MAJOR DECISIONS ON FUTURE OF GFS WORLD COUNCIL

It was encouraging to have so many countries participating in the March meeting (by ZOOM) when we discussed various motions put forward for a way forward for the World Council of GFS:

After a vote among the countries represented on the GFS World Council it has been decided—

1. There will be a virtual world council in July 2021 to deal with major business that was to have been discussed at the 2020 meeting.
2. That South Africa will continue as the host country until 2023 when the next World Council will be held as both a virtual and face to face council in South Africa.
3. Lois Frankforter (President GFS USA) and Jeanne Withanage (President GFS Sri Lanka) will become part of the World Team. Val Gribble (from GFS Australia) will continue as the World Vice President until 2023.
4. The Host country from 2023 until 2026 will be Sri Lanka (thus Jeanne's part of the world team)
5. Host country from 2026 until 2029 will be USA.
6. Deposits will be refunded to those who had paid (or full fees) with a portion of 10% (anticipated amount) to remain with South Africa and bank fees and charges also to come out of the amount paid

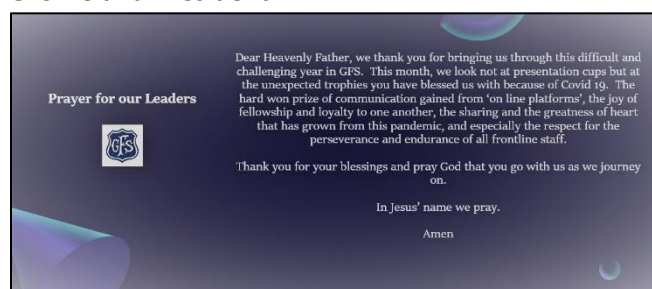

Greetings to all our wonderful GFS members across the world!



GFS Australia's new National Executive is working to increase our membership. -We held our National Zoom Prayer and Meditation Afternoon on 29th May 2021. We held this event to allow some fellowship time that we so dearly miss due to the restrictions of COVID as we are not able to travel freely around Australia. We explored meditation and its part in a prayerful life and learnt from one of our dioceses that has already been holding regular prayer times via Zoom. We were joined by Sri Lankan members which was a joy to us and we will be inviting other countries to join us in future gatherings.

We value our wonderful heritage as the Girls' Friendly Society but also look to be relevant and innovative. Our new National Executive has been working to support Townsend groups, children's and youth groups and Kidzlink around our country. (Kidzlink and Kidsplus+ have been developed when we needed a way to include boys into our groups.)

We have supported in prayer and continued to assist Papua New Guinea and Melanesia. Members plan to continue to send some supplies and GFS badges to Melanesia, although transport is limited (again due to COVID). We recently supported PNG in a feeding program and support was given to Popondetta.

Our diocesan groups have been busy, as there have been Annual General meetings in many dioceses and we welcome the new Executive Members. We have local diocesan groups who are supporting theological groups, and others who are assisting various groups within the community that reach out to make life a little more bearable for some. In Brisbane we heard of a group who provide school resources to children who are made homeless particularly through a domestic violence situation. Many dioceses continue to help using their skills in knitting and sewing to make rugs, beanies, socks and many other things for those in need in the community.

Another diocese supported a program in which University students were welcomed in a "Show Hope" ministry. The targeted student group was particularly

those from south-east Asia, who had not had Jesus in their lives, and they were welcomed through the Covid isolation with the Good News and nourishing food in the form of meals and food packages whilst unable to work in their casual jobs to cover their basic needs. Over 100 students attended regularly for 8 consecutive weeks! So, GFS support has born wonderful fruit!

GFS Australia members look forward to the World Council Zoom on the 16-18 July 2021 to continue our wonderful association on the world stage.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA



The President of GFS in the Diocese of Popondota, Vivian Jirega has made two very long walks to remote parishes in the diocese to spread

information about GFS and to enrol new members. These are difficult walks.



The first trip was to Afore, to prepare girls for enrolment, teach traditional crafts and then attend the enrolment service.



Crossing rivers

The last trip was to a very remote village, high up in the mountains, Emo River and the group of represented both GFS and MU.

Vivian reports: *On the 23rd May Ascension Sunday after our*

morning devotion we started our journey at 5am with four newly admitted MU Eiwo Parish plus 3 interested GFS young girls.

