my report on my visit to Japan, Deidree Noss from Sydney, who was the Junior Delegate (as Deidree Nixon) to Japan World Council in 1984 prepared a delightful Christmas in Japan program for the use of Australian



leaders. You will see the whole program in the next Australian newsletter and we hope that our GFS friends in Japan will approve of Deidree's wonderful gifts in preparing this program.

I was invited to speak about my visit to Japan to GFS members at my old parish. It was such a joy and they used much of Deidree's program. Parents and parishioners attended to join with GFS to understand a little of the tragedy of the 2011 Tsunami as I showed photos of what I had seen.



And just this week as I write these notes Caritas (which is an arm of Mothers Union) gave a gift of \$AUD100 to the Japan Project. We are most grateful.



GFS and Kids+ Perth With the ages and numbers of children going down Perth decided a few years back to stop running camps and offer a holiday club for a week during the school holidays. These have proved very successful and we regularly have up to 20 children attend in the 3 midterm

holiday breaks that we have in Perth. They are run on a theme and the children have fun participating in songs, memory verses, bible stories, crafts, activities, movies and dancing around the theme.



We also offer a shorter version to 3 country destinations. In the July holidays we go to Bruce Rock and Wongan Hills (3 hrs to BR and 2 to WH to the East, then 2 back to Perth) and then in the October holidays we go to Esperance which is a 8 hour drive to the far south of Western Australia. These were started 3 years back to honour the memory of the Missionary work undertaken by Marjorie Burton in the Caravan that began in 1934 in rural areas around Western Australia. These holiday clubs are well received with the country areas being so isolated, they run on the same principals as the week long ones but we just adapt to either 1, 2 or 3 days depending on the place.

GFS SIERRA LEONE

With the decision to declare Sierra Leone Ebola-free (8 November) the church and GFS is again active.

Alberta tell us that they held their first Diocesan Council meeting on 26 November and on 27 November they held a Diocesan Africana Service during which they launched their 50th Anniversary Project Fund which is for the construction of a GFS House. Sierra Leone does not have any permanent location for administrative and other activities. With the Blessing of the Bishop, the Diocese is considering ways and means of providing a suitable environment for the project site. Alberta wishes everyone a pleasant and peaceful yuletide season. We also welcome the Revd Robertson Curtis as the newly appointed Chaplain for GFS Sierra Leone.

It is Sierra Leone's turn to produce the World Day of Prayer Service for 2016 so we look forward to their service.

GFS IRELAND

“Love and Christmas Greetings to all Readers” from GFS Sisters in Ireland



We have closed the door on November, a month for Remembrance and Reflection and we are in the season of Advent; a time for Contemplation and Preparation, that leads us to Christmas morning, when we celebrate the birth of Christ our Saviour. During September



and October GFS Ireland had three Regional Trainings in various locations. The theme was “Our Society ... GFS ... Our Care”.

On my arrival GFS was not yet started the first day, Friday the 20 Nov. I was exposed to the confirmation which was done by the Bishop . That's where I started presenting to the bishop and marketing it to the congregation with positive results. The Bishop gave a go



ahead for it to start then, at that parish using girls, mostly that have been confirmed



on the day. I had a two hour session with identified two leaders after service.

I had an honour to present GFS in a group of about 30 priests from different parishes of the diocese where there was thanks giving service with positive results .

I introduced GFS and practically started a 3 hr session with a group of about 35 possible members prepared to be the first group in launching.



I conducted a workshop with 9 possible leaders from 9 different parishes in the diocese for two days. The second day we came up with operational plan with time frames. Those leaders according to their plan are going to start GFS in their parishes this coming Sunday including the one that I started on the 20 Nov on my first day. They are together as an interim diocesan committee and are going to market it in the whole diocese and spread it other dioceses in Uganda. They are 10 parishes under the leadership of Madam Gertrude.

On my last day Sunday the 29 Nov. was the launch of GFS establishment in Uganda, blessed with the presence of the Dean of the Cathedral.

Now GFS ACSA is preparing to be visited by GFS world president in 5 months time May 2016, Uganda GFS is starting preparing to attend a GFS provincial conference to be hosted on the weekend of 3- 5 June venue Diocese of Johannesburg in honour of our GFS world president.
