Domestic Violence Awareness Movement

Mothers' Union members around the world have been working hard to raise awareness of the horrors of Domestic Violence and have promoted the 16 Days of Activism for many years. It is great news that here in the State of South Australia we now have a project to which our branches can contribute. The Domestic and Family Violence Working Group is supporting the installation of purple benches to honour victims of DFV and to draw attention to the plight of those currently suffering. The latest data reports that one woman a week is killed by a current or former partner.

Purple is associated with the global Domestic Violence Awareness Movement and benches painted in this colour can draw the attention of the public to this frightening situation.

The Diocese of Adelaide is seeking registrations of interest from groups who wish to purchase a new purple bench or to renovate and paint an existing one.

Several parishes have already installed benches bearing the special plaque honouring victims of DFV and we encourage all our branches to consider being involved.

CELEBRATING WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2025

The focus for prayers and support this year is The Cook Islands, out in the vast Pacific, where cyclones of increasing severity and frequency lash the shores. Climate changes have seen rising seas claiming precious coastal land, threatening food crops and the very survival of communities.

The inhabitants are 80% Christian, the Gospel having been brought to the islands 200 years ago. Currently, in addition to the problems listed above, we read that there has been a rising tide of Domestic Violence in village life. This is in contrast to our perception of an idyllic Island Paradise! The women writers of the ecumenical service took as their text "Í made you wonderful" from Psalm 139, praising and thanking God for the wonder of life. Services around the world held on March 7th all worshipped using the same service which local countries translated into their own language.

By a cruel twist, many services along Australia's East coast were cancelled as Cyclone Alfred hit the area that very day. This has affected the donations collected, though hopefully some groups have rescheduled their service.

Melanesian Adult Literacy Project

AMUA is supporting MU in the Solomon Islands to implement an Adult Literacy Program in three dioceses:

- Diocese of Ysabel
- Diocese of Malaita
- Diocese of Guadalcanal

When women can read and write, they are able to participate in prayer and worship, understand what is happening in the world around them, and respond appropriately to the day-to-day needs of their families

Outcome 1:

More women at the grassroots level can read or write and are confident to take on leadership



Women engaging in business or income generating activities and are more independent or self-reliant

Outcome 3:

More stable families with drop in the level of abuse and violence

Issues such as equality, gender-based violence, safety and security, disaster resilience and other issues that pose risks to families are better realised and can be proactively managed when members of society are equally literate.



Together, we're creating a future where every young mum and her baby can thrive.

This is our new local project to which the funds from our recent Film Morning will be directed. Thanks to all who attended or bought tickets. We hope you enjoyed the event. After expenses, we raised over \$1,000 for this project.