We crossed rivers 44 times, passed 34 villages, climbed 74 mountains, one of which is the highest mountain in PNG, Wora. By 6pm right at the top of the mountain we said our Angelus prayer and overnighted in Wora Village.



Starting at 6am the next day we finally arrived at Emo River Village (the front foot of the Owen Stanley Range) at 5pm. We were soooooo tired!

Information was given on GFS and MU; a copy of the Children's Ministry Sunday School program (from the

GFS World Project of 2008) was given to the Children's Ministry Coordinator.

And of course, the next day the group made the long walk back down the mountain. We hope that these difficult visits will bear much fruit.

And we are thrilled to receive news from Girika Sanata (Port Moresby) that a third diocese now has a GFS branch – in Kokopo, Diocese of New Guinea Islands. Mother Stella was a member of GFS in Melanesia and has now commenced a branch in her town. They recently began prison visits. We are hoping to have more news of this new branch next newsletter.

Port Moresby GFS are working hard to recommence the Feeding Program but are still hampered with the severity of COVID-19 cases in their city.

Along with this have also fine-tuned our strategy and growth plan to map a clear path for GFS. Together, we are really excited about this and plan to launch four new groups in areas of need this November, which will have the support of Group Coordinators to ensure their success.

LIBERIA

We bid farewell to all GFSers and GFS family members around the world who died as the result of Covid-19, other illnesses and from natural disaster. We are still praying for the speedy recovery of our Bishop, The Most Rev. Jonathan B.B. Hart. Our prayers continue to go up for the husband of our Diocesan President, Dr. Amon Claudius Sawyer and, our members who are sick and troubled, for GFS member countries that are experiencing natural disaster, displacements, and



all sorts of conditions of mankind.

Thank God for the level of improvement in the fight of Covid-19. The statistics for now is as follow:

2,219 infectious cases since the pandemic began up to June 3, 2021.

86 coronavirus-related deaths in the country since the pandemic began.

2,044 Recovery

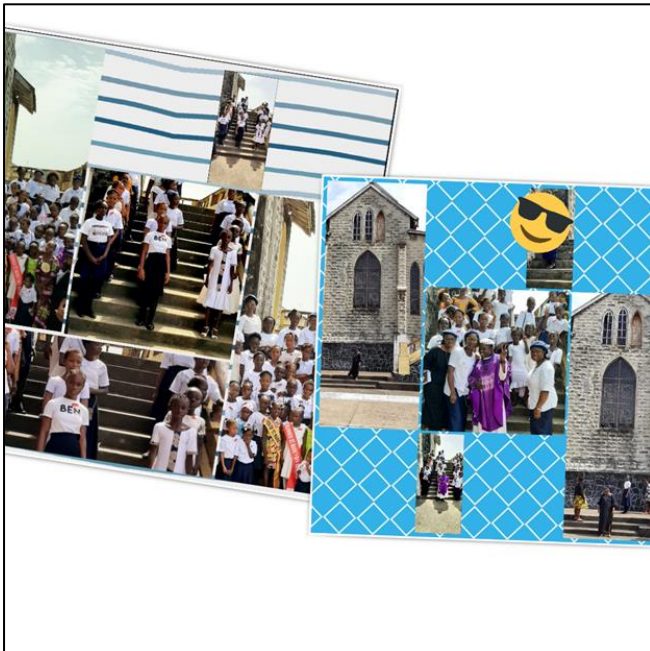
Liberia has administered at least **56,144** doses of COVID vaccines so far.

GFS Liberia, continues to work in reactivating existing branches, and establishing new ones. Below are the following pluses and minuses.

