Letter from the Head of School

Dear Joliet Montessori School Families and Friends,

As I reflect on SY2023-24, I am leaning towards the future with more excitement than ever..

This was another pivotal year for our school as we increased enrollment and our Board of

Trustees approved the opening of a third primary classroom for SY2024-25! It has been a long
time coming for our little school to start booming again and here we are on the cusp of what
we have all been working so hard for these last several years.



This year welcomed exciting highlights including new flooring and paint in the lower and upper elementary classrooms and entrance way, new faux tunnel for the playground, and new LED lighting throughout the entire school, We are grateful to our past donors for contributions to the Annual Fund to help make these necessary upgrades possible along with the grant from ComEd.

The AMS (American Montessori Society) accreditation process was a huge undertaking this year. We brought in parents, board members and staff to meet monthly from the beginning of the year through April to review and pull data to ensure our school is aligned with the AMS standards. This took a great deal of thoughtful reflection, work, collaboration and hours of time. In April, our team finalized everything and submitted all documentation for approval. We look forward to our accreditation visit in SY 2024-25 from an AMS team to verify documentation, and conduct interviews and observations. This will be an exciting step for our school community!

Without further ado, I am extremely pleased to share our Fiscal Year 2024 Annual Report with you.

PARENT CHILD

Our Parent Child program was able to deliver 3 sessions this year with 10 students in each session. Our students were made up of siblings to current students along with new families looking to join the program. We had two children from Parent Child join the primary program between August 2023 through January 2024. Six other students submitted applications to join the primary program for the 2024-2025 school year.

Due to the Board's approval to open up a third primary program for the 2024-2025 school year, the Parent Child program was terminated to make more space for our growing school. Mrs. Heidi Hodge instructed this class since 2017 and had grown the program tremendously. It was with a heavy heart to close the program due to growth, but we are optimistic to have it again in the future.







PRIMARY

Our two primary programs welcomed 24 new students to the community this year! Ms. Kristina Doughan and Mrs. Gosia Wolf continued to lead the Oak and Willow Rooms, respectively. We welcomed Minerva Widner back to finish out the last four months of the school year. Minerva has been a primary assistant teacher for JMS for many years and retired in 2018 to provide a Montessori homeschool learning experience for her granddaughter. She has subbed for JMS for the last two years and has signed on with JMS to continue in the Oak Room as an assistant to Kristina Doughan for SY 2024-25. We are thrilled to have her back in the community and serving our students.

Both primary classrooms joined together this year to host a Stone Soup celebration in honor of Thanksgiving. The children happily brought in ingredients to collaborate in this wonderful feast! With the help of our parent volunteers, the children moved tables and chairs into the Willow Room with freshly pressed tablecloths and decorated placemats. Our kindergartners had the important role of serving their younger classmates water and soup before settling into their own chairs to eat together. What a wonderful way to practice the fundamental pillars of grace and courtesy as a community!

Parent volunteers drove our kindergartners to the JJC Planetarium where they had a full circle experience with everything they've learned about the solar system this year.

This year, we had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Kate Flynn, who subbed regularly in our primary classrooms as a way of getting to know each other. Kate applied for the lead teaching role for the opening of the new primary classroom in SY 2024-25, and after her many times subbing in the spring, she happily accepted the position.







ELEMENTARY

Our elementary programs welcomed two new students this year! Mrs. Rachael Gonzalez and her assistant, Michelle Knollenberg, finished out their fourth year at JMS in the lower elementary classroom. At the same time, Mrs. Gwen Carr rounded out her third year with the upper elementary students. Ms. Gwen has been an upper elementary teacher in two different schools for 15 years, and said to me at the end of this school year, "This was my BEST year ever as an elementary Montessori teacher."

Both programs incorporated a new Montessori Spanish program by Puente Bilingue, with the assistance of Mrs. Christina Ayala-Ortega, for pronunciation guidance. The program runs parallel with the Montessori language boxes, making the process of learning vocabulary easier for the students.

Lower Elementary introduced new materials in the classroom to promote better research skills among students, along with a rotating bookshelf, sewing activities, lesson trackers for work journals, and independent science experiments. They enjoyed visits from multiple parents to assist with more advanced food preparation, such as Rice Krispy treats, cookie decorating, fruit salsa, fruit sushi, and smoothies. They also took a trip to the Beverly Arts Center to see the performance, Beauty & the Beast.

Upper Elementary took a week-long trip to Nature's Classroom Institute in Wisconsin in September, along with other Montessori schools, as part of their nature curriculum. There, they continued to collaborate with the same two Montessori schools in the suburban areas. The students presented their first wax museum for younger students and their families at the end of the school year. This year, the classroom launched a pizza business, affectionately called Pizza Pizzazz, to provide our school community with a monthly pizza lunch while generating funds to benefit the classroom.

We also celebrated the graduation of Liam Schumacher, who has been a student at JMS since he was 3 years old, starting in Ms. Doughan's class. Since the graduation ceremony takes place in the morning on a school day, we decided to include our lower elementary and kindergarten students in the celebration. There was something very special about celebrating the graduation of a student who has been with us since the beginning. We are incredibly honored and thankful for the collaboration and partnership with Liam's parents over these years.

School Performance

At the end of each school year, our students transitioning from one program to the next are evaluated on their benchmarking skills in several academic categories, social-emotional development, and executive functioning. This section highlights student performance with our kindergartners, third graders, and sixth graders.

Kindergartners

- 92% are readers
- 92% understand counting one-to-one correspondence, and number symbols for 1-1000
- 92% request lessons (taking initiative)
- 75% recover from disappointment
- 75% persists in the face of difficulty

3rd Graders

- 83% demonstrate key comprehension skills
- 100% compose a structured paragraph in their writing
- 100% understand place value through millions, and understand patterns and relationships within
- 100% recognizes and names geometry shapes and geometric concepts
- 100% name all the continents and some countries of the world, as well as the states of the U.S.
- 100% recovers from disappointment
- 83% persists in the face of challenge
- 100% seek mastery rather than adult approval
- 100% collaborates and compromises in a group

6th Graders (based on only one sixth-grade graduate - the following areas were fully achieved)


- recovers from disappointment

Financial highlights for the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2024 include:

Enrollment of in our primary and elementary programs generated total tuition revenue of \$701. Numbers remained steady throughout the school year.

Six students received financial aid awards, all funded through our donors' generosity.

Other programs (extended care & parent/child), contributed additional revenue of \$34.

The Montessori Method is dependent upon our excellent directors and assistants. Thus, it is no surprise that Payroll & Benefit costs comprise 75% of total spending. Our amazing staff really stepped up this year to deliver a excellent in-classroom experience and keeping our parent community engaged.

Facilities spending include the recurring cost of utilities and building/grounds maintenances such as: HVAC & electrical repairs, cleaning services, mowing, plowing & security.

Cash reserves of \$93 represent over one month of operating expense.

Donors to JMS' annual fund are listed. The generosity and enthusiasm of our donors has been remarkable, with our Board of Trustees leading the way with 100% participation!
