In Acts 9:36-43, we encounter the inspiring

example of Tabitha (also known as Dorcas), a woman admired for her unwavering devotion and tireless dedication to helping those in need (vv.36–37). Because she was always doing good and helping the poor, perhaps she had little time to care for herself - a typical example of a motherly nature. Her absence is profoundly felt by the community, which was so heartbroken that they urgently called for Peter (vv. 38–39). The passage makes it clear that a life marked by acts of love and compassion is truly treasured (v.39b), and such a life rightly receives both spiritual and physical support - an affirmation of its value and impact (vv.40–41). Through

Women like Tabitha, whose love and care are expressed through generous acts of charity, embody the very essence of motherhood. They may not all be biological mothers, but their nurturing hearts and self-less service earn them a place among those we call "mother."

From the Chaplain's Corner:

One of the things that I had to leave behind in England when we migrated to South Australia in 2003, was my being an Oblate of the mixed Benedictine Community (nuns and monks) who lived at Burford Priory in the Cotswolds. An Oblate is someone who has a particular association

with a monastery or a convent and who follows a Rule of Life which seeks to incorporate the monastic spirit in their daily lives. One of the requirements of Oblature was to spend seven nights a year staying in the Community Guest House participating in the full worshipping life of the Community. I obviously had to let that go, as I couldn't make that commitment!

In 2008, the Community moved from Burford to a new purpose-built Abbey at Mucknell just outside Worcester. On a couple of occasions whilst in England since then, Jane and I were fortunate enough to be able to visit them for

the day, but I had never stayed with the Community as I used to do back in their Burford days. In 2022, I booked a seven-day Retreat at Mucknell, but unfortunately several members of the Community contracted Covid and they had to shut the Guest House, so my Retreat was cancelled.

I was delighted during our recent trip to England, to be able to book three nights at Mucknell, and to actually get to spend those three days and nights with the Community, joining in with their worshipping and working life as I used to before.

Obviously, there have been changes in personnel over the intervening years, but there are still four of the Community there who I knew at Burford, and there are now seven new nuns and monks. What hasn't changed is the worshipping life and spirituality, and it was a real joy and privilege to enter into the silence, the prayerfulness and the life of the Community, and to step away from the hubbub of everyday life for a little while, and to reflect. Later this year, I am planning an opportunity for members of Mothers' Union in the Diocese of Adelaide to do similarly: to spend some time away from the hubbub of daily life and to reflect together.


Also a couple of you have paid your subs but not informed me. So please check that you have done so. I would rather know twice than not at all.

Subject: My Childhood

I accept that we were from a different era, as I keep agreeing with statements like these.

My mum used to cut chicken, chop eggs and spread butter on bread on the same cutting board with the same knife and no bleach, but we didn't seem to get food poisoning.

Our school sandwiches were wrapped in wax paper in a brown paper bag, not in ice pack coolers, but I can't remember getting e. Coli

We all took PE And risked permanent injury with a pair of Dunlop sandshoes instead of having cross-training athletic shoes with air cushion soles and built in light reflectors that cost as much as a small car. I can't recall any injuries but they must have happened because they tell us how much safer we are now.

We got the cane for doing something wrong at school, they used to call it discipline yet we all grew up to accept the rules and to honour & respect those older than us.

We had 50 kids in our class and we all learned to read and write, do maths and spell almost all the words needed to write a grammatically correct letter.

We all said prayers in school irrespective of our religion, sang the national anthem and no one got upset.

Staying in detention after school caught all sorts of negative attention we wish we hadn't got, both at school and then at home.

Oh yeah And where was the antibiotics and sterilisation kit when I got that bee sting? I could have been killed!

We played "King of the Hill" on piles of gravel left on vacant building sites and when we got hurt, mum pulled out the 2/6p bottle of iodine and then we got our backside spanked. Now it's a trip to the emergency room, followed by a 10 day dose of antibiotics and then mum calls the lawyer to sue the contractor for leaving a horribly vicious pile of gravel where it was such a threat.

To top it off, not a single person I knew had ever been told that they were from a dysfunctional family. How could we possibly have known that?

We never needed to get into group therapy and/or anger management classes. We were obviously so duped by so many societal ills, that we didn't even notice that the entire country wasn't taking Prozac!

How did we ever survive?