- **Pluses:** Sometime this year, 2021, GFS Liberia Diocesan Secretary, Ms. Quinnetta Blessing Clement obtained a scholarship and traveled to the Netherland to do her Master's in engineering. To God be the glory.
- In December, 2020, one of our new branches, St. Martin Episcopal Church in Yekepa, Nimba County admitted 30 young women into GFS. Thank God for our hard-working sponsors, Clara K. Mallah and others. They are working very hard to provide weekly activities for the girls.
- We participated in GFS World Online Meeting on March 13, 2021
- In March, 2021, the Diocesan Vice President and Georgiana Tucker Williams flew 250 miles (403 km.) to attend the Annual GFS Program of one of our branches. While there, a new branch was established. About 36 girls and 4 Sponsors were admitted. Many thanks to the Ven. Sieda A. Williams, Priest in Charge of St. Mark and Archdeacon of the Southeastern Archdeaconry of Liberia and her team for the support.
- On May 1, 2021, the 2nd Vice President, Sister Patricia Adadevoh and the Good Shepherd Branch had a retreat on one of our beaches. They had time to work on leadership skills and spiritual growth, they played a few games and enjoy a delicious lunch. They also had a time to have their feet wet in the Atlantic Ocean. The next day, they had a thanksgiving service where

the girls played lead roles in the service. They displayed their Saturday class handmade aprons. These activities have helped to rejuvenate the girls and also drawing in new members.

- On May 14, 2021, which was a holiday in Liberia, GFSers gathered at the residence of the Diocesan GFS 1st Vice President, Sister Deroe A. Weeks for fellowship and recreation.



- Our other plans are to engage in baking classes, develop public speaking skills, implement our Eco Project, and learn how to build a basic website for the group for information dissemination. It is our hope that some of the girls will develop interest in technology careers or at least remove the mystery so that they see that it is really not that complicated.

With the help of Sister Adadevoh, we have developed five pillars of our program namely:

1. Duty to Self and Self-respect
2. Duty to God and Duty to the Church
3. Duty to Family
4. Duty to Society and Community
5. Duty to County

All of our activities will incorporate at least one of the pillars. It is meant to encourage growth and responsibility in each area of life.

Minuses: We have not been able to fully return to many of our activities because of this Covid-19. We are trusting that God removes this pandemic from amongst us and soon and very soon, we can freely carry out other activities.

NEW ZEALAND

It is with sadness and fear that we think about our covid world and the troubles we are facing and learning about. We pray that the vaccine will be delivered to everyone, everywhere quickly and that no one will be forgotten. We are all trying to comply with guidelines by wearing masks, isolating when necessary and tracking our visits. It seems we will be living with the virus for some time.

Here in NZ GFS met recently to review our girls' progress and to support each other, sharing our experiences, hopes, triumphs and challenges.

I noticed there are many interesting trends emerging concerning the study choices of our scholarship recipients, with vocational courses being popular. We have six girls studying to become nurses. Three girls from Mana College, a state coeducational school. Two other girls, new settlers to New Zealand who have completed their

enrolled nursing qualification and are going on to complete the nursing degrees and a Pasifica student from Porirua College, a college in a low income area outside the city.

Other girls discover that the demands of university study bring stress and an awareness of a lack of preparedness. GFS Members make every effort to find help through the tertiary services of the university and contact with the girls. Patience, understanding and kindness usually resolve difficulties. Good communication between girls, GFS and the institution is very important and Council members make sure this happens.

As we make contact with girls who have experienced being on our programme we celebrate friendships made and their educational achievements which will help equip them in their future life.

SOUTH SUDAN



Welcome South Sudan. Your first newsletter article gratefully received.

Diocese of Yambio.

GFS South Sudan was formed since 2018 at Nzara Diocese, by the approval of the GFS world President Mama Thembeke Pama. In May 2019, one year after formation in Nzara, GFS was formed in Yambio Diocese and in (two more parishes namely St. Joseph Parish, (Naagori) and All Saints Cathedral. GFS now is three

years old in the Republic of South Sudan, and it is well received by the community. GFS is introduced to the six (6) Diocese of Western Equatoria Internal Province; it was well received by the Diocesan Bishops and their spouses.



Achievements:

- Three GFS groups formed in South Sudan.
- Conducted 4 workshops and trainings for GFS.
- The diocese of Yambio at its 12th Synod unanimously accepted and recognized GFS as a diocesan organization.
- Prepared the order of the GFS World Day of Prayer, St Michael and All Angels, 2020.
- Organised 3 talk shows in the local radios on the topics: GBV, early pregnancy, early marriage and school dropouts.
- Opened GFS Nursery school with a total number of 178 children.
- Land given by the diocese for GFS activities.
- Received moral support as well as games equipment from the State Government.

