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



Scriptural Foundation: Isaiah 43:18-19, 18 "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. 19 See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland."

Does it seem like the past just keeps coming back to your mind over and over? Maybe someone from your past keeps reminding you of all the things you used to do, the things you try so hard to forget. Do you ponder over the things or the people you lost, wondering if your life would be different if you got that job, that luxury car, that money and even that boo, even though they were not for you? Today God wants you to stop living in the past because your past is blocking your future blessings! If you want to be blessed holistically, this passage is a message of hope and renewal from God, encouraging people to let go of past hardships and trust that He is creating something new and transformative in their lives.

God wants you to forget about all that and stop dwelling on it as Proverbs 3:5-6 states, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths." Keep watching for the new things, change your mindset, let go of past hurts or triumphs and focus on God's present work in you. Know that God not only restores but renews you in your good times, your tough times, and your uncertain times.

The verses also inspire embracing new opportunities and trusting in God's ability to provide a way forward in challenging circumstances. It is a powerful message of hope and a call to embrace the future, as God promises to bring about a "new thing," even when the present seems like a hopeless "wilderness" or "wasteland".



Pardon the Mess: God's Still Working on Me

Key Scripture

Philippians 1:6 (NKJV): "Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ."

The Blueprint Is Already Drawn

Before construction begins, architects create detailed plans. In the same way, God has already designed the blueprint of your life. Jeremiah 29:11 reminds us, 'For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the Lord, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope.' Even when life feels uncertain, remember: the Master Architect has already laid out the design, and every season has purpose. Psalm 139:16 teaches that every day of our lives was written in His book before one of them came to be. You are not random—you are designed.

Construction Zones Are Messy but Necessary

Anyone who has driven through road construction knows it's noisy, inconvenient, and often longer than expected. Yet, the mess is necessary for improvement. The same is true in our spiritual lives. God sometimes tears down old habits, attitudes, and even relationships that cannot support the weight of our calling. Hebrews 12:11 says, 'No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it.' Don't mistake the dust in your life for destruction—it's proof that God is building something new.

The Builder Never Abandons the Project

One of the saddest sights is an unfinished building project, left to rot because someone walked away. But God is not like man. He never abandons what He starts. Philippians 1:6 assures us that the same God who started the good work in you will carry it to completion. You may be in the foundation stage, or still waiting for finishing touches, but you are not forgotten. Ephesians 2:10 reminds us: 'For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them.' You are God's ongoing masterpiece.

Conclusion

When people see you in progress and don't understand why you're not 'finished' yet, tell them with confidence: "Pardon the mess—I'm under construction." You may not look like the final product now, but God is working. Stay encouraged with the ABCs of construction faith:

- A Acknowledge God's hand at work in your life daily.
- B Believe His promises even when you don't see progress.
- C Continue walking by faith, knowing He will finish what He started.

Devotional Passage: Lamentations 3:21-25

"This I recall to my mind, therefore have I hope."

- Lamentations 3:21

Where do you find hope when it feels like you are walking in darkness? Here we have the writer of Lamentations, Jeremiah, known as the weeping prophet, finding himself heartbroken, miserable, and in distress. Everything he had loved, cared about, and trusted in was gone. His beloved city of Jerusalem was in ruins. The people no longer had a place to worship God. They were suffering badly. Jeremiah felt like God had left them altogether. He was on the verge of losing hope.

Right in the middle of a bad situation, Jeremiah does an amazing thing that we can do also. We can recall in our minds all that God has done for us in the past like Jeremiah did. As the song says, "If He did it before, He can do it again, same God right now - same God back then." Even in devastation Jeremiah finds hope, he remembers that God's mercies are new every morning and that He offers continuous strength to those who seek and wait on Him. Although Jeremiah and his people had lost everything, he still knew that God's love and compassion would remain the same. And, that it would be a daily reminder of His love and faithfulness they could always count on. Like Jeremiah, let us hold to our hope and wait on the Lord to do His work.

The same God that was there for Jeremiah is the same God that is here for us today. The Bible tells us that God is the same yesterday, today, and forever. He is still the God of love, of hope, of understanding, of loyalty, of grace, and of mercy. His mercies are new every day and His grace is endless. Every new day God offers us another chance to right the wrong and start anew. Lamentation 3 reminds us that we too can find hope and strength by holding on the promises of God and His unchanging nature in the midst of life's storms. For we serve a loving and faithful God.

When Winter Gives Way to Spring: Finding God in Life's Seasons

Life, much like the natural world around us, moves in seasons. Just as the earth revolves around the sun and ushers in winter, spring, summer, and fall, so our spiritual journeys revolve around the Son of God, bringing times of joy, waiting, hardship, and renewal. The writer of Ecclesiastes reminds us, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens" (Ecclesiastes 3:1).