Challenges

- COVID 19 locked down, which has closed up most of the GFS activities.
- Economic crisis in the country.

- World-wide lockdown which led to the failure of the GFS World Council scheduled to take place in South Africa in 2020.
- Lack of scholarship to support teachers and pupils.
- Lack of funds to build concrete infrastructure on GFS property.

Way forward

- Looking forward to being admitted by the World Council to GFS come 2022.
- Continuing prayers for GFS Worldwide Council.
- Continuing prayers for the GFS young countries to sustain themselves.

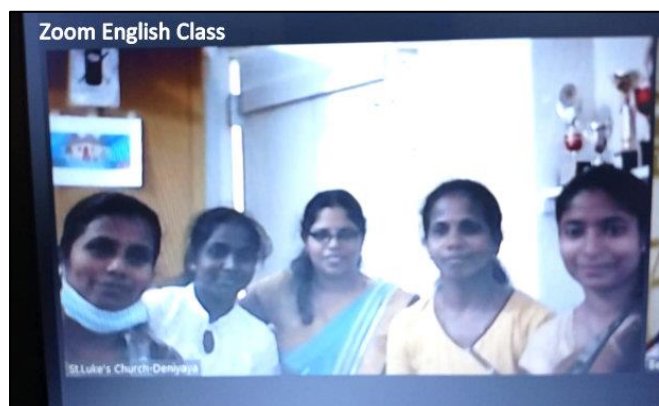

Since our last Report in February, the situation improved slightly and we reopened our Hall and recommenced our ballet classes.

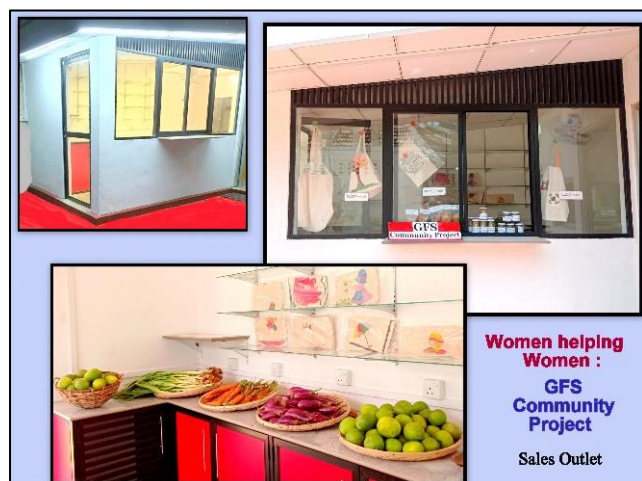

Women helping Women Community Project - begun in June 2020 and continued well into 2021. The GFS was able to assist consumers in the city in a modest way by supplying them with fresh fruits and vegetables direct from the hill country at a lower rate than the market price. Pickles, chutneys, sweet and savoury snacks were obtained through members and others from rural

areas. Traditional sweetmeats and cloth bags with beautiful designs are new additions in our sales outlet.

Through this project, we made a contribution of traditional goodies to St. Michael's Church, Polwatte during the Sinhala & Tamil traditional New Year.

We are proud that due to our hard work, we were able to harvest fruits from the GFS garden!

The GFS Hostel for working girls established in 1957 is being repaired.

We participated in World Zoom meetings.

Sadly, the covid situation has now deteriorated with what is termed the third wave with new dangerous strains. The government has imposed a ban on gatherings (including religious Services) and restrictions on travel within the country.

Our aim is to inspire girls to get moving, also introducing discipline and above all have fun and build



friendships. In our pictures are girls from different branches portraying some of our physical activities done in Zambia.

As GFS Zambia it is our responsibility to fight period poverty among the girl child as this is a problem that has continued to affect a girl child's education. Most of them miss classes whenever they are on periods due to lack of sanitary or reusable pads. As GFS Zambia we will be conducting workshops across the country teaching the girls to make cloth reusable pads. Hygiene



will be emphasised too on how to keep the cloth reusable pads. Together we can fight period poverty.

On 1 June 2019 GFS Zambia launched Orange day and we are pleased to let you know that we celebrate Orange Day every 25th of every month, fighting against GBV. This campaign is about stopping the violence on girls and women which includes sexual, physical abuse etc. The campaign has been well received by our members across our country.