Winter is often used as a metaphor for adversity or spiritual desolation. In nature, winter is a time when growth is hidden. Fields lie fallow, trees stand bare, and life seems to pause under the weight of frost and snow. Likewise, our personal winters can be seasons of silence, waiting, or even despair. We may feel frozen in place, longing for progress, yet finding ourselves simply sliding across the ice of circumstances we cannot control.

Some winters are harsher than others. Just as certain regions endure bitter storms while others only feel a light chill, some of us endure winters of deep grief, illness, or loss, while others may face shorter trials. It is easy to compare our hardships with those around us, wondering, "Why is my winter colder than theirs?" Yet even in the coldest nights, God remains present.

Preparation is key. In physical winter, we protect ourselves with coats, gloves, and scarves. Spiritually, we clothe ourselves in faith, prayer, and the promises of God. Proverbs 31:21 paints the picture of a woman who is not afraid of the snow, for her household is clothed in scarlet. She is ready, not because winter will not come, but because she trusts in God's provision.

The good news is this: winter does not last forever. Song of Songs 2:11-12 declares, "See! The winter is past; the rains are over and gone. Flowers appear on the earth; the season of singing has come." Beneath the frozen ground, seeds are preparing to sprout. What looks dormant is not dead—God is working in hidden places. Our winters are temporary. They prepare the soil of our hearts for the spring of renewal and joy.

Winter also teaches us valuable lessons. It is a time to pause, reflect, and remember God's past provision. It is a time to slow down and allow God's quiet work to strengthen our roots. Just as snow nourishes the earth for future harvest (Isaiah 55:10), the cold seasons of our lives build faith and resilience we will need in the days ahead.

If you find yourself in a winter season today, know this: God has not abandoned you. He is your shelter in the storm, your warmth in the cold, and your hope in the silence. And when spring breaks forth, you will see blossoms of new life and hear songs of joy once again. As Psalm 30:5 reminds us, "Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning."

Winter will pass. Spring is on the way. Trust the God of every season.

Reflection Questions

- 1. What "winter" season are you experiencing right now—spiritually, emotionally, or physically?
- 2. How has God sustained you through past winters in your life?
- 3. What spiritual clothing (faith, prayer, scripture) do you need to "put on" to prepare for life's winters?
- 4. Where do you see small signs of "spring" beginning to emerge in your life?

Prayer

Heavenly Father, thank You that no season lasts forever. Even in the winters of my life, you are near strengthening me, providing for me, and preparing me for renewal. Help me to trust You in the cold and to rejoice when spring arrives. Teach me to see Your hand at work in every season and let my heart always sing of Your faithfulness. In Jesus' name, Amen.

The Master Teacher: Lessons from Jesus on Education

Proverbs 1:7 reminds us that "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge." True education, as illuminated in Scripture, starts with a deep, reverential respect for God. While the word "education" may not explicitly appear in every English translation of the Bible, the concept of learning, acquiring knowledge, and developing wisdom is central. This process begins within the family, with parents guiding their children. Jesus, Our Master Teacher

The Gospels consistently portray Jesus as a teacher. He proclaimed and instructed, often referred to as "Teacher" or "Rabbi" by His contemporaries. His teachings weren't merely theoretical; they were transformative, leading people to a new relationship with God—the "kingdom of God."

What made Jesus the "Master Teacher"?

- Divine Authority: Unlike other teachers who cited external sources, Jesus spoke with inherent authority, declaring, "You have heard this, but I tell you..." (Matthew 5:22).
- Relatable Storytelling: Jesus used parables, like the Prodigal Son, to convey profound truths in memorable ways.
- Shocking Statements: He employed hyperbole and exaggeration to capture attention and emphasize His points, even if not meant to be taken literally (e.g., Matthew 5:29-30).

- Memorable Sayings: Jesus crafted poetic and catchy phrases that were easy for His listeners to remember, such as the Golden Rule (Luke 6:31).
- Thought-Provoking Questions: Instead of always providing answers, Jesus often asked questions to lead His listeners to their own conclusions (e.g., Matthew 22:20-21).
- Visual Illustrations: He used object lessons, like washing His disciples' feet, to demonstrate servant leadership (John 13:3-17).
- Experiential Learning: Jesus didn't just teach; He sent His disciples out to apply His instructions, understanding that experience deepens faith (Luke 9:1-6, 10).
- Practiced What He Preached: The ultimate example of integrity, Jesus lived out His teachings. He prayed often, dined with sinners, and walked His talk even to the cross (Luke 5:16, Matthew 9:10-12).

Learning from God's Word

The Bible itself is a foundational source for learning. "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17).

As followers of Christ, we are called to learn from Jesus, our Master Teacher. His methods provide a blueprint for effective communication, spiritual growth, and a life lived in accordance with God's will.

Closing Thought

Let us strive to be students of His Word and emulate His characteristics as we seek to grow in knowledge and wisdom.
